


There's hardly a better way to get to know fellow St. Philippians than to share a meal together, especially if you are new to St. Philip or visiting!

MONTHLY MUSICAL MOMENT: AFRICAN GIANT

I'm excited to present our first Monthly Musical Moment, a moment to share a variety of music and some thoughts about it! No matter your musical taste or background, there are countless amaz-



ing musical moments across all types of music for you to explore outside of the bubble of what is familiar. I hope that these monthly columns will broaden your musical perspectives and inspire you to seek out musical moments wherever you can.

Those who know me well would tell you that I have a uniquely broad taste in music... As an experiment, I hit shuffle on my Apple music library just this moment, the first five artists that popped up were Drake, George Strait, Frank Sinatra, Prince, and J.S. Bach...

The artist who would likely pop up next on the shuffle is a Nigerian singer/hip-hop artist named Burna Boy, who gained popularity in the U.S. after signing a deal with Atlantic Records in 2017. He refers to his own style as "Afrofusion," a combination of Afrobeat, dancehall, hip-hop, pop, R&B, and reggae, in which he frequently switches between English, is Zulu, Yoruba, and Nigerian Pidgin. In Burna's music, I find a combination of range, creativity, and authenticity, a powerful combination that's increasingly rare in popular music today.

Burna comes from humble beginnings in Nigeria, where he is a local hero for the constant pride and commitment he shows his home country. In fact, one of his most popular albums, "African Giant," a musical homage to his roots, has also become one of his most used nicknames and a representation for how he is seen by his fellow Nigerians and Africans from around the continent. Since gaining popularity, Burna Boy has toured the world, including to Houston in 2022 and 2023, both of which were attended by yours truly.

In honor of Nigerian Independence Day today (October 1), I'd like to share one of my favorite Burna Boy songs called "Common Person," where he frames himself as one of the common folk. The repeated line of Pidgin "na me wey dey...", essentially "I'm the one who...", through which Burna is saying that he is the one who's cleaning the house, washing the car, cooking food for you, etc... followed by the refrain, "I be common person, but my happiness still be my own." Burna Boy is an incredibly effective communicator, beautifully pairing the music and lyrics to convey the meaning of the song.

I hope this music can give you some good vibes to start your day!

The Peace and Global Witness Offering will be received in worship on Sunday, <u>October 6</u> (World Communion Sunday), and throughout **October 25** on St. Philip's *Giving* webpage or by mailing a check to the church office. Confronting hopelessness and thwarting division, this denominational offering encourages the church to cast off anxiety,

fear, discord, and division so that we can embrace God's mission of reconciliation to those around us and around the world. The Offering empowers congregations and individuals to become peacemakers themselves, encouraging and equipping congregations to find and address the anxiety and discord prevalent throughout our broken world.

SOWING THE SEEDS OF PEACE.

Mid-councils retain 25% of offering receipts for regional ministries. Another 50% supports the Presbyterian Mission Agency's global peace and justice initiatives.

Congregations are encouraged to use up to 25% of the offering for local peacemaking efforts. St. Philip will be donating its 25% of the Offering to **Texas Impact**, which equips faith leaders and their con-



gregations with the information, opportunities, and outreach tools to educate their communities and engage with lawmakers on pressing public policy issues. Texas Impact helps people live out their faith in the public square, moving the faith community from charity to justice.

This election year, St. Philip is participating in Texas Impact's *Texas Faith Votes* campaign and its BallotReady initiative, a nonpartisan,

data-driven tool that helps voters register, make a plan to vote, and look up their elected representatives. Look for the BallotReady QR code unique to St. Philip in our publications, online, and around campus! Texas Impact is a regular recipient of support from St. Philip's Peacemaking and Social Justice Committee budget.

This year SEARCH will celebrate its 35th anniversary. It started with a concept of helping men on the street, providing a place to eat and get clean. It's become a major hub for homeless and low income services that connects to multiple agencies serving the needs of the homeless. Operations include "The Way Home" which has resulted in a 61% decrease in overall homelessness. Over 32,000 individuals have been housed since 2012. Their housing program has a 90% success rate of clients not returning to homelessness within 2 years. SEARCH Family Services is expanding in 2025 to provide Case Management to the 80 families at New Hope Housing at Reed Road. And that wonderful concept that created the House of Tiny Treasures to allow children of homelessness a place to be supported and where they can thrive. St. Philip has been involved in this growth and we continue to serve our brothers and sisters who lack housing or resources.

Each year one weekend is designated as World Homeless Weekend. This year it starts on Saturday, **October 12**. On Sunday, October 13, St Philip members are invited to serve breakfast at 7AM at Lord of the Street, next to Trinity Episcopal Church. Lord of the Streets serves breakfasts 5 days a week among other outreach projects. This is a ministry we are reviving our participation after the Pandemic shutdown. On that Sunday, we have Sondee Chalcraft, VP of Advancement, from SEARCH to talk for the Moment for Mission during our service.

There are opportunities to learn more about homelessness and its impact. A Storytelling Event will be at Ecclesia Church, 1100 Elder St at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, **October 10**. I attended last year and heard from those that had been homeless, the social workers who helped them and others. It was a moving production.

And on **November 15**, 12:00 – 2:00 p.m., we will be serving lunch and playing bingo games to entertain Scattered Housing Clients. These people have been moved into permanent housing but away from their friends from the street. Once a month they come to SEARCH to talk to their counselors and meet their friends. The last time, we fed people from age 70 to an infant, all in the SEARCH program to stay housed.

There are van tours starting at the SEARCH building which will take you on outreach downtown. Picnic with a Purpose with food provided by local supporting restaurants will be **November 13** from 6:00-9:00 p.m. Their speaker series starts up again (virtual) on **November 20**, 12:00-1:00 p.m.
