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

PHILIP-EYE





Known as an insightful biblical scholar and impactful preacher, our speaker for the 28th annual Duerr Lecture Series is Brian K. Blount, President Emeritus of Union Presbyterian Seminary and currently Alonzo L. McDonald Chair in the Life and Teachings of Jesus and Their Impact on Culture at Emory University, Candler School of Theology. Growing up in Smithfield, VA, Blount was nurtured in a home where education was emphasized. He responded by attending the College of William and Mary, where he received the B.A. degree in Religion and Psychology and was the first African-American to receive membership in the Alpha Chapter of the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society. Next Blount received the M.Div. degree from Princeton Theological Seminary, and then was called to be Pastor of Carver Memorial Presbyterian Church in Newport News, VA, where he served from 1982 - 1988. In 1992 Blount received the Ph.D. from Emory University in New Testament studies. After receiving his doctorate in 1992, Blount joined the faculty at Princeton Theological Seminary and served as the Richard J. Dearborn Professor of New Testament Interpretation until 2007, when he was called to be President and Professor Of New Testament at Union Presbyterian Seminary, Richmond, VA and Charlotte, NC, serving there until his retirement in 2023.

Blount's primary work has been in the Gospel of Mark, the Book of Revelation, and in cultural studies and hermeneutics. Sought after as lecturer, teacher, and preacher, Dr. Blount has published many articles and reviews and is sole author of six books including *Invasion of the Dead: Preaching Resurrection* (Louisville: Westminster John Knox Press, 2014) and *Commentary on Revelation* (Louisville: Westminster John Knox Press, 2009). Blount is married and has two adult children. He is an avid runner and in retirement he maintains a very active preaching and travel schedule.

In his lectures, "The Kingdom of God," Dr. Blount will discuss what difference it makes to talk about the Kingdom of God in today's world. How do various Christian groups understand the Kingdom? What does our belief about the Kingdom mean for our actions as people working in and for that Kingdom? What does it mean in our time to enter the Kingdom of God? After examining those questions we'll look at how Jesus' understanding of God's Kingdom developed from the witness of the Hebrew Prophets. How does this prophetic understanding help us engage the Kingdom of God -- not as a safe space in which we go to be saved -- but as the rule of God that courses into our world and invites us to participate with it? In his concluding lecture, Blount will make the case that the Kingdom of God is a future reality that comes at the end of time yet is inserted into our human present in Jesus. We see that future in Jesus's life and ministry and represent that future as his disciples. Dr. Blount will preach on Sunday, February 23 at 11:00 a.m. in the sanctuary, and present lectures each evening, Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday, in the Fellowship Hall at 7:00 p.m.

In its 28th year the Duerr Lecture Series continues to offer lectures both live and by live-streaming. Access to the worship service and lectures will be available on the website: www.saintphilip.net. A link will be found to register for inperson or online live-streaming. All lectures are free and open to all. Worship service is 11:00 a.m. CST, Feb. 23, lectures each evening, Feb. 23, 24, and 25, are at 7:00 pm. All lectures will be held in the Fellowship Hall at St. Philip Presbyterian Church, and will be archived for later viewing. The lecture series was established in 1998 in memory of Chris Duerr, with the purpose of bringing the best Reformed scholars and preachers to St. Philip and the wider community each year. Duerr was born and raised in Germany, growing up during the years of World War II. He came to the U.S. in 1950 in the first class of Fulbright Scholars from Germany, studying at Michigan State University. He also studied at the University of Hamburg, Germany, where he received the equivalent of a Master's Degree in political economics. He moved permanently to the States in 1968, becoming a naturalized citizen in 1973. He joined St. Philip in 1979 and later served as a ruling elder.

The Lecture Series was established through generous contributions made in Duerr's memory. # "AGONY...SORT OF"

Along with shows like West Side Story, Su, and others, "Into the Woods" is one of Stephen Sondheim's greatest works. From start to finish, Sondheim carefully and cleverly weaves underlying complex themes – infidelity, vanity, and parenting, to name a few– into a combination of innocent fairy tales like Jack & the Beanstalk, Cinderella, Rapunzel, and Little Red Riding Hood, which are all tied together by the story of a baker and his wife's journey to have a child. Sondheim's use of fairy tales, which are normally lofty tellings of moral lessons, to demonstrate more real life struggles shows his brilliance and effectiveness as a story-teller.

No characters display vanity better than the two princes of Cinderella and Rapunzel, who Sondheim

also uses to poke fun at some ridiculous or morally problematic of these old stories, yielding one of the best parts of the show. "Agony" finds our two princes lamenting their newly found, yet currently unattainable lost maidens, with Cinderella running away and Rapunzel being locked in a tower. Each prince is caught in their own fantasy of narcissism, but also claims to be suffering much more than the other, quickly turning the song into a multi-layer sibling rivalry of who is suffering most. After a relatively normal first verse and refrain by Cinderella's Prince, Rapunzel's Prince sings his verse, followed by an altered refrain, "Agony! Far more painful than yours..."

If you'd like to hear this song live, join us at our "Songs & Fragments" recital this Sunday February 9 at 5pm, where the two princes will be making a guest appearance in our sanctuary! For now, enjoy this version from the 2014 film adaptation of "Into the Woods," featuring Chris Pine and Billy Magnussen.
