

MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

This morning's opening voluntary is by British composer Andrew Carter, who began his musical career as a bass singer in the York Minster Choir, and later founded the Chapter House Choir at York Minster, which he directed for seventeen years. Long associated with Oxford University Press, Carter has composed numerous sacred choral works for church and cathedral choirs, as well as for choirs with orchestra. In the mid-1990s Carter was invited to write his Missa Sancti Pauli for the 1997 tercentenary of the building of Christopher Wren's St. Paul's Cathedral in London. He has also composed a number of large works for organ, including his Toccata on Veni Emmanuel (1995), Organ Concerto (2005), and Passacaglia (2007). Trumpet Tune was composed at York in 1986.

Herbert Murrill's vibrant 1949 Carillon for organ is a miniature toccata that sets agile passagework above purposeful chords, with flashes of brilliance from the pedal department too. Its varied meters and busy textures propel the music to a triumphant conclusion as today's closing voluntary. Murrill studied at the Royal Academy of Music in London and served as organ scholar at Worcester College, Oxford. He worked as a school music teacher, organist, and choirmaster until 1935, when he became musical director for the Group Theatre (Westminster Theatre, London). He joined the BBC in 1936, where he became music program organizer in 1942, and finally head of music in 1950. In addition, he was a professor of composition at the Royal Academy of Music from 1933 until his death.

Choral Music

This morning's **introit** is another of the short works by English composer, conductor and organist Eric Thiman, whose music we have been featuring in recent weeks here at St. Philip. *Blessed Are They* is No. 6 of 24 *Introits*, published in 1961 for four-part choir.

This morning's **first anthem** is by Irish composer and teacher Charles Wood, who studied with both Charles Villiers Stanford and Charles Hubert Hastings Parry at the Royal College of Music in London. Chiefly remembered for his Anglican church music, Wood taught at Cambridge, becoming the first director of music and organist at Gonville and Caius College in 1894, and later succeeding Stanford as Professor of Music following the latter's death in 1924. *The Eyes of All Wait Upon Thee* is a simple-but-strict canon at the fifth for four unaccompanied voices, each voice entering one measure apart, and a fifth lower than the preceding voice.

Today's **second anthem** is by Alabama composer K. Lee Scott, who is a prolific writer primarily of choral music and hymn tunes for the church, including SHADES MOUNTAIN (this month's Declaration for Forgiveness response), which has become one of the preeminent hymn settings of our time. *The Narrow Way* was published in 1993 and features a folk-like tune somewhat reminiscent of the English tune O WALY WALY in a setting for SATB voices and organ. Echoes of this morning's gospel reading are heard in the anthem's text by prolific 18th-century English hymn-writer John Cennick.


