GOING GREEN WITH NATIVE PLANTS

By now we know that CO_2 is a significant contributor to climate change. Fortunately, native plants are particularly effective at removing CO_2 from the air. They have significantly deeper roots than non-native plants, which increases their carbon storage capacity for use in photosynthesis – giving us cleaner air to breathe! With their deeper roots, native plants also require far less water and are much more effective at absorbing rainwater, thus preventing runoff and soil

erosion. But did you know that they also do not require the fertilization and pesticides that non-natives need? This results in a great benefit to our environment, since so much of those fertilizers and pesticides flow into our sewers when it rains, ultimately polluting our bays, rivers, and oceans.

How do you start landscaping with native plants? Consider changing out areas of lawn grass with natives. By reducing the amount of mowing required, we also reduce the number of pollutants going into the air. Using a gas-powered lawn mower for an hour generates roughly the same number of emissions as driving 270 miles! (That's one way from Houston to McKinney, or round-trip from Houston to Gonzales.)

Finally (and most delightful!), native plants can serve as al fresco dining for birds, bees, butterflies, and so much more. So please consider going green with native plants. They are the necessary heart of healthy ecosystems and a great way to care for God's creation.



In Too Deep: Class and Mothering in a Flooded Community Review by Sue Howard



What is not to like about a book on class and mothering in a flooded community when it's all about Houston and it is written by our very own Rachel Tolbert Kimbro mother of Eleanor and Thomas, wife of Rob and oh yes she is Dean of the School of Social Sciences and Professor of Sociology at Rice University. Released in January 2022, the book is available locally

and even from Amazon.

The book includes information about the Memorial Day Flood of 2015, the Tax Day Flood of 2016 and Hurricane Harvey of 2017. "The book illustrates how mothers carefully choose where they live and the school their children attend, and the lengths they will go to maintain their family lives even after experiencing repeated disaster. While the findings may not be generalizable to the entire neighborhood, to Houston, or to another state, they do illuminate the inner workings of families after a disaster, including how hard mothers work to sustain their high parenting standards even in difficult circumstances."

It is a page turner. It's gripping and very readable. I read it in two days while at the beach and loved it. Then I spent hours telling Dick about it and asking questions that triggered lots of conversation. The SPPC book club is planning on reading it and I hope you consider it also.
