Kids Against Hunger KIDS AGAINST HUNGER: St. Philip

has for over 10 years participated as a local satellite of this national humanitarian organization, whose mission is to provide fully nutritious meals to children and families experiencing food insecurity or hunger. Our St. Philip satellite purchases the ingredients for nutritionally balanced, protein-rich, easy-to-prepare rice casserole; volunteers from St. Philip, with help from other groups, pack the ingredients into packages that make 6 servings (meals) each. These packages are distributed to children and families in need through Kids Meals and other agencies in the Houston area, where food insecurity is high. The St. Philip packing team, currently led by Butch Wilson, has packed 1.4 million meals (233,333 packages) since 2009. We will start packing again once it is safe to do so. 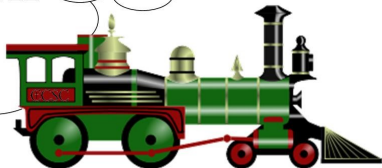

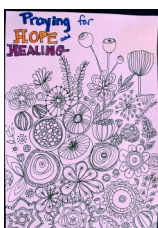
Jingle Bell Express

AN EASY WAY TO CARE FOR GOD'S CREATION

St. Philip is proud to be an Earth Care Congregation and answer God's call to care for creation, especially in a time of climate change. As part of our education efforts, we have been hosting a series of Church and Society classes this month. On November 8 and 15 our guest speaker, Professor Jim Blackburn, discussed carbon and plastic footprints, and carbon offsets and how to purchase them. Professor Blackburn teaches civil engineering at Rice University, is co-director of Rice's SSPEED Center (that's Severe Storm Prediction, Education and Evacuation from Disaster), and is on the board of Texas Coastal Exchange, a nonprofit conservation organization.

Many of us eat local, organic, or sustainable food, or eat less meat or drive a fuel-efficient vehicle, and these choices can all help to curb climate change. In the face of the deepening ecological crises caused by climate change, our call to act as Earth's caretakers takes on more meaning.

Purchasing carbon offsets is another way to address climate change and encourage the growth of renewable energy. Carbon offsets allow us to pay a fee for our personal carbon emissions – our “carbon footprint” – while contributing to projects that are reducing our emissions.

When we purchase carbon offsets, we are offsetting our carbon emissions that cannot be eliminated by lowering our energy usage. A typical American family of four releases about 65,000 pounds (or 32 tons!) of carbon dioxide annually (about twice the global average).

Texas Coastal Exchange offsets cost \$20 per ton of CO₂ and allow you to offset your annual footprint. Your contributions are paid to Texas landowners who promise to use their land for carbon sequestration. If you would like to purchase an offset for someone else, you can also send that person a certificate as your gift to them.

ONLINE CONTENT

10 tips to keep your children safe online

The internet has transformed the ability to access content. Many apps that children use are dependent on user-generated content which can encourage freedom of expression, imagination and creativity. However, due to the sheer volume uploaded every day, it can be difficult for platforms to regulate and moderate everything, which means that disturbing or distressing images, videos or audio clips can slip through the net. That's why we've created this guide to provide parents and carers with some useful tips on keeping children safe online.

- 

1 MONITOR VIEWING HABITS

Whilst most apps have moderation tools, inappropriate content can still slip through the net.
- 

2 CHECK ONLINE CONTENT

Understand what's being shared or what seems to be 'trending' at the moment.
- 

3 CHECK AGE-RATINGS

Make sure they are old enough to use the app and meet the recommended age-limit.
- 

4 CHANGE PRIVACY SETTINGS

Make accounts private and set content filters and parental controls where possible.
- 

5 SPEND TIME ON THE APP

Get used to how apps work, what content is available and what your child likes to watch.
- 

6 LET CHILDREN KNOW YOU'RE THERE

Ensure they know that there is support and advice available to them if they need it.
- 

7 ENCOURAGE CRITICAL THINKING

Talk about what people might post online and why some posts could cause distress.
- 

8 LEARN HOW TO REPORT & BLOCK

Always make sure that children know how to use the reporting tools on social media apps.
- 

9 KEEP AN OPEN DIALOGUE

If a child sees distressing material online; listen to their concerns, empathise and offer reassurance.
- 

10 SEEK FURTHER SUPPORT

If a child has been affected by something they've seen online, seek support from your school's safeguarding lead.
