MISSION UPDATE


Letter from Keatan:

In daily prayer services during these weeks, the pastors at St. Philip are reading through the gospel of Mark. What strikes me about how nearly every story of Jesus' healing, feeding, and teaching begins is that Jesus was actually on the way to do something else. Though he went away to Tyre, "he could not escape notice" when a woman begged him to heal her daughter. On his way back to Galilee, people brought him a man to be healed. Jesus refused to continue on to Dalmanutha until he had fed the 4,000 people who'd come long ways to hear him teach. Whatever was on his agenda took a back seat to the one in his midst who needed him.

The heart of what Jesus wanted to impart to his followers was a way of life that constant consideration for the needs of neighbors. When our community is in crisis and each is tempted to think first of themselves, we hold onto Jesus' way of living in the world. We can serve our community by supporting our local mission partners whose services are more deeply needed now than ever.

St. Philip strongly encourages the practice of social distancing and staying home for all people, and while some of our mission partners are receiving volunteers, we emphasize making donations as the safest form of support. We highlight these opportunities to reach out to others in love, showing them that their lives matter and they are not forgotten or overlooked. Wherever we are, we can hold the staff members and clients of Interfaith Ministries of Greater Houston, Christian Community Services Center, Plant it Forward, and the International Seafarer's Ministry in prayer as they persevere in feeding, healing, and loving our neighbors.

But now is a good time to work on a token of care and appreciation for their work in delivering essential goods to our community in anticipation of when chaplains can connect with them again. CMEF EMERGENCY GRANTS

EASTER COMMUNION

With guidance provided by the Office of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) for celebrating communion in an emergency/pandemic, the Session has authorized a celebration of the Lord's Supper for our online Easter worship service on April 12. Everyone is invited to participate. The sacrament will follow the reading and proclamation of Scripture, as always. The pastors will offer prayers of thanksgiving and the words of institution from the St. Philip Sanctuary, then the elements may be received by those worshipping at home. There are many possibilities for what form the elements can take: bread of any sort is suitable, including crackers, tortillas, etc.; any sort of fruit juice would be appropriate, as would wine or even water. If acquiring the elements is difficult or necessitates an unwelcomed trip to the store, please let us know so we can help. It is our hope that in sharing the sacrament in this extraordinary way we would be mindful of our common faith and the life we share within the Body of Christ.

A 10TH ANNIVERSARY

If your house is like our house in these strange days, together we are all being nurtured each day by our pastors on video. Together. It's a very good thing. At 1420 Harvard, we are rapidly turning honey-do's into honey-done's. We are also keeping in mind the need for distractions from the afore mentioned *do's to done's*. If you need an occasional break – here is a suggestion.



This year St. Philip will celebrate the tenth anniversary of our Fritts organ. In January 2010 there was a series of videos made over the 30+ days needed to install the organ...beginning with unloading the 18-wheeler.

Some history: When it came time for St. Philip to consider #1) removing many older unused educational *quads* (four room complexes like our current rooms 5-8 & 9-12 ... there were originally 28 rooms), #2) constructing a new 2-story education building, and #3) updating the sanctuary; we formed a building committee! John Hudson was the chair of that group. One of the committee members was Elizabeth Duerr. When the decision was made to consider a new organ, Elizabeth became the chair of that new group.

A week before the organ arrived (it was Christmas), Steve gave me a “Flip video camera” – it was the current rage. I decided to give the camera a test run and record the unloading of the organ from the 18-wheeler. That happened after worship, Sunday, January 3, 2010. I had no plans after that. I asked Paul Fritts if I could video his work through the installation, and he said yes. So I continued each day AND I had the *party of my life* in the process. Day 01, became day 02, then day 03 and on to the end of the build.



Let's watch the videos. Go to YouTube and enter one of the listed video titles into the “SEARCH” box. Note: these are video titles, and not URL's.

There are 36 videos total. Titles include: **SPPC4807 day 00** through **SPPC4807 day 28**. There is no “day 07”. Paul Fritts and company call Sunday, a day of rest. That's a good thing. Note: day 13 has 2 parts. After the “days”, videos are named “part”: **SPPC4807 part 29** through **SPPC4807 part 35**. A word of explanation: These videos are not the quality that we have come to enjoy at St. Philip. These were a singular, personal effort. I am a cook; not a skilled videographer. When all this began I had no idea how many folks enjoyed and wanted to see how the organ was being assembled. If you only look at one video – it must be **SPPC4807 day 00**. This video shows St. Philip at our best! We were 103+ family members doing a project together! Like the recent painting project in the Arts & Crafts Studio a few weeks back where twelve plus members came together and had a party – and oh, did some painting. Hmm, I wonder what we can do together when it comes time to plant flowers?
