SALAAM SUPPER: A SUCCESS!

Two weeks ago St. Philip responded to a request for support from Refugee Services of Texas (RST). Sponsored by the Peacemaking & Social Justice Committee a Salaam Supper was held,

the purpose being to hear fact-based information about refugee resettlement here in Houston and to introduce church members and others to the work of this organization, one of several engaged in this humanitarian situation. The guests were very generous and contributed \$1,750 for the people they serve and will be matched by the Diesslin Foundation.

Two years ago, alarmed and concerned about the plight of refugees, many of whom are Muslim, the P&SJ Committee began to study the refugee crisis. In recent months the situation has worsened. Today the Committee is even more committed to exploring ways that our church can get involved in a meaningful way, even to the extent of supporting a refugee family.




A closer involvement with RST is one of several "first steps" now being taken. Hosting the Salaam Supper provided the opportunity for more than 50 St. Philippians and others to hear from RST speakers, one of whom is a Somalian refugee, now serving on the RST staff in job training and mentoring.

With this Supper we have made a good start toward connecting St. Philip with refugee assistance. Other collaborative activities are being planned. As one member of the committee reminded us: "I believe we have planted a seed and now we have to nurture it. That's our next step."

More information will be forthcoming as committee plans develop. ST. PHILIP VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR OPERATION IMPACT

In preparation of hurricane season, Interfaith Ministries (IM) Meals-On-Wheels program needs volunteer groups to deliver shelf-stable meals and bottled water to all of their 4,000 homebound seniors in our community. These seniors are unable to prepare for disasters due to mobility issues. IM wants to make sure their homebound seniors are prepared with a week's worth of food and clean water.



About 30+ volunteers are needed for a St. Philip team which will be assigned 100 seniors. Three or four volunteers who drive large SUVs or trucks are needed to pick up the meals and bottled water for 50 seniors on Saturday, **June 3** and bring the supplies back to St. Philip. Other volunteers will be assigned the names, addresses, and route schedules of their assigned seniors. The volunteer can deliver the food and water on **June 3**; however, the volunteers have until **June 6** to make their deliveries. The more people who volunteer, the fewer deliveries each has to make.

Greg Han is in charge of getting people to sign up. He would love to have 25 delivery teams this year. You can sign up every **Sunday** in **May** in the Gathering Area. You can also sign up by emailing Greg at ghan@imgh.org This is a one-time volunteer opportunity that the Mission Committee hopes you will respond to.

CHURCH & SOCIETY - Room 201- May 21 - Raise the Age - Juvenile Justice in Texas - Texas is one of only nine states that sets the age of adulthood at seventeen. Because seventeenyear-olds are handled in the adult criminal justice system, they do not have the right to the rehabilitative services or legal protections provided by the juvenile justice system - including anger management, counseling, cognitive behavioral therapy, education, family preservation, gang prevention/intervention, life skills, substance abuse prevention/intervention, and vocational skills. Building stronger families, safer communities, and a brighter future for Texas is the mission of the Public Policy Center - Texas Criminal Justice Coalition. This will be presented by Jay Jenkins, Texas Criminal Justice Coalition Project Attorney in Harris County (Houston) to promote broader criminal justice reform. May 28 - The Martian - At the Movies with Kate Burkart - Watch the movie or read the book and then travel to Mars, where "Help is only 140 million miles away" with Kate leading us in seeing her theological perspective on The Martian.
