COLLECTING ITEMS FOR CHRISTMAS BOXES

The Seafarer's Christmas Box program is a mission of the Houston International Seafarer's Center, located at the Port of Houston. Congregations from the Houston area pack personal items that sailors use every day in empty shoe boxes and wrap them with Christmas paper. The boxes are delivered to the Seafarer's Center, then personally taken to the ships by the Port Chaplains. In 2016, 11,876 wrapped boxes were delivered to over 500 ships. Members of these crews traveled from 65 different countries. The seafarers greatly cherish these gifts. Sometimes on board the ships for many months at a time, away from their families, a personal touch of a gift is so important to these sailors. Your donations of the items listed below will help to ease the loneliness and let them know that they are cared for. The items will be packed after Thanksgiving (date TBA), by the loving hands of St. Philip members. Collection boxes will be in the Gathering Area and in the church office for donations.

Dear Friends,

The summer season is upon us. There wil be much coming and going with the St. Philip community. This month I'm especially looking forward to participating in the Worship and Music Conference sponsored by the Presbyterian Association of Musicians (PAM) at the Montreat Conference Center n North Carolina. This is an annual conference that brings together over a thousand adults, youth, and children to explore and develop gifts for music and worship. The day is filled with services and rehearsals, workshops and lectures. The conference has two sessions, each a week long.

The conference director is David Eicher, who was the editor for our new *Glory to God* hymnal and who led a hymn festival at St. Philip in 2012. Other faculty members include Jane Bentley, who is leading our St. Philip Mo-Ranch retreat this week. I am the conference preacher. My responsibilities include preaching every day, Sunday through Friday, then repeating those sermons the second week. I'll also participate in the worship reflections panel and lead a preaching seminar. The conference theme is "Then Sings My Soul," which is drawn from the hymn, "How Great Thou Art." Our thematic scripture passage is from Romans 8 and the affirmation that nothing can separate us from God's love. Each of the services in the week seeks to explore different aspects of this promise:

We begin Sunday night with an Advent service centered on the love of God enfleshed in a child whose very name, Emmanuel, is a proclamation of good news: God is with us. The sermon text is Matthew 1:18-25.

On Monday, we celebrate God's claim on our lives, vividly and decisively demonstrated in the waters of baptism. Through water and the Holy Spirit, God has called us by name and united us with the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The sermon text is Isaiah 43:1-7.

We journey on the road to Emmaus on Tuesday (Luke 24:13-35), discovering the companionship of Christ in places we least expected to find it. The promise of Easter is that Christ is with us, always.

On Wednesday, we lift our eyes to the future God is preparing when all will be right and all will be well. In that time, God will be close enough to dry every tear. Suffering will be no more. Death will be no more. The heavens and the earth will be renewed. The sermon text is Revelation 21:1-6.

Worship on Thursday acknowledges that as we wait for the fullness of God's redemption, pain and sorrow remain regular features of life. Yet even as we walk through the valley of the shadow of death, God is with us, tending us like a shepherd and reminding us that nothing can separate us from the love of God in Jesus Christ. In this sermon, I reflect on the conference theme passage, Romans 8:31-39.

Our week of worship concludes Friday with the charge Jesus has given us to make disciples of all nations, to share the gospel in word and deed and to bear witness to God's saving love (Matthew 28:16-20). It is the joyful work of ministry that we share with one another. As we receive this great commission, we also receive the great promise of our Lord, "I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Session One begins Sunday, **June 18**. Session Two concludes Friday, **June 30**. If you'd like to see more of what the conference is about, visit http://presbymusic.org/montreat.html. As a participant and occasionally as a faculty member, I've been involved with PAM conferences for some fifteen years and have gained much from them in terms of my understanding of worship and my practice of worship leadership. I expect that learning will continue at Montreat this summer – and, I suspect, at least some of it will find its way back to St. Philip!


WELCOMING VISITORS

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Dear Friends.

What a time it has been! As I sit in my office and reflect on the past two weeks, I smile with great joy and deep gratitude for the opportunities I have had to worship and celebrate with two very special communities, Gates Presbyterian Church in Rochester, NY and St. Philip.

