MONDAYS IN ADVENT-LECTIO DIVINA ON ZOOM-

December 9, 16, and 23 at 9:00-9:20 AM—What is Lectio Divina? The ancient desert fathers and mothers believed that scripture was like a love letter written to us by God. Thus, the meditative, guided scriptural reflection known as Lectio Divina ("divine reading") assumes that God speaks to us intimately, God is already praying in us, and we'll experience a profound encounter with the heart of God, rather than an intellectual study of scripture. Keatan King will guide the group through the four cycles of Lectio (read, reflect, respond, rest) for 20 minutes every Monday morning at 9:00 a.m. for the season of Advent. To prepare, you are encouraged to choose a comfortable place to sit wherever you are (at home, work, in the car) and all participants will have video off and sound off during the Zoom. A CEREMONY OF CAROLS

Can you feel it? Can you hear it? The bustling holiday season is upon us and the sounds of holiday music fills the air!

This time of year brings many timeless traditions, including all kinds of musical goodies. From favorite Christmas hymns, classic crooner songs, Handel's iconic oratorio Messiah, and of course Mariah Carey coming out of hiding to dominate the radio airwaves, there is no shortage of seasonal music to mark the return of the holidays.

One piece that also gets plenty of playtime among concert halls and sanctuaries alike is **A Ceremony** of Carols, Op. 28, by Benjamin Britten, which has become a staple for choral ensembles and audiences alike. Originally scored for three-part treble chorus, solo voices, and harp, the larger set is structured in eleven movements with text taken from *The English Galaxy of Shorter Poems*. Principally



written in Middle English, with some Latin and Early Modern English, Britten composed the collection on a voyage Britten took from the United States to England in 1942, around the same time he completed another of his well-known works, *Hymn to St. Cecilia*, which shares many similarities.


Originally conceived as a series of unrelated songs, Op. 28 was later unified into one piece and bookended by a processional and recessional unison chant based on the Gregorian antiphon "Hodie Christus natus est." A harp solo based on the chant, along with a few other motifs from the second movement "Wolcum Yole", also serves to unify the set, along with harp-like effects, such as overlapping effects between voices in the movements "This Little Babe" and "Deo Gracias." Since this work was written originally with a treble boy choir, many of the movements are written as rounds (think "Row, Row, Row Your Boat") or call-and-response pieces, and are relatively simple lyrically for the sake of the children who would have participated in early performances.

Today's excerpt I'd like to share is probably my favorite movement for the set, "This Little Babe." With text taken from Robert Southwell's *Newe Heaven, Newe Warre* (1595), "This Little Babe" is written in a darker tone that contrasts with the other movements, often using imagery of hell with fiery music to match. The movement depicts a battle between the baby Jesus and Satan (good versus evil) through its swift tempo, polyrhythms, overlapping segments between the voices, and the fact that the song progressively grows in dynamic over the duration of the movement. The music reaches its climax with a striking key change and rhythmic manipulation, ending the piece in the parallel major key. Plainly, this movement rocks.

If you'd like to hear the rest of this wonderful work and much more, we hope you will make plans to attend our "Festival of Carols" this coming Sunday December 8th at 5pm, which will include the children's choir, bell choir, and ukuleles, wonderful harpist, fantastic soloists, and the St. Philip choir.


