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Joshua Ralston, speaker for the nineteenth annual Duerr Lecture Series, Feb. 21, 22, and 23, is Lecturer in Muslim-Christian Relations at the University of Edinburgh School of Divinity. His lectures, "Bearing Witness: Reframing Christian-Muslim Encounters," will focus on ways for Christians and Muslim to encounter one another, debate our truth claims, and work for the common good. Dr. Ralston says that Christians and Muslims are both instructed by God to bear witness with our lives, prayer, and practice to the truth, mercy, and justice of God's Word. Tragically, both history and recent events have shown that the combination

of our theological differences and shared missionary impulse often lead to stereotypes, rivalry, mistrust, and even deadly violence. Is the only way to seek peace, inter-religious understanding, and justice to give up on our particular faith commitments? In his three lectures, Ralston will explore these questions by examining and reframing some of the most hotly debated issues in Christian-Muslim relations today: the clash of civilizations thesis in an age of migration, the question of Jesus, and Islamic views of Shari'a and the nation-state. Dr. Ralston will preach at both services on Sunday morning, "The Judgment of Grace," Luke 19:1-10, Psalm 32:1-7.

A fifth generation Californian, Joshua Ralston received his B.A. degree in Philosophy at Wake Forest University, the M.Th. in World Christianity at New College, University of Edinburgh, the M.Div. at Candler School of Theology, Emory University, and the Ph.D. in Theological Studies at Emory University. Currently he is a candidate for ordination in the PCUSA in the San Francisco Presbytery. Prior to his appointment at the University of Edinburgh School of Divinity, Dr. Ralston served on the faculty of Union Presbyterian Seminary, Richmond, VA, as Assistant Professor of Theology. He has also been a Visiting Faculty Member in Theology and Ethics at the ECWA Theological Seminary, Aba, Nigeria, and in Christian-Muslim Dialogue at the Evangelical Theological Seminary of Cairo, Egypt. Ralston has published many Peer-Reviewed Essays and has given academic papers and presentations at national and international conferences. In addition, Dr. Ralston has a book, *Law and the Rule of God: A Christian-Muslim Exchange*, forthcoming later in 2016.

Dr. Ralston is married and has two young daughters. He loves traveling and learning new cultures, foods, and local politics. He and his wife have lived in Atlanta, Cairo, Jerusalem, Ramallah, Richmond (VA), and now in Edinburgh. He loves the San Francisco Giants and the Golden State Warriors... he says an escapist fantasy is to be a baseball general manager.

This year's lectures are co-sponsored with the Boniuk Institute for the Study and Advancement of Religious Tolerance, founded at Rice University in 2013 with a generous gift from Houston philanthropists Dr. Milton and Laurie Boniuk. The Institute's mission is to promote research, education, and engagement of religious tolerance and interfaith relations among youth, university affiliates, and community from the local to the global.

Dr. Ralston will be preaching at the 8:30 and 11:00 worship services on Sunday morning. All lectures begin at 7:00 p.m. Sunday night's lecture will be held in the Fellowship Hall. Lectures on Monday and Tuesday evenings will take place in Room 209, the choir rehearsal room. The sermon and all lectures will be recorded and available in sets of four CDs. Child care is available for each lecture by calling the church office, 713-622-4807.

The lecture series was established in 1998 in memory of Chris Duerr, with the purpose of bringing the best Reformed scholars and preachers to St. Philip and the wider community each year. Duerr was born and raised in Germany, growing up during the years of World War II. He came to the U.S. in 1950 in the first class of Fulbright Scholars from Germany, studying at Michigan State University. He also studied at the University of Hamburg, Germany, where he received the equivalent of a Master's Degree in political economics. He moved permanently to the States in 1968, becoming a

naturalized citizen in 1973. He joined St. Philip in 1979 and later served as a ruling elder.

The Lecture Series was established through generous contributions made in Duerr's memory. While the lectures are free and open to everyone, your gift to ensure the continuation of the series on an annual basis is greatly appreciated. Dear Friends:

From year to year, Easter is a moving target on the calendar. Dated according to the cycles of the moon and the spring equinox, Easter can fall anywhere between **March 22** and **April 25**. This year Easter is **March 27**. Easter won't be this early again until 2035, when it will fall on **March 25**. I've come to think of the slippery dating of Easter as saying something about the mystical nature of resurrection itself, something that transcends conventional understandings.

The date for Easter determines a number of things on the church calendar, including the liturgical season of Lent. A forty day period preceding Easter (though Sundays aren't included in the count), Lent begins this year on **February 10**, Ash Wednesday. A season of contemplation and renewal, Lent is a time to grow in grace and to discover new aspects of faith.

