WORSHIP NOTES

Today's Lectionary readings:

- Acts 3:12–19 Peter speaks of Jesus' rejection and calls the people to repent.
- Psalm 4 Answer me when I call, O God; in you I will find joy and peace.
- 1 John 3:1-7 See what love the Father has given us; we are children of God.
- Luke 24:36b-48 The risen Lord eats with the disciples and interprets the Scriptures.

MUSIC NOTES

Today's **organ voluntaries** come from exact contemporaries—one German, the other French—who were both great masters of their craft. Georg Böhm left only a small handful of notated organ works, which include a Praeludium in C that begins with a vigorous pedal solo. A subsequent fugal section sports a deceptively simple yet rhythmically driving subject, one that works well either in the fingers or feet. Couperin's two "organ masses," by contrast, comprise short works that would have been performed in alternation with plainchant. The excerpt at the close of this morning' service comes from the large central movement of the composer's *Messe pour les Paroisses* (Mass for the Parishes).

Surrounded by "alleluias," today's **introit** is an adaptation of the familiar hymn by Donald Fishel, who was inspired to compose both music and text suddenly during the summer of 1971. This choral adaptation by our director of music, Justin Langham, highlights the hymn's third verse, which encapsulates the good news

of Easter and the new life in the risen Christ.

Our **anthem** today offers a convenient snapshot of 19th–20th century Americana music. Originally found in "The Social Harp," the final publication of shapenote tunes prior to the Civil War, the tune received new life almost a century later due to its inclusion in Copland's opera *The Tender Land*, and eventually in the second set of his "Old American Songs." The swinging compound meter (beats are divided into three) brings the celebratory nature of the text to life, a fitting addition to our Easter season.

A central figure of contemporary British choral music, Bob Chilcott has an extensive catalog of works for choir, much of which has also been adapted for solo voice. Our **offertory** is once such arrangement, a serene, prayerful setting of an adapted Jewish text that features a tender melody supported by a reverent accompaniment.



Originally printed as eleven four-line stanzas without alleluias, this Easter text was written during the first year following the author's life-changing conversion experience, yet it already shows his enduring emphasis on the theme of love. This lively Welsh tune sets it well.







Beginning with rather conventional Easter imagery, this text moves into unexpected territory by declaring that Christ's Resurrection is for "all whose lives are messed or mangled, all who find religion strange." The name of this traditional Welsh melody simply means "lullaby."

In commenting on this late 20th-century text, the author has stressed his intention to affirm the social implications of an Easter faith: "Christian peace and justice action finds its wellspring, not in moral zeal or guilty conscience, but in the resurrection.'
