WE CHOOSE WELCOME

Have you driven by St. Philip recently and seen the message "We Choose Welcome" on the electronic sign on San Felipe? Did you know that "**We Choose Welcome**" is more than just a general message of welcome? It is actually an awareness campaign of the Presbyterian Church (USA) and an expression of personal and corporate commitment to welcome refugees and immigrants into our communities. The phrase stems from a statement by former PC(USA) Stated Clerk of Gradye Parsons, urging us to "Choose welcome, not fear." The denomination suggests that this includes the following:

- ◊ In the midst of fear of terrorism and radicalism, we choose to welcome those who flee from terror and tyranny.
- ◊ In the midst of hate speeches and hate crimes, we choose to welcome those rejected because of their skin color or unusual dress.
- ◊ In the midst of anxiety about our own economic prosperity, we choose to welcome those who come from distant lands to labor in our fields and warehouses.
- ◊ In the midst of political debates that seek to divide us between those who are born here and those who are not, we choose welcome, a welcome for all children of God, proclaiming one household.

St. Philip committed to the *We Choose Welcome* campaign in 2016, and in 2017 we prepared to welcome a refugee family the following year. In March 2018 we met a wonderful family from Iraq and quickly developed a close relationship with the couple and their two young children. (For their continued safety and security, we may not share identifying information such as names.) Later that year the family relocated to Midland, TX, where they still live and work.

Peacemaking & Social Justice committee members and other St. Philipians trained to work with refugees have kept in contact with the family. We reached out after the recent killing of Qassem Suleimani, and received this response, which we wanted to share. (It has not been edited for content.)

All my friends at St. Philip,

We're really going through tough days thinking of my family, parents and siblings, and those loved ones in Baghdad now, the situation there is not good at all, people are living in tension life and got tired of living in war zone has never been stopped, all that is adding a heavy weight on us, trying to focus on work and at the same time thinking about my family and the innocent people in Baghdad, hoping none of them get hurt.

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As always my family at St. Philip Church relief the pressure that applies on me and my family, thank you all and I really appreciate each one of you all, and thanks for the prayers.

Thank you for your kind words, we love you!

So thankful to have you all in our life.

God is good, God bless you all.

America's openness to refugees has been a distinct feature of our country from its foundation. In the periods when the country was not open to refugees and asylum seekers, such as during the Holocaust, it later became clear that we were on the wrong side of history. The White House's announcement of an annual admissions ceiling of 18,000 refugees, and Governor Abbott's ban on new refugees in Texas, come at a time when the number of people fleeing conflict around the world is the highest since World War II.

To welcome others is a central value of the Christian faith, and shared by most of the world's religions. The call to welcome the stranger is so common in the Bible that one must wonder if that is because of its importance, or because we are so quick to disregard it. Faith-based organizations in the United States have been at the forefront of refugee resettlement. Many faith-based leaders and organizations have called for more, not less, openness to welcoming refugees.

St. Philip is committed to making good on the promise that our welcome signs proclaim. **We Choose Welcome** of our refugee and immigrant neighbors – not fear. —Kate Burkart

DUERR LECTURE SERIES

The speaker for the 23rd annual Duerr Lecture Series, **February 23, 24, and 25**, is Rev. Deborah L. Forger, Ph.D., Postdoctoral Scholar, Jewish Studies, Dartmouth College. Dr. Forger holds degrees from Calvin College, Duke University, and University of Michigan, and is an ordained Presbyterian Minister. Most of her academic work and research has focused on the Gospel of John and Second Temple Period Jewish literature. After the Tree-of-Life synagogue massacre last fall, however, she felt compelled to start writing more on the topic of the Bible and antisemitism. Title of the lectures is **"Christian Biblical Interpretation and Christian Antisemitism: Exploring an Unfortunate Link."** Dr. Forger will preach at the 11:00 a.m. worship services and present lectures each evening at 7:00 p.m. Lectures are free and open to everyone. There will only be an 11:00 a.m. service on **February 23**.

MO-RANCH

You may pay in full at the time of registration or in three installments (**March 2, April 6, May 4**). Confirmations and bills will be sent out by email. (Please be sure that the email you provide is correct and is an address you check regularly.) All registrations must be complete and paid by March 2 (first payment, if paying in installments.) No refunds can be made after **March 2**. If you do not cancel your reservation by that date, you must pay for your room whether you go or not. **WE REGRET WE CANNOT HOLD SPACE FOR ANYONE WITHOUT A COMPLETED REGISTRATION.**

PRICING:

Pricing for a room in Wynne, Flato, or Pheasant Run lodge depends on how many adults will share the room. Prices for adults include lodging and all meals from breakfast Friday through breakfast Sunday. Children and youth are billed only for their meals (but must be accompanied by at least one adult per room).

The pricing for a room in Manor House does not include meals. To book in Manor House, select the room when registering the first adult in your group, then select meals for each person in the group.

If you wish to have Thursday dinner at Mo-Ranch, you must select that separately. Cost: Adults and Youth \$14.50; Children (ages 4-11) \$10.25

WYNNE LODGE/FLATO LODGE (each room has two queen beds)

Adult (room shared by 2 adults): \$286 each

Adult (room shared by 3 adults): \$225 each

Adult (room shared by 4 adults): \$195 each

PHEASANT RUN (most rooms have two beds)

Adult (single accommodation): \$439

Adult (room shared by 2 adults): \$271 each

Youth 12-18 in same room: \$82 per child

Children 4-11: \$60 per child

MANOR HOUSE - This lodging is reserved for families. All sleeping rooms share a common living room. There are large rooms with multiple beds (some twins, some queens in varying combinations. We will match your family to the best available room.)

Room Cost: \$544 per family

Meals (Friday Breakfast through Sunday Breakfast):

Adults: \$82 per adult

Youth 12-18 in same room: \$82 per child

Children 4-11: \$60 per child

ELECTRONIC REGISTRATION:

Registration will be online at Saintphilip.net or you can register in the Gathering Area with the volunteers on Sunday. On the first screen, you will need to add each family member attending. (When you see 'Mo-Ranch Reservation (Free)' it means only that there is no service charge for using the online system.)

You will select each person's lodging and meal on the second screen, and will be asked further questions about participants in your group as you complete the process.

PAYMENT:

At the end of the online registration process, you will have the option of paying immediately by credit card or paying by mail or in person at the church office.

If you are setting up a payment plan, you will choose the option to Pay In Person/Mail. Indicate Payment Plan in the memo box. You may then make payments in the office or sign in to MyStPhilip and make payments to the Mo-Ranch Fund on **March 2, April 6 and May 4**.

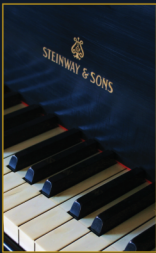
