MISSION COMMITTEE COMPLETES GRANT ALLOCATION PROCESS

This year, the St. Philip Mission committee sent grant applications to thirty-two mission partners in January. Throughout the month of February, the committee reviewed the applications in sub-committees of Feeding, Teaching, and Caring, considering many factors in evaluating the organizations' applications. The need is high and the amounts requested are more than our church resources can grant. On March 3, the committee met to recommend grant amounts and the Session approved the grant recommendations totaling \$100,000 for the thirty-two mission partners.

Thank you to the St. Philip congregation for the resources to further God's kingdom in the world outside our church walls. To compliment the grants awarded, each month St. Philip members have an opportunity to sign up for a service project in the Houston area. Thus far, St. Philip members have volunteered their time and talents with CCSC, The Women's Home, Mission of Yahweh, and Plant It Forward. The upcoming volunteer events are with NewSpring on May 1, Interfaith Ministries on June 1 or June 8 and Liberty High School graduation on June 9, and with Kids Meals on July 8.



Each year, the Presbyterian Women's Birthday Offering awards grants. Primarily making possible capital improvement projects, the Birthday

Offering supports domestic and international ministries, focusing on areas such as agricultural development, child care, community organization, criminal justice, drug counseling, economic justice, elderly care, employment training, homelessness, literacy, violence or women's concerns. Since 1922, this offering has helped fund mission projects that improve lives. This year's Birthday Offering recipients:

Advocates for Community Choice dba Bethel Hills Villa 5 Apartments and Recreation Area—Marthasville, Missouri—Bethel Hills addresses the unique needs of individuals with intellectual/developmental disabilities (I/DD) by providing a safe and loving place that takes into consideration their physical, emotional and spiritual needs in an environment where they can flourish. By renovating a villa into four accessible apartments for eight individuals, this project will provide housing that takes into consideration specific needs unique to the residents, such as addressing acute sensitivity to sounds, bright light and certain colors. The new recreational area will offer space for art and music therapy and other leisure activities for people with and

without intellectual/developmental disabilities. With the Birthday Offering grant, Bethel Hills will expand its mission to provide supportive, faith-based, inclusive community where all are accepted and valued.

Shawnee Presbyterian Church—Café Gingko—Louisville, Kentucky—Shawnee Presbyterian Church serves as a welcoming beacon of light for their community. With the Birthday Offering grant, Café Gingko will be able to reopen with a renovated kitchen and expanded capacity to provide meals. Improvements to the fellowship hall will allow the church to offer enriching activities: tutoring for elementary ages, Gingko Play Zone, financial literacy classes and Mama-to-Mama parenting workshops. The members of Shawnee Presbyterian Church will reach out and serve their beloved community with resilience and strength—just like the ginkgo tree outside their door.

-on experience, stimulate interests, strengthen observation and perception skills, and promote personal and social development.

SEARCH PRESENTS SECOND WEBINAR ABOUT HOUSING THE HOMELESS—On March 21, SEARCH hosted a Zoom webinar and presented ways their staff of 50 are serving 900 households each year to find permanent housing. SEARCH follows a Housing First approach, meaning everyone has a basic right to housing and there are no pre-requisites to obtain housing. Clients do not have to be sober, do not have to be working, or earning an income. Clients are not required to engage in SEARCH services, they will not lose their housing. This is because change takes time and SEARCH uses a client centered approach, meaning when the clients are ready to participate in services, they will come. All that is required is that the client must attend an initial in-service, be a good tenant of their lease and pay their rent. There are two housing options. Permanent Supported Housing is a longterm program and long-term subsidy for people that have been on the streets for years and have a long-term health condition. Rapid Re-Housing is a six to twelve month program to help client's get back on their feet, they just need to have been homeless for one day to qualify.

There are three components of permanent housing - (1) the unit must be available, available units may be in large supply in Houston, but from that supply, (2) the unit must be affordable, and (3) must be amenable to housing the homeless. The available units that meet these three criteria are limited. Once a unit is found, a rental subsidy is issued as a rental voucher by the Houston Housing Authority or the Harris County Housing Authority, and SEARCH does receive grants to provide these subsidies. SEARCH case managers work toward desired outcomes for clients which include maintaining housing stability, increasing income and financial stability, and improving health and quality of life. SEARCH also helps clients manage their money from disability benefits and other funds they receive and teaches them to budget by paying their bills first and pay for things they want last. SEARCH helps clients avoid eviction and provides emotional support. SEARCH partners with the clients, but doesn't tell clients what to do, they educate the clients and respect their informed decision making.