On Sunday, May 28, I was ordained to the Ministry of Word and Sacrament at Gates, the church where I was baptized as an infant, confirmed as a teen, and shaped and cared for in so many ways over the last thirty-two years. Participating in that service were the Rev. Bob Kaiser, the pastor who baptized me in 1985 (in the same sanctuary and at the same font!), the Rev. Carol Anne Strawbridge, the associate pastor who shepherded me through Confirmation and led youth ministry during my formative years at Gates, and the Rev. John Wurster, the pastor with whom I now serve. Other participants in the service of ordination included those currently serving in the Presbytery of Genesee Valley; members and liaisons to the Committee on Preparation for Ministry, the Stated Clerk and the Presbytery's Moderator; other worship leaders included a former youth group advisor, friends from Harvard Divinity School, a choir mate from high school and Greg. Elder Tom Ward, who presented me with a stole on behalf of the congregation, participated in the Commission, as well. Ever since my first experience "preaching" in 1999, Tom has called me "Reverend Omar."

It was an absolutely wonderful afternoon. The sanctuary that has been for me a place of spiritual nourishment for decades was filled with so many loved ones traveling from near and far, a beloved community which was a source of great joy and love that day. My parents and siblings were there, my godparents, Sunday School teachers and youth group advisors, childhood and college friends, relatives and family friends, church family and all the saints who have cared for me and encouraged me along the journey of faith in so many ways. We sang hymns and heard anthems that have long moved me; we read scriptures that have long sustained me; we offered prayers that strengthened us all. We broke bread and shared the cup, symbols of unity, grace and love – and the spirit that filled that sanctuary was unmistakable and unforgettable. As I sat in the pew, I was able to take in so much - everything from the beloved, unique clinker bricks of that sanctuary and its massive, hanging wooden cross, to the beautiful flowers offered on the occasion to the glory of God, a special gift of my St. Philip family.

Although a week has passed, I still remember the feelings in my heart, at once full and still, as the gathered community worshipped that day through song, scripture and prayer and as I answered the Constitutional Questions. I recall the sense that I was truly being called and led. I am filled with gladness and am moved to share the feelings of love, support and belonging that were extended through the laying on of hands that afternoon.

Unfortunately, we could not sing all the hymns that I would have loved to include that day. But I am still called to share words from the song "Pass it On," from the Methodist hymnal, one I fondly remember singing as a child growing up at Gates particularly during our church family camping weekends:

'It only takes a spark to get a fire going,

And soon all those around, can warm up in its glowing.

That's how it is with God's love, once you've experienced it.

You spread God's love to everyone, you want to pass it on.'

As I begin this season of ordained ministry, with gratitude for my many years at Gates Presbyterian Church, and with a thankful heart strengthened by the all the places the journey of faith have taken me, I seek to pass along the love of God through ministry with you, my friends at St. Philip.

My friend Diana Morrow relocated to Mexico for retirement three years ago and has been helping local veterinarians each

month when they do FREE Spay and Neuter clinics for the local community. At the clinics they replace the ropes, chains and belts with a proper leash and collar when they bring in their pets. The local people have been very appreciative of the leashes and collars they have been given. The animals love it too! However, now they are in need of more collars and leashes, and we can help by sending more supplies!

OPERATION IMPACT 2017 IS COMPLETE!

Thank you to the IMpact team that helped pick up and deliver supplies the weekend of June 3 and 4. Our team efficiently picked up supplies for 74 homebound seniors, which included a case of water and a box of ready-to-eat meals for each of these seniors. A total of 50 St. Philippians, working in teams, helped to get all of these supplies delivered!

Operation IMpact is Interfaith Ministries' (IM) project that delivers clean water and shelf-stable meals to IM's 4,000 Meals-on-Wheels clients. These clients, almost all of them over 60, receive weekday meals because they are homebound and in need of a nutritious meal. For many of these clients, IM also provides breakfast and also delivers about 1,000 pounds of pet food with our Animeals on Wheels program.





