

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MUSIC NOTES

The second of Vaughan Williams' *Three Preludes on Welsh Hymn Tunes*, today's **opening voluntary** sets a hymn tune by 19th-century priest John David Edwards. Originally named after a village of the same name where Edwards served as vicar until his death in 1855, the tune itself has a lilting pastoral mood akin to the rolling Welsh country-side.

A champion of Neo-Baroque music, a movement of musical reinvention in the early 20th century, German organist and composer Hugo Distler became most well-known for his sacred choral music. Based on the works of Heinrich Schütz and other early Baroque composers, these pieces were often tonally rooted, melismatic (moving lines sung on one vowel), and polyphonic (multiple lines interacting together), all of which are displayed in our **introit** sung by an octet.

American Howard Helvey is a prolific composer with hundreds of works published and performed around the world. Today's **anthem**, a setting of an original hymn by Helvey, gives thanks to each form of God (Father, Son, Holy Spirit) for the majesty of creation in language that celebrates the beauty and vastness of our world, along with a call to extend love "to every land and race."

The *Partita on Freu dich sehr, o meine Seele* ("Rejoice Greatly, O My Soul") by Georg Böhm was likely not originally played in a church but rather in a home devotional setting. Between each verse of the hymn, Böhm would

have played a variation on harpsichord or clavichord, thus each variation is not freely composed but rather a meditation on the corresponding verse.

Noted composer of opera, art song, and musical theater, Ricky Ian Gordon's works are often prescient of the world around him and filled with emotion derived from his own life experiences, such as the death of his partner from AIDS in the 1990s. From the album of the same name, *A Horse With Wings* presents a powerful original text from an evolving perspective of someone who begins by processing the difficulties of the world ("I wanna cry/lie/ pray"), then seeking something more ("I wanna know"), and finally overcoming ("I wanna fly!").

Heinrich Schiedemann was organist of St. Katharine's Church in Hamburg. The city was a center for commerce bringing music from far-off Italy, especially the polychoral style of Venice. This genre utilizes different choirs and ensembles one another in opposing ends of a church. North-German organists would emulate this echoing effect by alternating manuals (keyboards). Just after Schiedemann's appointment to St. Katharine's, he had the organ enlarged to over five thousand pipes and added a fourth manual. This gave him the ability to contrast many different combinations of stops in pieces such as the *Præeambulum in G*.
