LENTEN VOLUNTEER OFFERING CARDS UPDATE!

During this season of Lent, the Mission Committee is inviting everyone to focus on reaching out to others rather than personally giving something up. We want to raise the awareness of how members of the St. Philip community give of their time and gifts to others. Each week please complete the lavender card that is in the pews and place it into the offering plate as part of your gift. Some may volunteer at the church (office volunteer, choir member, committee member, etc.) while others volunteer at various organizations around town. As a Mission Committee, we hope to focus our financial commitments where our members are focusing their gifts of time and talent. Watch for a weekly report!

During the third week of Lent, 35 volunteers reported over 201.5 hours of service!

Thirty-nine hours were reported from volunteers serving St. Philip. In addition to choir practices and singing on Sunday mornings, others reported working in the church office, preparing and teaching as a Confirmation Partner or Sunday School teacher, attending men's fellowship, planting the St. Philip garden, repairing the water system, receiving shipments for Kids Against Hunger and taking pictures for the St. Philip directory.

162.5 hours were offered at organizations, schools or at home. Activities included: Board meetings for Brazos Presbyterian Homes, sewing quilts for homeless children, teaching Old Testament to 10th graders, volunteering at CCSC emergency service, food pantry, and food fair; greeting at Amazing Place, tutoring 1st and 2nd graders through the HUGS program, helping with teacher projects at Piney Point Elementary, Board meeting for United Campus Ministries, welcoming a refugee family to Houston, crocheting plarn mats for the homeless, tutoring 2nd graders at Housman Elementary, preparing for Mo Ranch retreat, gathering & sorting items for the Women's Home Easter boxes, mentoring at FC2 Success, preparing for the PW retreat, working on Mission Committee business, working on the APCE national conference, and spending time with a grieving friend.

We know that many unreported acts of service are also happening in our midst. Thank you, members and friends of St. Philip. You are truly a congregation who makes a difference in this world!

MY ST. PHILIP

Dear Friends,

I am looking forward to my seventh Holy Week and Easter at St. Philip. In a variety of styles and through a range of emotions, this season invites us to experience the fullness of the gospel. I urge you to seek the spiritual benefits of these days and these services through your participation in all that is before us.

Palm Sunday is March 25. We will worship as usual at 8:30 and 11:00. The 11:00 service includes a children’s procession of palms. At the 3:00 that afternoon, we also have an opportunity to gather with the presbytery for worship in our sanctuary to celebrate the ordination of Jim DeMent to the Ministry of Word and Sacrament. On **Maundy Thursday**, March 29, we worship at 7:00. We remember Jesus’ final night with his disciples and his last meal with them. I am preaching that evening and the St. Philip Choir will sing. After communion, the chancel is stripped of decoration, symbolizing the abandonment of Jesus by his disciples and friends. We leave the sanctuary that night in silence.

On **Good Friday** we have two worship services. At 12 noon we commemorate the death of Jesus with scripture and song and in the presence of the veiled cross. At 8:00 we are holding a Service of Tenebrae. In this dramatic service, shadows slowly gather in the room as we encounter the betrayal, denial, and abandonment that marked Jesus’ final days. With each reading, a candle is extinguished. The service concludes in darkness. We are also offering a worship opportunity on Holy Saturday at 5:00 p.m. Matthew Dirst and friends lead us in a musical meditation for Holy Week, exploring the depth and power of the Passion through music.

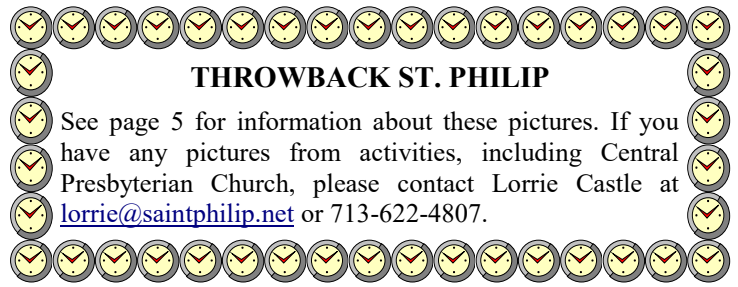
Easter Sunday is April 1, and we are doing something new! Hoping to create a little more space for people to be with us that day, we are offering festival services at 9:00 and 11:00. The services will be identical: the St. Philip Choir will sing at both; I’ll preach at both; we’ll have communion at both. If your schedule permits, consider attending the 9:00 service to help us balance the crowd with us that morning. Easter breakfast will be available in Fellowship Hall from 9:30 to 10:30, as well as crafts and activities for children. Again, we’ll have a cross outside the sanctuary for us to decorate. Please bring flowers to add to it. We expect to have our Newspring butterfly with us on the lawn in time for Easter. We also have great hope that the Harvey repair work in the sanctuary will be completed by then. This joyful day has much promise!

