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

In early March, Committee members and St. Philip friends greeted the family at the airport, brought them to their new apartment home, and began forming fast friendships with the parents and their two young children. The months since have seen trips to obtain drivers licenses, gifts of bicycles (and helmets!) for the whole family, shared meals and shopping trips, an outing to the Houston Zoo, summer English-language tutoring, and even a visit to tour the St. Philip campus and meet pastoral and office staff members.

Now we rejoice with the family as they move on to new employment in Midland and the blessings of independence and financial security as they continue their new life in the U.S. Please join us in celebration!

Dear Friends,

As a new school year begins, summer slips away. While St. Philip, like many places, moves at a slower pace in the summer, many good things have been happening among us:

- At the beginning of June, we were the presenting sponsor for Operation Impact, a program of Interfaith Ministries that delivered 20,000 shelf-stable meals to 4000 senior adults. In addition to sponsoring this program with money from our Harvey relief fund, we had scores of volunteers from St. Philip participate in the deliveries, making it one of our largest hands-on mission projects.
- Also in June our annual Mo-Ranch retreat gathered us in the Hill Country. John Williams, chaplain at Austin College, led us with grace, wisdom, and good humor.
- At the very end of June our Summer VBS presented a day of learning activities based on the story of creation in Genesis.
- We had a mini-season of baptism in July as both Alexa Rebecca Stevenson and Cohen May Carlin were initiated into the church through the waters of faith.
- Also in July many St. Philip members gathered with concern about immigrations policies, including the detention of children. In addition to various activities of education and advocacy, a substantial number of items were donated to support children and families in these difficult circumstances.
- I taught a five-week course in July and August called "Summer Basics." In the class, we reminded ourselves of the scope and sweep of the Bible and took a closer look at our worship practices, including the nature of the lectionary and the shape of the church year. For one of the sessions, I did a fashion show presentation of my liturgical stoles.
- August 1 marked the fifth anniversary of Keatan King's ministry among us. We celebrated with a cake reception on August 5.

- Also in August we completed the purchase of the concert grand Steinway piano that is in the Sanctuary. A variety of circumstances brought that instrument to us in a temporary way in April. Several generous donors from our community made it possible for us to acquire it permanently. I'm grateful for the way this piano enhances our musical life.
- Speaking of music, our summer organ concert series has brought some remarkable players to us. The final concert in the series is August 26.
- Our community garden has yielded another bumper crop of vegetables, which have been shared with area food pantries. Our mission outreach has also been extended through Kids Against Hunger packing sessions and folks helping with back to school projects sponsored by Christian Community Service Center.
- Our Summer Lecture Series last weekend brought to us Shannon Craigo-Snell, professor of theology at Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary. Her presentations on structural racism were provocative and challenging, and her Sunday sermon invited us to let go of things that don't really matter, even as we hold fast to the promise of the gospel.

It's been a full summer! We look to cap it off August 26 with our Harvey Commemoration Sunday, which includes a pot-luck breakfast and a single worship service at 11:00. Sunday's service will also include the annual "Blessing of the Backpacks." In all of these things, things past and things yet to come, I give thanks for God's presence within the community of St. Philip.

SEARCH SCATTERED HOUSING

June 22— Newly housed people lose their “street family”, so in order to support the newly housed, SEARCH hosts a group in remote housing once a month for a check-in with their counselors. As part of this, congregations are invited to act as hosts. On June 22, St. Philip volunteers, Mary McGuire, Ada Fuller and Mary Ann Thomas, served what ended up being over 30 people. We supplied red beans, fruit, rolls and drinks for what was expected to be 25 people; there were no leftovers. As Ada remarked, it was a “loaves and fishes” moment. We used the St. Philip bingo game (a professional game according to SEARCH social workers) usually used at Mo Ranch, but this group was far less restrained than ours. There were calls for “come on, Lord, B-4” and “praise Jesus, I-29” and other variety of praises. There were lively thanks for the gift bags for the winners. And candy was shared with everyone as the ages of the clients ranged from six month old to people much older.

Homelessness affects all ages and most newly re-housed experience difficulty staying stable in housing. Hosting of these meetings is a simple act and very welcomed. This volunteer outreach takes very little time, but St. Philip has been asked to come back again with our “professional bingo game”. EAGLE SCOUT

(...to help others at all times...)