Operation IMpact ensures that IM's clients have meals ready going into hurricane season in the event that weather prevents deliveries. SPIRITUAL PILGRIMAGE TO MONTREAT

This summer, Senior High students at St. Philip are going to Montreat for the Senior High Youth Conference from July 21-31, 2017. The Conference is July 23-30, and the extra days are for driving to and from Montreat, during which time we will complete a Spiritual Pilgrimage through the South, together with Sr. High youth of St. Thomas Presbyterian Church in Houston.

- Many among us are deeply concerned by a political climate of intolerance, racism, and violence that is threatening to undo so much of the progress accomplished by the Civil Rights movement. Thus, we are embarking on a Spiritual Pilgrimage through the South to teach youth about the dark history of racial oppression in the South; to study the brave individuals and congregations who furthered the Civil Rights movement as an expression of their Christian faith; and to pursue the work of reconciliation and repentance that God is still calling forth.
- To accomplish this, we will combine prayer, education, and conversation around "holy sites" of the South which have played a role in the Civil Rights movement. Our goal is to empower youth to be active participants in racial reconciliation efforts in America, and especially, catalysts for this conversation and work in the Church.
- As of now, we have some really exciting people and places incorporated into this trip! David LaMotte (singer/songwriter and peacemaker) will spend an evening with us at Montreat. Former PC(USA) Moderator Heath Rada will hold an evening conversation with us at Montreat, also! Current Co-Moderator of the PC(USA), Denise Anderson, is particularly committed to our project and wants to engage with our group because we are using some of her materials on race and the Church, a video series titled "Love an Other." Denise wants to Skype with our group before the trip to help them prepare. And on our trip, we plan to visit the following places:
 - Eaton Rouge: visit with Together Baton Rouge (a community organization fighting racial inequality) and the Whitney Plantation
 - Birmingham: the Civil Rights Institute and 16th Street Baptist Church (the church bombed in 1963)
 - Atlanta: Ebenezer Baptist Church and the King Center
 - Selma: walking the Pettus Bridge together
- In addition to these destinations we are gathering a collection of readings, videos, music, sermons, and poetry by civil rights' leaders, artists, pastors, and peacemakers for reflection. Beyond the pilgrimage, there will be an expectation that our group share with the wider church the ways in which this experience has transformed them, allowing them to deepen their leadership skills in the church and strengthen their sense that they can effect change. Upon their return, youth will share their experiences through writing for the congregation, leading presentations, and serving in worship to lift up their experiences with gratitude for the whole body at the congregational and Presbytery levels.
- To date, we have seven St. Philip youth (Eleanor Kimbro, Chelsea Chilewa, Anne Johnson, Phoebe Murphy, Margaret Fair, George White, Zack White) and two adults (Keatan King and Omar Rouchon) signed up for the trip. We have three St. Thomas youth (Braden Mwuara, Darlene Moreno, Alyssa Rossen) signed up and one adult, Rev. Jonathon Britt.


WHY A PILGRIMAGE?

"The two disciples heard [John proclaim Jesus the Lamb of God]...and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, 'What are you looking for?' They said to him, 'Rabbi, where are you staying?' Jesus said to them, 'Come and see.'" (Jn. 1:37-39)

"[When Jesus learned that Lazarus died] he said, 'Where have you laid him?' They said to him, 'Lord, come and see.' Jesus began to weep." (Jn. 11:34-35)

- Come and see. This is the invitation continuously woven through the gospel of John, which seems to be suggesting that some things can only be known through journey and witness. "Come and see" is a refrain exchanged between Jesus and disciples, the woman at the well and her neighbors, and finally, Lazarus' friends and Jesus. In this gospel, it is Jesus who first issues the invitation to "come and see" who he is, how he abides, and ultimately, what the very meaning of his life is. Eventually, it is the people Jesus seeks to cure, save, and love who return his invitation back to him at the death of Lazarus. "Lord, come and see" they say, when Jesus asks where the body of his friend rests. This is still the Church's persistent prayer: Lord, come and see. Lord, come and see our suffering. Come and see our desperation. Come and see our brokenness. And how does our Lord reply? Jesus weeps.
- Jonathon Britt, Omar Rouchon, and I share the belief of St. John; some things can only be known through journey and witness. Or as a beloved former Director of Field Education at Louisville Seminary used to say, "It is not enough to profess. We have to practice. It is not enough to talk. We have to do. It is not enough to say, "Ain't it awful." We have to get close enough to get hurt."
- On a pilgrimage, we follow Jesus' invitation to "come and see" where he dwells in our neighbor, in the broader church beyond our walls, and in our nation's history. On a pilgrimage, we pray, "Lord, come and see" and lift to him the sin and violence of the world, petitioning him for peace and new life. On a pilgrimage, we learn from one another and listen to God's Spirit which still calls us to "come and see" all that is still possible for the healing of the world.
- We will make this pilgrimage because it is our abiding hope that such a trip will profoundly transform the faith of our youth and forever shape their sense of their own discipleship and citizenship.