Accordingly, our Lenten journey includes increased opportunities for worship and learning. For each of Lent's forty days, I will send out a morning e-votion. These brief reflections on biblical passages are distributed via e-mail. You can join the list by sending me a note at john@saintphilip.net. On Sunday mornings during Lent, Keatan and I will lead a class called "Who Do You Say That I Am?" Through word, image, and song, we will explore the identify of Jesus, noting the different ways he is presented in the Bible, and the various responses we make to him. If you are not currently involved in a Sunday School class, we extend a special invitation to you to make this six-week class a Lenten discipline.

On Ash Wednesday, **February 10**, we have worship at 12 noon and 6:30. These are identical services that include the imposition of ashes. A sign of mortality and penitence, the ashes symbolically represent our dependence on the faithful love of God, which has been made known to us in Jesus Christ. On the subsequent Wednesdays of Lent, we will continue our practice of having worship at 12 noon. We have a diverse line-up of preachers who will offer sermons on the psalms: Laurey Murphy, pastor of Spring Branch Presbyterian Church (**February 17**); Rose Niles, development officer at Austin Seminary (**February 24**); Cameron Highsmith, director of spiritual care at Prayers of the People (**March 2**); Jonathan Page, pastor of First Congregational Church (**March 9**); Katherine Doehring, campus minister at Texas A&M (**March 16**). The service lasts for about 30 minutes with lunch available afterwards in the Gathering Area.

See our website for further opportunities for Lent, including VBS for our children and a family activities calendar.

We have now completed two years of grant distributions through our Central Mission Endowment Fund. Nearly one million dollars has been given to a variety of organizations and ministries engaged in transformational projects here in Houston and around the world. It's exciting to hear how these funds are bearing fruit. Among other things, CMEF grants have made possible expanded operations for CCSC at its southwest service location, increased mental health care in schools provided by Interface-Samaritan Counseling Center, and scholarship assistance to students at Presbyterian Pan-American School. This week representatives from the Medical Benevolence Foundation are traveling to Malawi, taking with them new ultrasound equipment purchased with a CMEF grant. Three ultrasound machines will be delivered to Mizuzu, Malawi, and medical staff from four hospitals will be trained in their use. We are invited to pray for the team traveling from the U.S. and for their colleagues in Malawi, as well as those people in Malawi whose lives may be changed by having access to ultrasound diagnostics.

Our 2016 CMEF council has now been appointed by the Session. James Cooper and Jenny Towns have been elected to three–year terms. Jenilee Simmons will serve one year as the Session representative to the council. Continuing members are Cathy Patterson, Dick Howard, and Jeanette Wennenweser. I'm grateful for all the ways this fund has expanded our mission outreach.

WOMEN'S HOME EASTER BOXES



Refugees of any nationality, religion, or ethnicity deserve respect and care. We call upon our state and national leaders to act with compassion and justice and to choose welcome over fear in responding to those affected by the Syrian war."

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ST. PHILIP MO-RANCH RETREAT WEEKEND: JUNE 9-12, 2016

You Must Reserve Your Room by February 7

Each June, members of St Philip Presbyterian Church travel to the Texas Hill Country for a long weekend of Christian fellowship. In the beautiful surroundings of Mo-Ranch, we study, play, and relax as a church family. Our program begins after supper on Thursday and continues through worship on Sunday morning. Many families arrive earlier on Thursday to enjoy the ranch and time in the river. Most of us find it difficult to leave on Sunday.

Our group will be housed in Mo-Ranch's hotel-style accommodations. The prices listed below are for the full weekend. We regret that we cannot prorate the fee, as Mo-Ranch requires that we book all rooms for the full retreat. There is a limited amount of space available, so please register early to avoid disappointment. We will attempt to accommodate your housing preferences, but we must also give special priority to matching large family groups and persons with physical limitations to appropriate rooms and locations. Thanks in advance for cheerfully accepting your second choice if necessary.

REGISTRATION may be done either electronically via the St. Philip website (saintphilip.net) or by printed form, available in the Gathering Area after worship or from the church office. You may pay in full at the time of registration or in three installments (Feb. 7, Apr. 1, May 1). Confirmations and bills will be sent out by email. (Please be sure that the email you provide is correct and is an address you check regularly.) All fees must be paid by Feb. 7 (except for installment payments). No refunds can be made after Feb. 7 and rooms not paid by that date will be cancelled. If you do not cancel your reservation, you must pay for your room whether you go or not.