PEACEMAKING & SOCIAL JUSTICE

WE CHOOSE WELCOME. YES!

A small group of St. Philip's Refugee Resettlement Team welcomed our first refugee family this week. An Iraqi family of four was met by our group at Bush Intercontinental Airport and escorted to their new home, an apartment in southwest Houston. What can we say? Two car loads of luggage, food, gifts, a stocked refrigerator, two sleepy children, exhausted parents. The evening's events were an emotional and heartwarming experience for our team. We want all St. Philippians to know that we are proud to be a part of a church that promotes this activity, a milestone in our support of the PC(USA)'s "We Choose Welcome" campaign.



A RESPONSE TO RECENT MASS SHOOTINGS

A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be consoled, because they are no more. - Matthew 2:18

Sandy Hook. Orlando. Las Vegas. Sutherland Springs. Now Parkland. How do we as Presbyterians faithfully respond?

Scripture calls us to *do* the things that lead to peace (Romans 14:19). James 2:17 reminds us "faith without works is dead" — that thoughts and prayers are not enough.

The PC(USA) has addressed gun violence through many General Assemblies (the denomination's highest council) in the past 50 years, expressing the church's commitment to faith-rooted nonviolence, justice, and peace. Each resolution reflects a sense of moral urgency in response to rising gun violence and the cultural trends that have contributed to it. These resolutions have called on the church to be involved in education and advocacy at the federal, state, and community level to prevent gun violence.

In 2010, the General Assembly unanimously adopted the policy and study paper *Gun Violence, Gospel Values: Mobilizing in Response to God's Call*. That document "encourage[s] the church at every level... to become informed and active in preventing gun violence, to provide pastoral care for victims of gun violence, and to seek a spiritual response of grief and repentance, grace and courage to resist that violence and celebrate the Lord and Giver of Life." The 2010 policy

further restated the 1990 General Assembly's resolution that called on the US government to establish meaningful and effective federal legislation to regulate the importation, manufacture, sale, and possession of guns and ammunition by the public.

In the wake of the Parkland high school shootings, PC(USA) leaders are calling for action.

- ✦ The *Presbyterian Mission Agency's Office of Public Witness* director called gun violence a public health epidemic in America, and mass shootings 'a deadly pattern in American life, which we as Presbyterians must faithfully interrupt.'
- ✦ The *Faith-Based Investing* director (and staff liaison to the Committee on Mission Responsibility Through Investment), indicated that PC(USA) policy (such as a 1995 action on gun-related investments) affirmed the actions of companies such as Dick's Sporting Goods and Walmart in reducing sales of or support for automatic weapons.
- ✦ The *Compassion, Peace, and Justice Ministries* director said, "It is time to raise our voice and bear witness to the Prince of Peace, who calls us all to the task of peacemaking, healing the brokenness caused by this epidemic."

Here are some actions to make your voice heard to end gun violence.

- ✦ Contact your elected officials at the local, state, and national level.
- ✦ Connect with groups working to end gun violence, like March for Our Lives, Everytown for Gun Safety, or Moms Demand Action.
- ✦ Pray for the president and Congress as they consider ideas around gun violence.

In Luke 22:50-51, when one of Jesus' followers drew his sword (the weapon of the day) and cut off the servant's ear, Jesus answered, "No more of this!" and touched the man's ear and healed him. May we follow his example, to say "No more!" and to heal.



The Congregational Nominating Committee (CNC) is changing its season for officer nominations in order to provide a more meaningful and less hurried time for officer training.
