

#### **Today's Lectionary readings:**

- Haggai 1:15b 2:9 I am with you; do not fear; I will restore the splendor of this house.
- Psalm 145:1-5, 17-21 I will extol you, my God; great is the Lord and greatly to be praised.
- Psalm 98—*Make a joyful noise to the Lord; give thanks for God's victory.*
- Job 19:23–27a I know that my Redeemer lives; at the last I will see my God.
- Psalm 17:1–9 Hear a just cause, O Lord; guard me as the apple of your eye.
- 2 Thessalonians 2:1–5, 13-17 Do not be deceived; stand firm and hold fast to our traditions.
- Luke 20:27–38 The Sadducees ask Jesus a question about marriage and resurrection.

Today's worship service includes traditional African-American Spiritual music. The Black composers of this music are unknown to history and therefore unable to receive royalties directed to their estates for the use of their songs. To remedy this inequity, a fund has been created and approved by the Session where we will collect voluntary "royalties" for using this music. Anyone may donate to the fund by going to the www.saintphilip.net homepage and selecting *Make a Contribution*, then selecting African-American Spirituals as the fund. You may also contribute by writing a check with *African-American Spirituals* in the memo line and placing it in the offering plate or mailing it to the church office. This small gesture of reparation seeks to help heal the long history of injury to Black persons. Contributions received over the course of the year will be donated annually to a local organization supporting Black musical traditions.

Pledge cards will be received during worship on Nov. 16.

## CAMPUS PLANNING UPDATE

Following worship on **November 23**, we will have a congregational forum in Fellowship Hall with updates on our campus planning process. Earlier this year, the Session authorized an exploration of how to optimize our buildings and grounds to support our current and future ministry. The architectural firm English+Associates was engaged to lead this study. Among the topics considered was the current use of spaces across the church campus, maintenance costs, looming capital expenditures, operational efficiency, environmental sustainability, and security. As the architects studied these topics, they met regularly with our planning team (Dan Boston, John Hartman, John Lemen, Rhonda Sands, Peter Schneider, and John Wurster) and gathered information from the congregation via a summer survey. At last month's Session meeting, the architects shared a very general design concept of an efficient campus plan that involves removing buildings that are past their useful lives and adding a new building that will provide better space for our ministry needs. In response to expressed needs from the congregation, the plan seeks to preserve green space and develop more convenient parking. The Session received this report with a consensus that it should be shared with the congregation for review and comment. In addition to the forum in Fellowship Hall on **November 23**, a presentation will also be held in the dining room on **December 14** at 9:30 a.m. Please come and help us consider how best to use our resources in service to Jesus Christ.

#### **MUSIC NOTES**

Drawn from Bach's *Orgelbüchlein* ("Little Organ Book"), a set of 46 organ preludes based on chorale tunes, today's **opening voluntary** is based on the tune "*If thou but suffer God to guide thee*" is graceful and reflective, reflecting Bach's mature chorale style. The tune, also referred to as the *cantus firmus*, is presented in a clear and lyrical manner, supported by a steadily flowing accompaniment.

Edwin Hatch's beloved hymn "Breathe on Me, Breath of God" is a quiet prayer for spiritual renewal and unity with God's will. Written in the late 19th century, its text draws on the image of the Holy Spirit as the divine breath that gives life—echoing themes of the creation story in Genesis. Our introit is a tender arrangement of the hymn for handbell quartet.

"Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring" is the widely known English title of the chorale "Jesu, bleibet meine Freude," which concludes both Parts I and II of Johann Sebastian Bach's Cantata BWV 147, Herz und Mund und Tat und Leben ("Heart and Mouth and Deed and Life"). Harmonized in Bach's distinctive contrapuntal style, the stately chorale is

paired with a flowing triplet instrumental texture that ebbs to and from each stanza. Our version this morning includes the addition of handbells that highlight the tune's familiar melody.

The spiritual "God Is a God," a powerful testament to the depth of faith found in many African-American spirituals, articulates and affirms the constant presence of God. Today's arrangement highlights the repetitive nature of the text and adds a modern gospel-style accompaniment that builds gradually to a climactic finish.

Jacques-Nicolas Lemmens, a pivotal figure in 19th-century French and Belgian organ music, is often credited with bridging the classical contrapuntal tradition of J. S. Bach and the emerging Romantic idiom of the French symphonic organ school. Our **closing voluntary**, drawn from *École d'Orgue basée sur le plain-chant romain* (1862), exemplifies his pedagogical and stylistic aims: to combine rigorous technique with musical expressiveness.


## Immortal, Invisible God Only Wise
