

MUSIC NOTES

Joseph Jongen was a renowned Belgian organist and prolific composer, who spent a lifetime—from his teens to his seventies—building a far-reaching collection of works for all types of instrumentations. After winning the coveted Belgian Prix de Rome in 1897, he spent four years traveling in Germany and France where he was influenced by many notable composers like Richard Strauss and Vincent D'Indy. Our **opening voluntary** displays elements of Jongen's era of drifting away from Romanticism, most apparent in the shifting harmonic treatment of what is an expressive melody.

Hall Johnson, a pivotal figure in preserving and elevating the African American spiritual tradition, was one of the most ardent advocates of the spiritual genre, and deeply committed to showcasing it as a sophisticated and expressive art form. His short but dynamic arrangement of *Ride On, King Jesus!* transforms the triumph and resilience of Jesus riding into Jerusalem into an expression and affirmation of faith despite hardship and oppression. Through the work of Johnson and many other composers, the spiritual continues to resonate as an enduring legacy of African American musical heritage.

Composed in 1714 for the Sunday after Christmas, **Tritt auf die Glaubensbahn** is the opening aria of Bach's Cantata BWV 152. Written during his early years in Weimar, the cantata represents a dialogue between Jesus and "the Soul," representative of us, the listeners. The bass soloist (as Jesus) invites the Soul to "step upon the path of faith," accompanied by an obbligato oboe that seems to illustrate the path before us using scales.

Originally drawn from a 13-century leise, a medieval precursor to protestant church music, the hymn *Nun bitten wir den Heiligen Geist* ("*We now implore the Holy Ghost*") alludes to Pentecostal imagery in addressing the Holy Spirit. The hymn suited Martin Luther, who included it as one of the first German hymns to be sung regularly in his 1523 liturgy for services. BuxWV 208 is the first of two chorale preludes on the hymn composed by Buxtehude.

Our **closing voluntary** comes from 20th-century German organist and composer Hermann Schroeder, whose large collection of works include many for solo organ. The opening movement of Op. 9, his *Maestoso* shows off the harmonic capabilities of the pipe organ while maintaining the expectedly grand and majestic spirit throughout.


