Reaching for the Stars

For Sarah Valentina Hernandez Solache, the colorful city of Zitácuaro in the highlands of Mexico — where millions of Monarch butterflies bathe the fields and forests in a sea of orange during their annual migration — was, and always will be, home. But, despite its beauty, Valentina admits that it simply wasn't a safe environment for her.

"I had an amazing childhood there," said Valentina, who was raised Presbyterian in her local church. "Mexico is beautiful, with the best climate and the best food ever. But it is also a really dangerous country."

The ongoing violence against young girls that terrorized her community while she was growing up was one of the primary reasons her parents decided to send her, like her older sister before her, to pursue her education in the U.S. at the Presbyterian Pan American School in Kingsville, Texas. Established in 1911, the school is an international, collegepreparatory, boarding school related to the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) that motivates and equips young people for lives of Christian leadership in the global community.

"We met the school thanks to our church, which has a relationship with Pan Am," Valentina said, referring to her alma mater by its common nickname. "They send scholarship award letters to people all over Mexico."

The experience was life-changing and transformative. Both sisters are now distinguished graduates of Pan Am. Valentina is a pre-med student on a full scholarship at Schreiner University in Kerrville, Texas, and her sister is a Houstonbased architect.

"Coming to Pan Am and to this Christian community is where I actually found myself and my faith, and where I knew that I loved God," she said. "I found my blessing here."

Gifts to the Christmas Joy Offering help Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color, like Pan Am, prepare young people to become leaders in the Church and the world.

"The generous people who give to Christmas Joy give us scholarships and the opportunity to continue our education in the United States," she said. "I will always be grateful for that. But beyond that, they have also given us a lot of hope. All of the things I always dreamed about, thanks to them, they are making me feel like it can actually happen."

The president of Pan Am, Dr. Gordon A. Govens, states, "Through the sharing of the Christmas Joy Offering — and prayers — every student receives the gift of reaching his or her full potential." In other words, with our gifts to this offering, hope turns into dreams. Dreams turn into reality. And all of a sudden, those stars are within reach.

LOWERING YOUR CARBON FOOTPRINT: COMPOSTING

Why Compost?

According to Project Drawdown, an organization that tracks the impact of the major climate solutions, "Nearly half of the solid waste produced globally is organic or biodegradable. Much of it ends up in landfills; there, it decomposes in the absence of oxygen and produces the greenhouse gas methane, which is up to 34 times more powerful than carbon dioxide over a century. While many landfills have some form of methane management, it is far more effective to divert organic waste to composting."

For many households composting is a simple change that diverts hundreds of pounds of food from local landfills. Doubling our composting efforts worldwide could avoid methane emissions from landfills equivalent to 2–3 gigatons of carbon dioxide by 2050.

Do It Yourself

Most Houstonians who want to use compost in their gardens have a rotating composting bin that mixes your compost (similar to the one near the garden at St. Philip) or an enclosed worm farm. Both options have compartments that make it easy to add organic waste and remove finished compost. Including yard waste in your compost requires larger solutions such as a three-bin a.m. worship service, of Zoe Jane Carlin, daughter of Keatan King and Nathan Carlin; with the Rev. Omar Rouchon officiating.

system where compost is moved into successive bins as breakdown of organic matter progresses. Creating a pile of house and yard waste in the corner of your yard also works—but requires a nonchalant attitude and more work to manage.

Creating your own compost usually does not include composting meat, dairy, cooked food, or processed food because of the difficulty of managing critters in the home environment. Still, most households have enough fruit and vegetable scraps, egg shells, coffee grounds, and tea bags to make the effort worthwhile.

Composting Services

Recently two composting services, Moonshot and Zero Waste, have been working to expand Houston's composting efforts. They offer a few free organic waste drop-off sites or will pick up your compostable waste for a fee. They make composting possible for citizens who don't want to do their own composting. In addition, the services will compost meat, dairy, processed food, and compostable paper products. St. Philip's Earth Care team plans to explore the idea of using one of these services and converting more of St. Philip's paper and plastic products to the compostable variety.

When you start composting, you become aware of how much of your garbage is diverted away from the landfill. Your kitchen garbage is suddenly dry and can be managed with one or two paper grocery sacks every week. Meat and dairy waste can be frozen in a paper container until garbage day and tossed in the sack or given to a composting service each week. If you don't already compost, try a solution that works for you.
