





MUSIC NOTES

Organ music — Both of today's organ voluntaries treat one of German Baroque composers' favorite chorale tunes — Martin Luther's 1534 hymn to the Nativity, *Vom Himmel hoch, da komm ich her* ("From Heaven Above to Earth I Come," No. 111 in the *Glory to God* hymnal). Pachelbel's two settings of this tune, played as this morning's **opening voluntary**, include a delicate trio and a more vigorous verse for the full resources of the organ. • Bach set this chorale numerous times for organ, perhaps because the tune lends itself so well to contrapuntal treatment — that is, to independent imitative lines. The **closing voluntary** is his *organo pleno* setting of this melody, in which each phrase is treated imitatively in all the parts.

Vocal music — This morning's **introit** is by Peter Aston, who was a British composer and conductor, best known for writing a variety of high-quality liturgical choral works. Aston was active as a lay canon at Norwich Cathedral in England, and for fourteen years he was conductor of the Aldeburgh Festival Singers. • Today's **anthem** by Malcolm Archer, *Brightest and Best*, was originally composed for children's treble voices, but is heard this morning in a new scoring for mixed adult voices. The spritely setting of this well-known text by Reginald Heber is typical of Archer's sunny and often lively music. Before his retirement in 2017, Malcolm Archer served with great distinction at cathedrals in Norwich, Bristol, Wells, and St. Paul's Cathedral in London, and finally as Director of Chapel Music at Winchester College. • This morning's **communion solo** comes from the song cycle for voice and piano titled *Weinachtslieder* [Christmas Songs], Op. 8, by 19th-century German composer Peter Cornelius. Cornelius himself wrote the texts for the songs in the cycle, which wonderfully retell the biblical Christmas narrative as seen through the eyes of an unquestioning child. At the same time, this is deeply spiritual and emotional music. Cornelius himself revised the music a number of times on the advice of Liszt and others, and as a result of his own insecurities about his music. In *The Three Kings*, it was upon the suggestion of Liszt that Cornelius added the Lutheran chorale in the piano accompaniment *Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern* [How brightly shines the Morning Star], which adds a level of commentary to the story of the Three Kings. The polyphonic combination of song melody above and chorale tune below creates a unique, beautiful sonority.*

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GREENSLEEVES



This Victorian text gains scope and power by having the original second halves of stanzas two and three restored. They give a stark forward glimpse of what lies ahead for this "babe, the son of Mary!" The tune is much older, dating from Tudor England.
