
**Opening voluntary** — French organists have long improvised and composed variations on Christmas melodies indigenous to France. The Noëls of Louis-Claude d'Aquin, organist to Louis XV and at *titulaire* at Notre Dame in Paris, are perhaps the finest examples of this practice from the 18th century. Titles for these variation sets often mention the particular sounds required: in this case, the pungent reed stops (*''jeux d'anches''*) of the instrument.

Handbell music — This morning's bell introit and meditation are brief Christmas carol melody arrangements by Indianapolis -based composer Jason Krug, who has written over 400 handbell compositions, as well as other works for piano, organ, choir, and string orchestra. Both *Carol of the Bells* (also known as Ukrainian Bell Carol) and *Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming* were arranged by Krug for a small handbell ensemble of just six ringers. Many thanks to members of Bell Canto for their joyful holiday ringing, and special appreciation to Jane Malczewskyj for her enthusiastic leadership this morning!

**Vocal music\*** — This morning's **solo** *Shepherd's Pipe Carol* was composed by John Rutter in 1966 when he was 18 and studying as an undergraduate at <u>Clare College</u> at the <u>University of Cambridge</u>. Rutter stated that he believed his inspiration for writing it came from when he sang as a boy soprano during the opera <u>Amahl and the Night Visitors</u> and heard pipe music as the title character headed for <u>Bethlehem</u> with the <u>Biblical Magi</u>. Rutter's new carol was first performed by the <u>Choir of Clare College</u>, <u>Cambridge</u> conducted by the composer at a Christmas concert. A few days later, David Willcocks, director of the <u>Choir of King's College</u>, <u>Cambridge</u>, requested a copy of Rutter's manuscript for the <u>Shepherd's Pipe Carol</u> and made calls to <u>EMI</u> for the work to be published in 1967. It was Rutter's first composition to be published. Rutter and Willcocks later formed a publishing partnership and helped to compile the <u>Carols for Choirs</u> series of Christmas choral collections for <u>Oxford University Press</u>. An interesting side note: prior to the breakup of the <u>Soviet Union</u>, choirs in the <u>Baltic states</u> reportedly circulated photocopies and faxes of the <u>Shepherd's Pipe Carol</u> to be sung as a sign of resistance to Soviet control. The original choral version of the carol is for SATB choir and organ or small orchestra. This morning we hear a lively arrangement for solo voice and organ.


**Closing voluntary** — Today's concluding voluntary both treats a well-known Christmas melody popular during late Baroque. Bach's *organo pleno* version of *In dulci jubilo* (this morning's closing hymn) includes highly chromatic harmonies and brief improvisatory "connectors" between individual phrases of the melody.



Brought together in the mid-19th century, the text and tune of this familiar carol began in quite different forms. The text had ten stanzas and began, "Hark, how all the welkin rings." The tune was created for a festival celebrating Gutenberg's introduction of moveable type.

Here is a chance to sing a familiar French carol tune with new words, the most important clearly being "Love." The senses "seen and heard" (as in Acts 4:20 and elsewhere) organize the first two stanzas, while the third holds the summary statement: "Love is the gift of Christmas."

Carols using two languages, like this one dating from at least the 14th century, belong to a special group called "macaronic," the original languages here being German and Latin. Though the present version is only in English, it is sung to the traditional German folk melody.
