Here at SPPC, we're getting back into our schedule, including coffee hour fellowship, coming soon, using fairly traded coffee from Equal Exchange.

Fellowship is important for building community; it brings us the opportunity to spend time together in the afterglow of worship. It also affords us the opportunity to build community with our neighbors across the world, by enjoying a cup of fairly traded coffee, tea or cocoa grown by small farmer communities and brought to us by Equal Exchange. This has been sorely missed during the pandemic!

And it is also time for our **Summer Coffee Sale**, which will be hybrid, with on-line ordering through **July 30** and in-person sales and order pick up on **Sunday, August 15** after the early service thru late service coffee hour. A limited number of chocolate bars will be available only on **August 15**. Chocolate minis are on summer vacation and will be back in late fall.

We are looking forward to our traditional "Iced Tea and Biscotti" fellowship with you soon.

Why do we purchase our coffee from Equal Exchange?

*Equal Exchange purchases coffee, tea, cocoa beans and other crops from forty communities in twenty countries. They pay a stable, above-market price; they purchase in advance of harvest (when farmers need the money) and collaborate, over the long term, in the sustainable development and empowerment of their partner communities. They sell their products through grocery stores and cafes, and through partnerships with a dozen religious denominations.*

*In buying fairly traded coffee you are collaborating with the people of Central America to build safe, stable, prosperous societies on our borders, to trade with us on a more equal footing, and to have the means to stay home with their families, which most of them want to do in the first place.*

What does this have to do with church?

*A lawyer asks Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life. Jesus asks him what is written in the law. Replies the lawyer: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." Jesus tells the lawyer he got it right. "And who is my neighbor?" says the lawyer. Jesus replies with the parable of the Good Samaritan: A man is robbed, beaten and left for dead on the road to Jericho. A priest and a prominent citizen of his own community both see him and cross the road to avoid getting involved. But a Samaritan, a foreigner, a member of a despised community, stops and cares for the victim. So who was the real neighbor? asks Jesus. "The one who showed him mercy" replies the lawyer. "Go and do likewise." says Jesus. (Luke 10:25-37)*

## AUGUST COMMUNION OFFERING

Our communion offering in August will benefit the students of Liberty High School, an HISD school for recent immigrant and refugee teens and young adults. Liberty is the only school of its kind in Texas, helping newly-arrived immigrant students, who balance work and family responsibilities, to earn a high school diploma. St. Philip has partnered with Liberty High for about four years, providing support and encouragement to the students, who are all English language learners. The August offering will go toward an "Angel Fund" at St. Philip, through which we can meet immediate or unanticipated needs. For instance, last fall, with classes all online due to the pandemic, mission committee was able to quickly provide several sets of noise-canceling headphones to the school; these were distributed to students so that they could learn online with less distraction. In late January, when we learned that many students had no jackets, we purchased "hoodie" sweatshirts and jackets for those in need.