The Fellowship Committee has recently relocated their entertainment supplies that are used for picnics, BBQ, annual meeting and any other special event they might do on campus to a renovated area in Fellowship Hall instead of another area of the church. They have Nicholas Arlinghaus to thank for this. Nick, who is entering his senior year in high school, has been involved with Boy Scouts of America for twelve years. He will be able to say he has achieved the rank of Eagle, a goal he has pursued for two-thirds of his life at this point!




Do you know any Eagle Scouts? Are you aware of the involvement to achieve this honor? Nick was required to choose an Eagle project that contributed to a person or group outside of scouting. Signatures of approval had to be obtained from the project beneficiary, the Scoutmaster (the adult leader of the troop), the troop committee, and a district official before the project could truly begin.

“The fact that I’ve been a part of this church for so long is what made me consider doing my project for St. Philip,” commented Nick. “I first asked Pastor Keatan if anything needed to be renovated or improved in or around the church. She showed me the old shower room in the Fellowship Hall and said the Fellowship Committee wanted to use it as a storeroom, at which point I decided that clearing the room would be my project.”



The project involved the removal of the room's sinks, cabinets, mirror, shower stalls, and dividing walls, as well as painting the remaining walls with primer. Since this was obviously a gigantic job that he couldn't do alone, Nick recruited other scouts, as well as the following St.

Philippians who assisted at various stages: Chuck Johnson, Steve Carmichael, Wilbert Parada, Ed Hess, Greg Han, Caleb Han, Gabriel Han, Keatan King, Tamara Arlinghaus, Sasha Arlinghaus, Ava Arlinghaus, Paul Arlinghaus, Joseph Webster, John Webster, and Amy Webster. The planning and preparation took half a year, but the project itself was done in a day. From his service log: a total of 165 total hours across thirty-three people.



“This project involved many facets,” remarked Chuck Johnson. “There were professional plumbers who needed to prep the area by capping off water sources. In addition, it had to be determined if

the interior wall was load-bearing. Was there asbestos that would be disturbed? Contingencies had to be made for these and other unknowns. Nick had a list of all of these and the suggested solutions. Nick scheduled info-gathering meetings

prior to the work day in order to answer as many of the questions as possible. These meetings included Wilbert, Steve, Ed Hess, Paul Arlinghaus and myself.



“On the day of the project, Nick had to function as the foreman on the job. This meant that he could not spend a lot of time "doing" when most of his time was spent "herding". He handled it with calm and grace. A special fun moment occurred when Nick observed one of the scouts working on the area behind the sinks. The scout was not wearing a hard hat. Nick pointed that out to the scout and asked him “to put on the hard hat”. The scout did not respond right away. Nick waited a few seconds and repeated, “I mean put the hat on now.” The scout responded. And so went the rest of the day. Nick stayed on top of things.”



When asked what it meant to him to achieve Eagle Scout and how it would help him in the future, Nick replied, “Being an Eagle Scout actually makes it easier to get into colleges, considering the amount of work put into reaching the rank. A college application with "Eagle Scout" on it will generally have a good chance of being accepted. I plan to enroll in A&M Galveston and earn a degree in marine biology, and becoming an Eagle Scout will help me get to the enrolling part. This project has taught me a lot about planning, coordination, and leadership. It certainly is quite different from simply participating in another scout's Eagle project.”

Nick, with his father Paul in tow on a few of them, has taken some very exciting scouting trips. Asked if any of those topped being an Eagle Scout, he responded, “The only campout that can rival the long climb up the ranks to Eagle would be Philmont. A 100-mile trek through mountainous New Mexican terrain is quite the experience.”

“Nick has worked hard on this achievement and over a number of years. It has been special watching him develop from a boy to a young man during this time, and Boy Scouts has been a large part of that. I helped along the way, but it was up to him - he made it happen,” his father Paul remarked. “Tamara and I are incredibly proud of Nicholas. When Nick earned his first rank, Tiger Cub, at age seven he looked up at me and asked, ‘Dad, how long until I make Eagle?’ I told him, ‘Well, Nicholas, it will take some time, but I’ll be there to support you the whole way’.” Nick is the first Eagle Scout in Paul or Tamara’s families.

The Fellowship Committee is grateful to have been the recipient of the hard work put into Nick's Eagle project. He did a great job with all aspects of the project and deserves a hearty congratulations and thank you for a job well done! Thank you, Nicholas, for choosing to contribute to St. Philip for your Eagle Scout project.
