Mary McGuire attended her first PW circle meeting at age 4 with her grandmother! Mary's mother continued this family



St. Philip has a long and rich connection with Mo-Ranch. For more than forty years, our congregation has held its annual retreat at this Presbyterian conference center in the hill country, and in recent years the congregation collects a special offering ahead of the retreat so we can express our love and care for

this treasured mission partner. The "Mo-Shower" supports the housekeeping department at the ranch. This year our gift will help replenish the very most fundamental supplies needed to make Mo's accommodations comfortable and welcoming for guests: bedding and towels! It takes a lot of these "soft goods" to keep the ranch in good shape. Your generous support of this offering will ensure rest and relaxation for many visitors this season. PEACEMAKING & SOCIAL JUSTICE

Participating in social justice is a Christian tradition inspired by Jesus, who cared deeply about the social causes around him. Those of us on the Peacemaking and Social Justice Committee take our understanding of Christ's social justice ministry seriously and prayerfully. Hospitality to and support of all – LGBTQIA+ persons, refugees, people of color - have been hall-marks of this church through the activities of this committee for many years. More recent areas of service include:

- an intentional two-year study of racism in America and establishment of a fund to help right the injustice composers of Black spiritual music have suffered in not being eligible for royalties
- a recent commitment to the denomination's Matthew 25 initiative, in the focus area of dismantling structural racism
- substantive assistance to and friendship with refugee families from Iraq, Afghanistan, and the Democratic Republic of the Congo
- continued support of actions to hold up St. Philip as an Earth Care Congregation, which requires efforts in the areas of education, facilities, outreach, and worship. These include
 - O our community garden, whose produce is grown organically and distributed through the emergency food pantry ministry of the Christian Community Service Center
 - O a budding interest in a native plant bed
 - O support of renewable energy through the solar farm on the roof of the education building and evaluation of an EV charging station on our campus
 - O the use of fellowship coffee through the denomination's fair-trade co-op partner, Equal Exchange, and quarterly sales of a variety of chocolates, coffees, teas, and other food products through Equal Exchange, supporting a sustainable farming model that is gentle to God's Earth and enabling small farmers in developing countries to earn a living wage
- efforts to educate ourselves on denominational resources for gun violence prevention and exploring the Guns to Gardens project
- voter education and advocacy
- support of transgender youth and their parents.

By acknowledging and actively addressing racism, gender equality, earth care, and a litany of other issues, St. Philip is following in the steps of Jesus, who loves everyone but went out of his way to intentionally help specific groups of people – the alienated, mistreated, and those facing injustice. Your support, in the form of your treasure, talent, and time, will help us continue our efforts to demonstrate the relevance of today's Christianity to our community and beyond. Your pledges help support our work, and new members of the committee are welcome and appreciated and invited to join us.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR LEARNING

NURSERY CARE IS AVAILABLE THROUGHOUT SUNDAY MORNINGS

SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASSES FOR ALL AGES 9:30 a.m. - 10:40 a.m.

GODLY PLAY (Age 3-Kindergarten) – Room 104—Our preschool class uses a curriculum called "Godly Play," developed by Jerome Berryman in Houston, and utilized in reformed churches all over the world. Godly Play encourages children to use the language of Christians and multiple senses to express what they innately know about God.

ELEMENTARY (Grades 1-5) — Room 105

YOUTH (Grades 6-12) — Room 205

Both the Elementary and Youth classes use the PCUSA's new *Follow Me* curriculum. These lessons are based on 36 practices that Jesus engaged in and taught his followers about. Learners will locate these practices in scripture, while engaging in conversation about the practices in their daily lives. With a wide variety of developmentally-aligned activities, conversation starters, and questions to ponder outside of class, this curriculum calls us all to follow Jesus and live out his example every day.

ADULT BIBLE STUDY—Room 204— Join us from 9:30 a.m. – 10:40 a.m. to deepen our understanding of God's faithfulness to God's people. The Adult Bible Study class will recess from Sunday, May 7 through Sunday, May 21 and will meet again Sunday, May 28, before recessing for the summer. All are welcome.

CHURCH & SOCIETY - Room 201—Church and Society regularly features speakers and presentations on a variety of contemporary and historical matters of faith and practice. This class meets from 9:40 a.m.-10:45 a.m. with presentations in person and some by Zoom, projected in the classroom. May 28, Kate Burkart will lead a Church & Society presentation on this year's Oscar-winning film "Everything Everywhere All at Once." Sunday, May 21 we'll meet in room 201, or by Zoom, 9:30 a.m. - 10:40 a.m. for the presentation "Christians and Medicine: Historical Contours & Complexities" - One science-related field of particular interest to Christianity historically has been medicine. This presentation will trace the main contours of Christianity and medicine from the early followers of Jesus to today's hospitals with the word "saint" in their names. And it will debunk some of today's myths about Christianity's supposed objection to particular medical discoveries. Presented by Bruce Yeager - author of Wrestling Brothers: Rethinking Religion-Science Relationships, and Spirited Bodies Beneath the Stars: Science & Spirituality Together.

SPa (St. Philip Adults) – Room 200—This year, SPa returns to its same place and time. We use the adult resources from the new *Follow Me* curriculum to guide our informal weekly discussion about biblical practices such as hospitality, forgiveness and honoring sabbath. All adults of any age are welcomed to participate - grab some coffee and join us. There is no need to prepare or purchase materials for class, so come as you are able!

CHILDREN'S CHAPEL—The Children's Chapel is held every **2nd** and **4th Sunday** after *Conversation with Children*. In the Children's Chapel, our young disciples learn the whos, whats, wheres, whens and whys of worship, while praying, singing, and hearing God's word at an age-appropriate level. Children return to join the congregation in the first few pews on the lectern side of the church for the last hymn.
