PEACEMAKING COMMITTEE NOTE

The Presbyterian Planning Calendar designates **July 7** as Immigration Sunday. On June 25, reports surfaced of a father, Óscar Alberto Martínez Ramírez, who died with his 23-month-old daughter, Valeria, as they tried to cross from Mexico to the United States and were found lying face down in the muddy water along the banks of the Rio Grande. The photo of the drowned father and daughter is a heartbreaking illustration of the sacrifices parents will make to escape desperate conditions in their home countries.

On Friday, July 12, 2019, Lights for Liberty will bring thousands of people into the streets and into their own front yards to protest the inhumane conditions faced by immigrants and asylum seekers. Advocates, activists, and affected persons will speak on the issue of immigration detention in the United States. Around the country and around the world, participants will light candles in a silent vigil for all those held in US detention centers. There will be vigils in three locations around Houston: 7:45 to 9:10 p.m. at the Southwest Key Detention Center, 419 Emancipation Avenue; 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. at Casa Quetzal, 7407 North Freeway; and 7 to 9 p.m. at CCA Houston Processing Center, 15850 Export Plaza Drive. You may also choose just to light a candle at 9 p.m. in front of your home to remember the call to love our neighbor and to love the migrant, and to pray for them and to do all that we can in order to support them in their hour of need.
