St. Philippians Prepare Quesadillas at Kids' Meals



On Monday, September 30, Sue Howard, Gail Faris, Jennifer Brown, Betsy Boston, Dan Boston, Keatan King, and Angelina Fonseca-Grewal met at Kids' Meals and prepared over 700 quesadillas made of flour tortillas, shredded cheese and slices of ham. Kids' Meals vans deliver the free, prepared meals to Houston's hungriest pre-school aged children, directly to

their homes. Everyday in Harris County, 80,000 children are unsure of their next mealtime. Kids' Meals is a first responder to children age 5 and under facing debilitating hunger due to extreme poverty. Every weekday, year round, volunteers prepare thousands of healthy lunches consisting of a sandwich, nutritious snack, fruit item, and 100% juice or milk. Kids'Meals vans deliver the meals Monday through Friday to children enrolled in their program. Kids' Meals currently serve 56 Greater Houston-area zip codes where the need is critical. St. Phillippians are invited volunteer during the week at Kids' Meals to prepare meals.

BRAVER ANGELS

An organization recommended by the Social Justice Study Group in these times of political disharmony

To state the obvious: we are living in extremely divided times. Some have wondered if it's the worst it's ever been in our political life. It seems that this tension and conflict is affecting everything: our intimate relationships, friendships, our feelings towards our neighbors and the sense of safety we feel in our world.

Many of us react with strong feelings, like anger, frustration or pity towards the "other side". At times, we may look at the state of political discourse and grow increasingly anxious, and even hopeless about the future. At other times, we may just withdraw and try to avoid it all. And, unfortunately, these contentious times are not simply going to go away after the election. We will still have much work to do to heal our divisions and disappointments. There are important practices we learn here at St. Philip to love our neighbor, love our enemies and to remember that we are all one in Christ. Those are critical. But there is another skill that may be good for us to learn, and that is how to talk to people we disagree with, without becoming defensive, reactive or shut-down.

Braver Angels is a national organization whose goal is "bring Americans together to bridge the partisan divide and strengthen our democratic republic. Though that may sound stiff and formal, the work is anything but that. It is quite accessible and interactive. I learned about a local Houston workshop from Denise Wilborn at a Social Justice Study Group meeting and decided to attend. It was called "Skills for Disagreeing Better." We learned and practiced new skills so we would have more understanding of the values and concerns of the people who differed from us politically and who were sitting at the table with us! We learned better skills for listening in a way that the other person felt heard. And, surprisingly and importantly, we learned skills for sharing our perspective in a way that the other person might hear even if they disagree. It was a game changer for me!

And though it was hard work, and we all fumbled around a bit, by the end of the evening there was a new sense of possibility. I felt convicted, transformed and even hopeful. I read and loved the book by Monica Guzman, I Never Thought About it That Way. She is a "Guide Across the Divide" that I trust. I also heartily commend her podcast, "A Braver Way," as an eye-opening and heart opening experience. The national website is full of information and many learning opportunities. And our local Houston group hosts regular events.

There is a free workshop "Families and Politics" on **November 14**th from 7-9:30 p.m., at St. Stephen's United Methodist Church in the Fellowship Hall, .2003 W 43rd St, Houston TX 77018. The goals of that workshop are: (1) gain insight into why family differences over politics are uniquely challenging (2) recognize common roles that fam-

ily members play in political conversations and (3) learn strategies and skills for handling family political conversations. I will be attending and welcome any who might be interested to join me.

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