Homelessness is a traumatic experience. The homeless could be victims of violent crimes, surviving with limited or no support system, experiencing daily stress and instability, possess restricted life skills, focusing on survival. Many clients have serious mental illness. The transition to housing can be hard because they go from living in a community surrounded by fellow homeless citizens on the streets to living alone in a quiet apartment. They may still sleep on the floor in their apartment because that is what they are used to.

St. Philip supports SEARCH with grants to move individuals and families from the streets into safe, stable homes of their own. The next informative webinar will be **May 16th, at 12 noon**. The topic of discussion will be "Connecting Communities: Strategies for Effective Outreach and Engagement in Homeless Services." HAVE SHEARS WILL TRAVEL COSMETOLOGY SCHOOL UPDATE—Have Shears Will Travel Director of Development Allison Cleveland and Operations Manager Matthew Flores presented to the Church and Society class last Sunday, April 7. Have Shears Will Travel began as a salon on Wheels, enhancing and restoring dignity to clients by providing a haircut to over 8,500 clients per year. A client transforms in the salon chair, from down or broken to renewed and confident. Founder Barbara Goodson had a vision of having a brick-and-mortar location. On September 30, 2023, the organization broke ground on The Shear Success Barber and Cosmetology School at the corner of Roberts St. and Polk St. The school will offer grants to help students that don't have the finances to attend cosmetology school. The school will provide a sliding scale tuition structure and a pay as you go option. The cosmetology school will teach 25 barbers and 25 cosmetologists at a time. The goal is to eventually teach 100 students per day. The school will accommodate full-time and part-time students who must complete a 1,000-hour course. With over 700 salon positions open in Houston, graduates of the cosmetology and barber school will easily find a job and be able to provide for their families. Have Shear Will Travel is not just giving a handout, but a hand up. A cosmetologist can make \$40,000 to \$50,000 per year not including tips, and they can work their way up to high end salons. The mobile salon in the RV will continue to operate, but if clients miss the RV at the community partner site, clients can receive a voucher and take it to the Shear Success and Cosmetology School to receive their free haircut.

St. Philip's contributions grant individuals with scholarships to attend the school, make repairs to the RV salon, and support operational costs. We have an opportunity to volunteer at the new cosmetology and barber school before it opens to help stock the supply room and workstations, prepare student kits with smock, tools, and books, and get the school organized and ready. Please be on the lookout for this service opportunity in June.

CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY SERVICE CENTER (CCSC) EMERGENCY SERVICES - On April 2, David Castro and Anne Wilson represented St. Philip at the CCSC Council of Church Representatives Meeting. CCSC

presented one of their many programs called Emergency Services. CCSC provides rental and utilities payment assistance, food packages, medical assistance, hygiene packs, and clothing. An appointment is required at either of the CCSC locations in River Oaks or in Southwest Houston on Bellaire Blvd. Proof of the crisis is required like presenting a bill, showing proof of job loss or wage reduction, and proof of residence in one of the 29 zip codes that CCSC serves.

CCSC also stressed at the meeting that they are most in need of non-perishable food donations during the summer since students are out of school staying at home, so their parents must feed them all meals. St. Philip will be hosting a non-perishable food donation drive during the month of **June**. CCSC has offered to host a tour for St. Philip members to visit their new building in River Oaks and learn about all their programming offered. Be on the lookout for a date and time for the St. Philip congregation to meet at CCSC for the tour later this summer.

MEDICAL BENEVOLENCE FOUNDATION VIRTUAL MEETING, FRIDAY, APRIL 19 VIA ZOOM

This Friday, April 19, St. Philip mission partner Medical Benevolence Foundation (MBF) will host a virtual partner update. Attendees will hear from the mission's "boots on the ground" about the work they are doing. On Sunday April 21, Doctor Douglas Lungu, MBF medical director in Malawi, will be attending the Church and Society Class to present and provide a minute for mission during worship. MBF is a Christ-centered organization dedicated to transforming lives by building sustainable health care ministries in developing countries. Through long-term partnerships, MBF equips the indigenous church with tools and resources that allow them to meet the health care needs of their community and share the Gospel. The grants also help these facilities become sustainable, provide international standards of clinical care, and, most importantly, provide a witness for Christ.
