## CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

The Session has called a congregational meeting for Sunday, **July 21**, immediately following the 11:00 worship service. The purpose of the meeting is to elect elders to the Session in the class of 2022. The Congregational Nominating Committee will nominate Betsy Boston, Kip Frautschi, Judye Hartman, Judith Hiott, Richard (Dick) Nunn, Ruthie Waldrop, and Curt Webb. Additional nominations may be made at the meeting with prior consent of those being nominated.

FYI—The membership of the Session consists of ordained and installed Ruling Elders and Teaching Elders (Pastors), all elected by the congregation. Session members are responsible for the spiritual oversight of the congregation and for oversight of all the programs and ministries of St. Philip. The Session carries out its work primarily through its Standing Committees. The session meets the third Tuesday of each month and the third Sunday, following worship, to receive new members and approve baptisms.



### Betsy Boston

Betsy Boston and her husband, Dan, arrived in Houston in 2017, moving into their Heights home two days before Hurricane Harvey hit. (It was a memorable introduction!) They started to attend St. Philip soon after, and joined the church last year. Betsy has been active with the Mission Committee, women's book group, and Wednesday evening Presbyterian Women's Circle. Mission was also

a focus during her 27 years of membership at Wayne Presbyterian Church outside Philadelphia—including serving on the steering committee as the prayer team coordinator, initiating an alternative gift program, volunteering at a soup kitchen, and assisting in an inner-city classroom. Betsy also served on the PNC, volunteered on youth mission trips, led Bible studies, and worked at the Pennsylvania branch of the International Dyslexia Association. Daughter Laura and son-in-law Javier Perez live close by, and two other daughters and two granddaughters live in Portland, Oregon.

## CLERK OF SESSION

### SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

#### Stated Session Meeting – June 18, 2019

- Session approved renaming the Interface-Samaritan building the St. Philip Mission Center.
- Session approved in substance the relocation of the office of the Presbytery of New Covenant to the St. Philip Mission Center; authorized representatives of the property committee to finalize the terms of the lease; and authorized the lease to be signed by at least two St. Philip Trustees.
- Session acknowledged with gratitude the staff and Property Committee for the extra efforts and time devoted to get the church in the position it is in to make the decisions on near-term and future use of the St. Philip Mission Center building.
- Session approved celebrating the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper at each of the 9:00 a.m. worship services during the months of July and August in 2019.
- Session authorized having a fund-raising letter for the Music at St. Philip (MASP) program be written by Randall Swanson and Matthew Dirst, and having it issued to selected known supporters.
- Session approved updates to the Peacemaking and Social Justice section of the St. Philip Manual of Operations.
- Session elected Lee Ardell and Cathy Patterson to serve as ruling elder commissioners to the stated meeting of Presbytery of New Covenant on Saturday, July 20, 2019 at First Presbyterian Church, Brenham, with David Durham and John Lemen to serve as alternates. They will join Chuck Seidel, Bonnie Moore, Janet Hess, and Selena Brinegar who were elected, previously.
- Session endorsed Fiona Murphy to represent St. Philip on the PYCC (Presbytery Youth Connection Council) leadership.

#### Committee and Council Actions:

- Property Committee has approved payment of property insurance to maintain current coverage.
- Property Committee has approved the proposal from Earth Care/Peacemaking & Social Justice to add a bicycle rack near the Gathering Area.
- Property Committee has approved the placement of the Earth Care Certificate in the Gathering Area hallway alcove.
- Worship and Music Committee has approved surveying the Congregation to determine overall interest in the Children's Music Program as well as to discover what activities parents/families are willing to support.

## SPIRITUAL PILGRIMAGE TO MONTREAT

This summer, Senior High students at St. Philip are going to Montreat for the Senior High Youth Conference from **July 19-29**. The Conference is **July 21-27**, and the extra days are for driving to and from Montreat, during which time we will complete a Spiritual Pilgrimage through the South.

