

WORSHIP NOTES

Today's Lectionary readings:

- 2 Kings 2:1-2, 6-14 Elijah is taken to heaven in a whirlwind; Elisha picks up his mantle.
- Psalm 77:1–2, 11–20 You work wonders, O God; you make a path through the waters.
- 1 Kings 19:15–16, 19–21 Elisha leaves his family and his oxen to follow the prophet Elijah.
- Psalm 16 Protect me, O God; you show me the path of life and fullness of joy.
- Galatians 5:1, 13–25 Christ has set us free; live by the Spirit, not the desires of the flesh.
- Luke 9:51–62 Jesus turns toward Jerusalem and warns those who would follow him.

MUSIC NOTES

Georg Böhm was the long-time organist of the Johanniskirche in Lüneburg, Germany who is credited for the development of the chorale partita, a multi-movement instrumental genre based on a chorale tune. He was also an instructor of a then teenage Johann Sebastian Bach in organ and composition from 1700 to 1702. Today's **opening voluntary** highlights a florid setting of Martin Luther's tune for the Lord's Prayer ("Our Father in Heaven"), while our **closing voluntary** features one of Böhm's organ preludes.

A native of Cambridge, Massachusetts, Charles Callahan was a keyboardist, conductor, teacher, and prolific composer of church music. Today's **introit** – taken from a collection of short choral introits – represents a short sample of Callahan's writing style, which was described by the Washington Post as possessing "gentle, confident lyricism." Organist and composer Philip W. J. Stopford, who began his musical training as a chorister at Westminster Abbey, has become a prominent and relatively young voice in English choral music. Our **anthem**, which was commissioned by his then church at St. Anne's Cathedral in Belfast, is a full and flowing setting of the familiar passage from Psalm 119, a reminder of the values and path laid before us.

Supported by the flowing nature of the ST. HELENA hymn tune, the text There's a Wideness in God's Mercy, offers an inclusive and welcoming spirit, emphasizing the broadness of God's love. The text's author—a native of Kensington in London—came from a strict Calvinistic family background and became a prolific and influential hymnist, penning 150 original hymns.