- Coates, Ta-Nahesi. <u>Between the World and Me</u>. Recommended by Greg Han. A series of essays confronting the notion of racism in America and how it has shaped our history.
- Desmond, Matthew. Evicted: poverty and profit in the American city.
- Dyson, Michael E. <u>Tears We Cannot Stop</u>.
- Irving, Debby. Waking Up White. The author describes her evolving awareness of her own subtle racism. This book is now the study selection of the Monday Evening Study Group.
- Noah, Timothy. The Great Divergence: America's growing inequality crisis and what we can do about it.
- Wise, Tim. White Like Me. Race and racism is explored through the lens of whiteness and white privilege.
- Wilkerson, Isobel. <u>The Warmth of Other Suns</u>. Describes the "great migration" of people struggling to live as citizens in their own country.

YOUTH FAST RESULTS

During their 30-Hour Youth Fast, the youth raised \$1,800.00 for the CCSC Food Pantry. On Friday evening, we harvested over 12 bags of produce from the community garden. On Saturday morning, we delivered the produce to the CCSC

Food Pantry and got a tour of the facility in action. Youth spent their Lock-In time fasting, praying, learning about poverty and hunger in our nation, worshipping, and serving to fight hunger. Our time was filled with educational games, Bible study, prayer, conversation, and 2 mission projects.


Session received into membership: Nancy M. Higgs by letter of transfer from Westminster Presbyterian Church, 3208

Stated Session Meeting – May 16th

- Session approved converting the present Sunday Visitor Parking Spaces to Limited Mobility Parking.
- Session returned the motion to replace the porte-cochère with a covered structure that would accommodate two vehicle lengths
 and two vehicle widths, plus height sufficient to allow vans, back to the Property Committee with a request for more specific
 cost information.
- Session affirmed the need for expanded limited mobility parking spaces and instructed the Moderator to form a task force to address the issue.
- Session approved transfers of April 2017 Property Committee expenses to Reserve for Replacement totaling \$848.80.
- Session approved allocating \$8,177 of Stewardship Committee costs for the new phone system to the Reserve for Replacement
- Session set single services of worship at 11:00 a.m. on May 14, June 4 and **June 11**.
- Session acted to extend an invitation to the Reverend Emily Owen to be guest preacher on **June 11**.
- Session retroactively approved the submittal of the Lynn Johnson Social Justice Grant proposal that was made on April 30, 2017.
- Session approved proposed revisions to the Personnel Committee Responsibilities and Personnel Policies sections of the Manual of Operations for St. Philip Presbyterian Church.
- Session endorsed Margaret Fair, Caleb Hann, and Elizabeth Junkin, to serve with Keatan King on the Presbytery of New Covenant Presbyterian Youth Connection Council (PYCC).

Committee and Council Actions:

- Property Committee has denied a building use request from another German School (2-5 years age, 9-hour, 5-day a week, school year for two rooms).
- Property Committee has approved a policy decision not to entertain requests from outside programs for use of rooms which St. Philip utilizes intermittently during the week, and has authorized Lorrie Castle to decline such requests in future without sending them to the Property Committee.
- Stewardship Committee has approved the replacement of the church's antiquated telephone system, at the lowest bid cost of \$8.177.
- Mission Committee has acted to renew membership in the Interfaith Ministries Circle, at \$250/year.
