JANUARY COMMUNION OFFERING



The January 2020 Communion offering will be donated to the Houston International Seafarers Ministry. This ministry will be in its 51st year of service to seafarers visiting the Port of

Houston aboard merchant ships from countries all over the world. The seafarer ministry is a long-time mission partner with St. Philip Presbyterian and is in a covenant relationship with Presbytery of New Covenant.

Your donations are used solely to support two Presbyterian chaplains who serve alongside chaplains of other faiths and work out of Seafarer Centers in the Port of Houston and Laporte, TX. Our chaplains provide pastoral care and social services to seafarers and work closely with officials of the Port of Houston, Coast Guard, Homeland Security, ship's agents, and others to resolve issues impacting visiting seafarers.

Our Presbyterian chaplains and their colleagues attempt to visit every ship calling on nearly 90 miles of the Houston ship channel shoreline. Many seafarers do not have U.S. visas and cannot disembark their ships, so the chaplains come to them aboard their vessels bringing magazines, bibles, Wi-Fi connectivity, the coveted Christmas gift boxes, and a caring spirit. The life of seafarers is hard and lonely. These sailors are often away from home, friends, and family for over nine months a year. The care and help offered by the chaplain is cherished by many visiting seafarers and helps make Houston a desired port of call.

VALENTINE DELIGHTS

Child labor and desperate poverty among farmers in the cocoa industry is still in the news as we approach one of the largest days for chocolate sales. In 2003 the Harkin-Engel



Protocol, a voluntary public-private agreement to eliminate the worst forms of child labor in the growth and processing of cocoa in Côte d'Ivoire and Ghana, was created. The deal committed the chocolate companies to eradicate child labor from their supply chains and to develop and implement "standards of public certification," which would indicate that cocoa products had been produced "without any of the worst forms of child labor." In the last major survey to measure progress against the Harkin-Engel goals, a 2015 report for the U.S. Labor Department found that, based on interviews with about 12,000 people, the number of child laborers reported to have worked in West Africa the previous year had increased to 2.1 million from 1.8 million in the previous survey, completed in 2009.

We do have a choice to buy chocolate produced free of child labor. The cacao used to manufacture Equal Exchange goods is sourced from democratic co-ops and benefits small-scale farmers in Latin America. Show your support for these farmers, their sustainable farming methods and fair workers policies by visiting our Equal Exchange table on **January 19** for all your Valentine candy needs. We are having our sale a little early this year, to avoid conflict with a certain grand baby's arrival. We will also have the usual coffee, tea, almonds and olive oil and the newer cashews and dried mango on offer in the Gathering Area before and after the 11:00 worship service.

DUERR LECTURE SERIES

The speaker for the 23rd annual Duerr Lecture Series, **February** 23, 24, and 25, is Rev. Deborah L. Forger, Ph.D., Postdoctoral Scholar, Jewish Studies, Dartmouth College. Dr. Forger



holds degrees from Calvin College, Duke University, and University of Michigan, and is an ordained Presbyterian Minister. Most of her academic work and research has focused on the Gospel of John and Second Temple Period Jewish literature. After the Tree-of-Life synagogue massacre last fall, however, she felt compelled to start writing more on the topic of the Bible and antisemitism. Title of the lectures is **"Christian Biblical Interpretation and Christian Antisemitism: Exploring an Unfortunate Link."** Dr. Forger will preach at the 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. worship services and present lectures each evening at 7:00 p.m. Lectures are free and open to everyone.
