

Organ music — Bach's *Prelude and Fugue in E-flat Major* first appeared in print in 1735, as the bookends of his *Clavier-Übung III*, a collection devoted largely to elaborate settings of favorite chorale tunes, many derived from Luther's suggestions for both service and catechism. Both prelude and fugue are large, imposing works in a key that carried, in its three flats, prominent Trinitarian symbolism. The Fugue, today's **opening voluntary**, later acquired the nickname "St. Anne" because of the similarity of its initial subject (one of three) to the eponymous hymn tune, to which we sing Isaac Watts' 1719 text "O God, Our Help in Ages Past."

Mendelssohn composed his six organ sonatas in 1844 on commission for an English publisher. A gifted organist, Mendelssohn enjoyed considerable success with multiple recital tours to Britain, where he played his own and Bach's music to audiences unaccustomed to the German organ repertoire. The second sonata comprises four movements, from which we sample just the third movement as this morning's **closing voluntary**. Like several other movements in this collection, this C-major *Allegro* features strong, tuneful gestures and an athletic pedal line especially.

Vocal music — Following this morning's opening organ voluntary, the unaccompanied vocal **introit** uses a traditional chant melodic formula to lead us further into prayer with words from Psalm 88: *Let my prayer enter into thy presence, O Lord.* Simple chants like this have been used to open worship in Christian communities throughout the world for many centuries, and through the magical wonders of the chant itself, seem no less "current" now than they were when new.

Today's **first solo** is by American composer Karen Marrolli, who serves as Director of Music Ministries at Central United Methodist Church in Albuquerque, New Mexico. She holds degrees from Louisiana State University (DMA) and Westminster Choir College (BM and MM). *Be still* was published very recently in 2020, and is a beautiful, simple setting of familiar, calming words from Psalm 46.

This morning's **second solo** is by British composer and conductor Jonathan Willcocks, son of the great conductor and organist Sir David Willcocks. Like his father before him, Jonathan has composed a sizable body of works for various combinations of voices. *Lord, Make Me an Instrument of Thy Peace* was originally conceived as an anthem for mixed voices, itself part of the larger work *Lux Perpetua* published in 2000. Willcocks arranged the solo version we hear today for publication in 2010.
