

WORSHIP NOTES

The recipient of the communion offering in September is Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary. Founded in 1902, Austin Seminary educates and equips people for Christian ministry, service, and leadership, and serves the church by promoting and engaging in critical theological thought and research. The Seminary also aims (as its mission statement says) “to be a winsome and exemplary community of God’s people.” St. Philip has had a long and valued connection with Austin Seminary; several St. Philip members, including Rev. Keatan King, currently serve on the Seminary’s Board. We are also blessed to have Kallie Pitcock, a recent Austin Seminary graduate, as our Pastoral Resident for the next two years.

MUSIC NOTES

Organ music — Today’s opening voluntary comes from a movement entitled “Offertoire” from François Couperin’s Mass for the Parishes. Couperin was part of a musical dynasty that served the Church of St Gervais in Paris for over 100 years. His two organ “masses” are collections of short pieces suitable for performance in alternation with plainchant during a Gregorian mass. The Offertoire, typically the longest movement in a classic French organ mass, comprises multiple sections, three of which comprise today’s voluntary: its majestic beginning, a short trio, and lively two-part conclusion. The closing voluntary comes from François Couperin’s uncle, Louis Couperin, his predecessor at St Gervais. Cast in the genre of the “duo,” this piece for two very active parts borrows the rhythm of the French gigue to great effect. Its angular and unpredictable lines suggest a singular musical personality, and indeed, this Couperin set the standard for all subsequent members of the clan.

Vocal music — This morning’s anthem is by the Mexican-born composer, organist and conductor Skinner Chávez-Melo, who was a highly regarded church musician in New York City, serving as director of music at St. Rose of Lima Church in Manhattan for many years until his early death at the age of 47 from spinal cancer. Chávez-Melo composed many works for choir, organ, and orchestra, and wrote a number of very interesting and effective hymn tunes for various denominational hymnals in the latter part of the 20th century. Perhaps his best-known of these is the hymn tune RAQUEL, which we hear today in anthem form sung by our vocalists with organ accompaniment. • Today’s communion music comes from Bach’s Magnificat, composed in the spring of 1723 after Bach’s appointment in Leipzig, and first performed there at Christmas that year. Bach revised the work ten years later in 1733, and it is this second version that has become the most performed today. It is an ‘old-fashioned’ but delightful five-voiced work that uses Latin text, just like the other rarity among Bach’s works, the Mass in B minor. The words come from the Gospel of Luke. The selection heard this morning forms the fifth movement of the Magnificat, written for alto and tenor soloists, and scored for two flutes, two violins, viola and continuo (all reduced into this morning’s masterful organ-only accompaniment).
