



Affirmation of Faith

Nicene Creed

Lectionary Readings

- Deuteronomy 34:1–12—After seeing the promised land from Mount Nebo, Moses dies.

MUSIC NOTES

Organ music — Bach's single organ setting of the familiar chorale tune "Ein' feste Burg ist unser Gott," today's **opening voluntary**, dates from fairly early in his career as an organ virtuoso. A youthful desire to both impress and please is evident in the various ways this hymn melody is treated in diverse ways: first as a piece of two-part counterpoint, then with steadily fuller textures until the tune appears in long notes in the pedal just before the end. At the **closing voluntary** we hear from Bach's cousin and good friend Johann Gottfried Walther, who also composed an organ setting of "Ein' feste Burg." His rigorously contrapuntal treatment features the melody in long-note *cantus firmus* style at the top and bottom of busy inner parts.

Choral music — This morning's **introit** *Christ be with me* is by the late British composer Noel Rawsthorne, who was organist of Liverpool Cathedral for 25 years from 1955 to 1980. One of the finest organists of his generation, Rawsthorne was also a prolific composer of choral and organ music, as well as a highly regarded transcriber of classical orchestral works in arrangements for the organ. *Christ be with me*, set by a number of other composers under the title *Prayer of St. Patrick*, features a simple unison melody shared between high and low voices, and crowned with a lovely descant at the end. • Today's **anthem** *A New Commandment* is by Thomas Tallis, who was among the rare English composers (William Byrd was another) who were able to bridge the reigns of several British monarchs and their shifting religious allegiances during the time of the English Reformation, from Henry VIII, Edward VI, Mary I, through Elizabeth I. Like many of Tye's anthems, *A New Commandment* was originally composed for the lower voices of the all-male choirs of his time (we present it this morning in a higher transposition suitable for mixed-voice choirs), beautifully setting the words of Christ's Mandatum, the mandate that we are to love one another as he loved (loves!) us.
