CHURCH & SOCIETY - Room 201 - **September 25** - A Science-Religion Potpourri - Can Nature Be a Guide to Goodness? - A recent Pew Research survey revealed that religious people are actually less likely to see science and religion as being in conflict than are non-religious people. But some issues still fly under the radar of the general media. The second class in the Science-Religion Potpourri series will explore the question of whether nature -- which we come to know more and more through science -- can be a guide for morality presented by Bruce Yeager. **October 2** - Christian Ethics and Practices in the Business and Legal World presented by Keith Fletcher from Simmons and Fletcher Law Firm.

BIBLE STUDY – Room 204 – The class is engaged in a study of the book of 1 Samuel which tells of the rise of the kingdom of Israel and the eventual rise of David as their leader, revealing throughout the very human traits of the people involved in the narrative. The Bible study class utilizes the insights of a variety of scholars to expand our understanding of God's message of faithfulness to His people. Nancy Cook and Al Waldrop lead the discussions. All are welcome.

SPa—Room 200 - The SPa (Saint Philip Adults) class is a fellowship of adults from all walks of life who gather for learning and community. It is a conversation/dialogue-based/ interactive class. Many members are of the age in which family/ children obligations can take them away on Sundays. The curriculum is usually on a weekly basis or no more than a three-four week series so that all participants feel they can "jump back in" if they miss a week. SPa works hard to pray for one another and to get together outside of Sundays. In the next few classes, discussion will be about Lucas Hnath's play "The Christians." The facilitator **September 25** is Greg Hahn.



Music at St. Philip Concert Series opens the 2016-2017 season with the **Concert for Peace**, Saturday evening, **October 1**, at 7:00 p.m. The Concert for Peace takes its theme from the St. Philip Commitment to Peacemaking of 2003: "We are committed to the promise of peace ... and the work that it requires."

This annual Concert for Peace combines music, poetry, and moments of silence. The music will be provided by *Aperio* -*Music of the Americas*, with pianist Michael Zuraw, cello, and soprano. Aperio is an ensemble of local and internationally recognized musicians that showcases rarely performed music from South and North America. The concert will include works by Villa-Lobos, Copland, Barber, Piazzolla, and others.

The featured poet is **Roberto J. Tejada**, Professor at the University of Houston, and author of three poetry collections including *Full Foreground* (Arizona, 2012). Tejada's multifaceted cultural studies and creative activities have been widely recognized. His research and creative interests involve the language arts and image worlds of Latin America, especially Mexico and Brazil, the U.S.- Mexico Borderlands.

The concert takes place in the sanctuary. Admission is free. A free-will offering will be received to be shared equally between Interfaith Ministries (IM) Refugee Services and Music at St. Philip Concert Series. All are welcome.
