WORSHIP NOTES

Today's readings and prayers are borrowed from various sources such as:

- 1 Kings 8:(1, 6, 10-11), 22-30, 41-43 At the dedication of the temple, King Solomon prays to the Lord.
- Psalm 84 How lovely is your dwelling place, O Lord; my soul rejoices in you.
- Joshua 24:1–2a, 14–18 The Lord desires that the wicked turn away from evil, and live.
- Psalm 34:15–22 Teach me your way, O Lord: to turn from vanity and disgrace.
- Ephesians 6:10-20 Love is the fulfillment of the law; put on Christ; salvation is near.
- John 6:56–69 A difficult teaching; yet Peter says Jesus has the words of eternal life

MUSIC NOTES

Baroque master Antonio Vivaldi was a prolific composer and author of many instrumental concertos, including a significant number for the violin. Vivaldi's craft in writing for the instrument was widely respected even by *one of his most famous colleagues*, J.S. Bach, who frequently drew inspiration from Vivaldi's concertos. Our **voluntaries** feature the outer movements of one of his most well-known concertos for violin, RV 230, from which Bach created his own version for solo keyboard. Characteristic in Baroque style, both movements include musical material that is passed between solo ("one") and tutti ("all") sections that can be embellished by the soloist.

Today's **introit** highlights a familiar text by Anglican turned Catholic author Frederick Faber that is given a fresh treatment with a more modern hymn tune (ST. HELENA). Unlike the common hymn treatment it usually receives, this setting by Calvin Hampton brings the gentler aspects of Faber's text to light by thoughtfully integrating the vocal line, violin obbligato, and the colors and textures of the organ accompaniment.

Dan Forrest has established himself as one of the most performed sacred composers today, with a massive catalog of works spanning any liturgical or concert occasion imaginable. Our **anthem** renews the 17-century English text by Isaac Watts with an energetic, rhythmic, and uniquely American treatment that brings the meaning of the text to life. A remarkable achievement considering that Forrest includes only half of the original text and omits the original refrain altogether.

Many composers across the centuries have been drawn to the depth and beauty found in liturgy of evening prayer, or "vesper" from the Latin meaning, some of whom have penned masterworks in the genre. Mozart's *Vesperæ solennes de confessore*, K. 339 ("Solemn Vespers for a Confessor"), one of two well-known vesper settings by Mozart, was composed when he was just 24 years old and was the final work composed for the Salzburg Cathedral. With a gentle, lyrical soprano solo and flowing choral and accompanimental texture, the **Laudate Dominum** movement is perhaps the most well-known of the larger work, and one of Mozart's most famous works overall.





This hymn is a classic example of how Isaac Watts Christianized the Psalms, in this case Psalm 72:5-19, by turning their messianic language to New Testament equivalents. The tune was at first nameless and anonymous, but is now called by the address of the supposed composer.

The first four stanzas of this ballad-like hymn are understood to be in the voice of Christ, with the fifth reflecting the individual singer's response. Created for this traditional Scottish tune, the text was written to mark the conclusion of a youth volunteer's time of ministry.



A pastor wrote this text for a Christmas fair, which perhaps added echoes to the words "gifts" and "give" in the first two stanzas. But no hints are needed to grasp the full meaning of this hymn's final line. The text is set to a shortened form of a widely used Genevan tune.
