
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WELCOME NEW MEMBERS

The Session has called a congregational meeting for **April 9**, immediately following the 11:00 worship service. The purpose of the meeting is to hear and act upon a report from the Designated Associate Pastor Nominating Committee. 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Dear Friends,

I am looking forward to my sixth Holy Week and Easter at St. Philip. **Palm Sunday** is **April 9**. We will worship as usual at 8:30 and 11:00. The 11:00 service includes a children's procession of palms. At the center of both services is a choral reading of the Passion story as recorded in the Gospel of Matthew. We will have a variety of readers, and the congregation will take on the part of "the crowd." On **Maundy Thursday**, **April 13**, we worship at 7:00. We remember Jesus' final night with his disciples and his last meal with them. I am preaching that evening, and the St. Philip Choir will sing. After communion, the chancel is stripped of decoration, symbolizing the abandonment of Jesus by his disciples and friends. We leave the sanctuary that night in silence.

On **Good Friday** we have two worship services. At 12:00 noon we commemorate the death of Jesus with scripture and song and in the presence of the veiled cross. At 8:00 we are holding a Service of Tenebrae. In this dramatic service, shadows slowly gather in the room as we encounter the betrayal, denial, and abandonment that marked Jesus' final days. With each reading, a candle is extinguished. The service concludes in darkness. We are also offering a worship opportunity on Holy Saturday at 5:00 p.m. Matthew Dirst and friends lead us in a musical meditation for Holy Week, exploring the depth and power of the Passion through music.

Easter Sunday is April 16. Our first service of Easter at 8:30 has us gather in the narthex and then proceed by candlelight into the dark sanctuary, which is then bathed in the light of the proclamation of resurrection. We then attend to key passages of the Bible, remembering God's saving acts, from the beginning of creation to the promise of a new creation. After the service of readings, we have a reaffirmation of baptism, and all are invited to come forward to the fount. There we mark our foreheads with water, hearing again the promise that in Jesus Christ we belong to God forever. In between services, there is breakfast in Fellowship Hall along with Easter crafts and activities for all. We ask you to bring flowers to decorate the cross in celebration of the resurrection. Our 11:00 festival service of Easter includes music from the St. Philip Choir, a sermon from Keatan, confirmation and communion. We celebrate with joy as we take the bread and share the cup and bear witness to God's love, a love stronger than death.

In a variety of styles and through a range of emotions, Holy Week invites us to experience the fullness of the gospel. I urge you to seek the spiritual benefits of these days and these services through your participation in all that is before us. Faithfully yours,

Less than 1% of Easter chocolate comes from Fair Trade sources that are free from human trafficking and exploitation. After Halloween, Easter is the second most important occasion for chocolate sales, and each year Americans consume over 70 million pounds of chocolate the week leading up to Easter. However, much less than 1% of that chocolate is fairly traded, which Equal Exchange seeks to change.

Equal Exchange's products are 100% Fair Trade traded, benefiting more than 40 small farmer co-operatives in 25 countries around the world.

The Coffee Team will be offering Chocolate Minis in Easter packets of 10, and chocolate bars, along with coffee, tea and olive oil, on Palm Sunday, **April 9**, in the Gathering Area before and after the 11 a.m. worship service.

All chocolate is made with cacao from small-scale farmers in the Dominican Republic and Peru, organic sugar from a co-op in Paraguay, and fairly traded vanilla from a farmers' association in Madagascar.

Please consider this opportunity to support our brothers and sisters farming sustainably around the globe.

Stated Session Meeting – March 21st

- Session approved giving each confirmand a leather-bound New Revised Standard Version (NRSV) Bible on confirmation Sunday, **April 16**.
- Session approved the 2017 Communion Offering recipients for May through December.
- Session approved the allocation of 2017 Mission Committee budget.
- Session endorsed the Salaam Supper to be hosted on **April 27** by the Peacemaking and Social Justice Committee, and approved the inclusion of a fundraiser to benefit Refugee Servicers of Texas.
- Session called a Congregational Meeting on Sunday, **April 9** following the 11:00 a.m. Service of Worship, for the purpose to hear and act on a report of the Designated Associate Pastor Nominating Committee.

Committee and Council Actions:

- Central Mission Endowment Council has granted up to \$13,000.00 to fund the Youth Spiritual Pilgrimage to Montreat.
- Education Committee has approved a request from Ruthie Waldrop to host the Gulf Coast Godly Play Network at St. Philip on Saturday, March 25 from 8:30 a.m. to 2 p.m.
- Education Committee has decided to send out an electronic survey to church families concerning updating our playground to determine interest, usage and hopes for that space in the years to come; a task force with members from Education Committee and the congregation at large will be created to look into ways to best use our time and money to make this space functional and appealing to church and community members.
- Peacemaking and Social Justice Committee has approved the goal of adopting of a refugee family by the St. Philip's congregation by the end of 2018.
- Peacemaking and Social Justice Committee has agreed to host a Salaam Supper at St. Philip on Thursday, **April 27**; the purpose of which is both to educate about refugees and raise funds for the efforts of Refugee Services of Texas.
- Property Committee has approved a request for \$2,200 \$2,500 to purchase mulch and seasonal flowers.
- Property Committee has authorized up to \$750 for the project to make cushions for the short pews.
