
WORSHIP NOTES Lectionary Readings


- Genesis 21:8–21—Hagar and Ishmael are sent away, but God remains with them.

MUSIC NOTES

Today's **organ voluntaries** come from the first of Johann Sebastian Bach's six sonatas for the organ. Bach and his German colleagues adapted the trio texture of Baroque chamber music to the organ by assigning one melody line to each hand and the bass line entirely to the feet. Thus organ trios became one of the ways German organists of Bach's generation distinguished themselves from their Italian and French contemporaries, who used the organ pedals far less often. This sonata in three movements comprises an untitled opening movement, for which one assumes a *tempo ordinario*, a central Adagio, and a concluding Allegro. This morning we hear the outer movements at the beginning and end of our service, respectively. • This morning's **first solo** *Jesus Calls Us* is a setting of an old familiar text (No. 720 in the *Glory to God* hymnal), set to new music in 1980 by American composer and organist David Hurd, Professor Emeritus of Sacred Music and former Organist and Director of Chapel Music at General Theological Seminary in New York City. Today's **second solo** *As the Father Has Loved Me* is by Houston composer David Ashley White, who, in addition to his compositional activities and teaching, served as Director of the Moores School of Music at the University of Houston, 1999–2014.