We are embarking on a Spiritual Pilgrimage through the South to teach youth about the sinful history of racial oppression in our nation; to study the brave individuals and congregations who furthered the Civil Rights movement as an expression of their Christian faith; and to pursue the work of reconciliation and repentance that God is still calling forth from the Church.

To accomplish this, we will combine prayer, education, and conversation around "holy sites" of the South which have played a role in the Civil Rights movement. Our goal is to empower youth to be active participants in racial reconciliation efforts in the United States, and especially, catalysts for this conversation and work in the Church.

### On our trip, we plan to visit the following places:

Baton Rouge: the Whitney Plantation

Montgomery: National Memorial for Peace and Justice, a new national monument honoring victims of lynching; From Slavery to Mass Encarceration

Memphis: National Civil Rights Museum at the Lorraine Motel where Dr. King was assassinated

Little Rock: Central High School, where the students known as the Little Rock 9 attended and became the face of integration

In addition to these destinations, we are gathering a collection of readings, videos, music, sermons, and poetry by civil rights leaders, artists, pastors, and peacemakers for reflection. Beyond the pilgrimage, there will be an expectation that our group share with the wider church the ways in which this experience has transformed them, allowing them to deepen their leadership skills in the church and strengthen their sense that they can effect change. Upon their return, youth will share their experiences through leading a presentation and serving in worship to lift up their experiences with gratitude for the congregation. 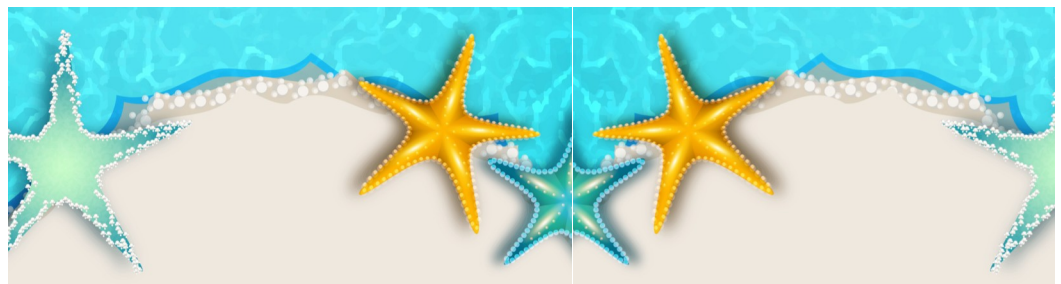


#### Liturgist Camp

The Mission Committee is pleased to share the news that the June Communion offering totaled \$1,486.00. We thought you would enjoy seeing ways in which your generous donations were used.

- 60% of the offering money (\$891.60) was sent to PC(USA) for its Special Offering. This donation unites us in a church-wide effort to support young people in Christ and inspire them to share their faith, ideas, and unique gifts with the church and the world.
- 40% of the offering money (\$594.60) was sent to Mo-Ranch for its Camp in the Valley program. ### VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES WITH CCSC BACK TO SCHOOL!

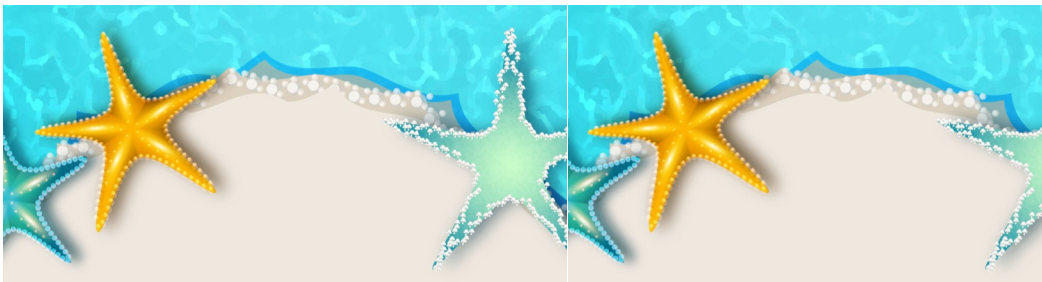
