ST. PHILIP TO BECOME AN EARTH CARE CONGREGATION

At its March meeting, the St. Philip Session approved a proposal by the Peacemaking and Social Justice Committee to work toward becoming a certified Earth Care Congregation, a designation granted by the PC(USA) to congregations who meet sustainability goals set by the program. As the first step in the process, the Session affirmed the Earth Care Pledge (text printed below) which was signed by the Clerk.

Over the next nine months the committee will document our current efforts toward sustainability by completing the Earth Care Audit provided by the program. We will also be setting goals to increase our commitment to stewardship of God's creation.

As part of our celebration of Earth Day this Sunday, **April 22**, we will be sharing information about the PC(USA) Earth Care Program and audit, getting your ideas and feedback on St. Philip's Earth Care efforts, and signing up friends who would like to help with the effort.

Earth Care Pledge

Peace and justice is God's plan for all creation. The earth and all creation are God's. God calls us to be careful, humble stewards of this earth, and to protect and restore it for its own sake, and for the future use and enjoyment of the human family. As God offers all people the special gift of peace through Jesus Christ, and through Christ reconciles all to God, we are called to deal justly with one another and the earth.

- 1. Our **worship** and discipleship will celebrate God's grace and glory in creation and declare that God calls us to cherish, protect and restore this earth.
- 2. In **education**, we will seek learning and teaching opportunities to know and understand the threats to God's creation and the damage already inflicted. We will encourage and support each other in finding ways of keeping and healing the creation in response to God's call to earth-keeping, justice and community.
- 3. Our facilities will be managed, maintained and upgraded in a manner that respects and cherishes all creation, human and non-human, while meeting equitably the needs of all people. In our buildings and on our grounds we will use energy efficiently, conserve resources, and share what we have in abundance so that God's holy creation will be sustainable for all life and future generations.
- 4. Our **outreach** will encourage public policy and community involvement that protects and restores the vulnerable and degraded earth as well as oppressed and neglected people. We will be mindful that our personal and collective actions can positively or negatively affect our neighborhood, region, nation and world. We will seek to achieve environmental justice through coalitions and ecumenical partnerships.

STATED SESSION MEETING - MARCH 20


- Session received into membership Sally DeMent by letter of transfer from Presbytery of New Covenant.
- Session approved the transfer of membership letters of Randy and Cathy Steward to San Marino Community Church (Presbyterian), San Marino, CA.
- Session approved allocating \$10,000 from the Technology Fund for the Sanctuary video project.
- Session approved changing the name of the Communications Committee to Communications and Technology.
- Session approved the May recipient of the Communion Offerings be Christian Community Service Center (CCSC).
- Session approved allocation of the 2018 Mission budget totaling \$162,740, which included five new Mission Partners. Mission Committee had evaluated thirty-two applications that had requested a total of \$227,516. Separately from this allocation, \$45,000 will go to Presbytery of New Covenant.
- Session approved the Earth Care Pledge (You can read this on page 1.)

- Communications Committee has approved advertisement in the Presbyterian Outlook General Assembly issue.
- † Fellowship Committee (Amye Webster) has signed as "beneficiary" on behalf of St. Philip for Nicholas Arlinghaus' Eagle Scout project proposal to Boy Scouts of America, Sam Houston Area Council. Nicholas plans to renovate the storage closet in the Fellowship Hall so that it can function as both a better storage area and can become a location for preparing beverages for use at church functions (lemonade, tea, coffee, etc.).
- Property Committee has approved proceeding with a proposed study that Ed Hess had received from Reserve Advisors to forecast the church's future Reserve for Replacement needs.

SPPC VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR INTERFAITH MINISTRIES (IM) OPERATION IMPACT JUNE 2

In preparation of hurricane season, Interfaith Ministries (IM) Meals-On-Wheels program needs volunteer groups to deliver

shelf-stable meals and bottled water to all of their 4,000 homebound seniors in our community. These seniors are unable to prepare for disasters due to mobility issues. IM wants to make sure their homebound seniors are prepared with a week's worth of food and clean water in cases drivers cannot reach them due to a weather



Please be part of "Team St. Philip!" We need about 60 volunteers for our St. Philip team to meet our goal of delivering to 120 seniors. On the morning of **June 2**, a team of volunteers will retrieve the supplies and bring them to St. Philip.

At that time, teams of volunteers will then deliver to our assigned seniors. You will deliver a five-pack of shelf stable meals (a small box) as well as a case of water.

JOHN BLOW CLEARING HOUSE

The Clearing House is the place to bring all discards: books, clothing, household items, anything and everything, excluding furniture and computers. These items will be passed on to various agencies that are supported by our church. These include Christian Community Service Center, The Women's Home, SEARCH, and House of Tiny Treasures.

The Clearing House is located in the stand-alone brick building by the staff parking lot. It is open on Sundays from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. During the week the key is available in the Front Office.

John Blow was a member of St. Philip many years ago, Janet Davis recalls. John may not have started the Clearing House, but he managed it for many years in a small shed. Once the classrooms were added, the current building went unused, so John and others proposed to use it for the Clearing House and soon handed the reins over to Mrs. Davis. Eventually, upon John's death the church named it the John Blow Clearing House.

Many, many thanks to Don & Janet Davis, Tom Lewis and Paul Pennington for their great help with the Clearing House these days.

Amazing Place is welcoming



students this summer to participate in our STARS Program (Student Training in Alzheimer's & Respite). The program will once again include 20-25 young adults, ages 16-22, who will be specially trained to interact in various programs with our

participants. Last year our STARS provided over 1000 hours of volunteer time, and three students put in more than 100 hours each! We ask for a commitment from each student of at least 30 hours over the course of the summer. Students who are interested in the program need to fill out volunteer applications as soon as possible (the program fills quickly) but no later than May 1. We will hold a training session and students are required to attend prior to beginning to volunteer. That is tentatively scheduled for **June 1.**. Once trained, our student volunteers sign up online for at least ten three-hour shifts throughout the summer. Shifts are currently Monday – Friday 9 a.m.-12 p.m. and 1p.m.-4 p.m.

The youth and enthusiasm that our students bring infuse our building with renewed energy and joy. We look so forward to summertime!

The Gershenson Lecture was established to honor Elliot Gershenson, President Emeritus of Interfaith Ministries for Greater Houston. Focusing on topics of religion, ethics, and peace, these lectures have, at their core, the mission of educating, inspiring, and providing a platform for understanding.



A sought after-speaker, Imam Hendi is the Muslim chaplain at Georgetown University, the first American university to hire a full-time Muslim chaplain. Imam Hendi has presented a multitude of interfaith and general lectures in the United States, Asia, Africa, Europe, Central Asia, Eastern Europe, Australia and the Middle East over the past 14 years, including more than 62 countries and 45 US states. Imam Hendi's undergraduate and graduate education are in Islamic Studies and comparative religions with interest in inter-religious dialogue and relations. In 2012. Imam Hendi was named as one of the world's 500 most influential Muslims for his work as an interfaith dialogue activist and trainer. His presentation will focus on the importance of dialogue as a way of fostering respect and understanding and challenging stereotypes and prejudice.
