

MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

Today's voluntaries both come from Dietrich Buxtehude, the greatest representative of the North German organ school of the late seventeenth century. Each treats a well-known German chorale melody in distinct ways. Buxtehude's setting of *Ich ruf zu dir, Herr Jesu Christ* is a changeable fantasy, with each phrase of this penitential hymn prompting distinct treatment, from a long-note *cantus firmus*-style melody with accompanying counterpoint to a more equal-voiced texture with lively rhythmic figuration. *Ein feste Burg ist unser Gott* is a more traditional treble-dominated setting, with the decorated melody always in the top voice and mostly imitative counterpoint below.

Choral Music

This morning's **introit** is by English composer, conductor and organist Eric Thiman, who published some 1,300 works during his lifetime, including many anthems, carols and canticles for church choirs. Much of Thiman's choral and organ music was written for Nonconformist (i.e., non-Anglican) churches, and Thiman himself was a Congregationalist by birth. *Behold, God Is My Salation* is No. 1 of *24 Introits*, published in 1961. Like much of his music, it shows a particularly strong affinity for traditional harmony used to striking and new effect. Thiman was a master of

short-form pieces, as evidenced here in just 14 measures of music for four-part choir and organ.

Today's anthem is the beautiful The Call of Wisdom by British classical composer and jazz musician Will Todd, written for the 2012 Diamond Jubilee service at London's St. Paul's Cathedral celebrating the 60th anniversary of Queen Elizabeth II's accession to the throne. Originally composed for children's voices and organ, the anthem was premiered (on live television with an audience of some 45 million people!) by a large auditioned choir featuring children from every region and nation of the UK joined by the Choristers of St. Paul's Cathedral and the boys of Her Majesty's Chapel Royal. This morning the choir sings Todd's evocative anthem in his subsequent setting for mixed voices and organ.

This morning's **solo** is a worship song by Stuart Townend and Mark Edwards. Townend grew up in West Yorkshire, England, the youngest son of an Anglican vicar. He started learning piano at a young age, and began writing music at age 22. Some of his best-known songs include "How Deep the Father's Love," "The King of Love," and "The Power of the Cross." Townend serves as worship leader at Church of Christ the King in Brighton, England.
