GOD'S GRACE IN THE GARDEN

While so much has changed over the last several weeks, one thing remains the same: a garden grows. While much of St. Philip's activity has moved online, our vegetable garden has flourished—and continues to feed hungry neighbors. A crew of volunteers planted tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, and lettuces in mid-March, just before social distancing began. Those plants are growing, and some peppers and lettuces have already been harvested. The tomatoes will likely start producing in about a month; a couple of other tomatoes that sprang up on their own over the winter already have tomatoes on them and may be ready to pick as early as next week. Collard greens planted from seed last fall have continued to produce lavishly, and about thirteen pounds of them have been donated to CCSC's food pantry since late March.

One story of God's grace from our garden: On Good Friday, I went over to check the garden, harvesting two large grocery bags of collards to deliver to CCSC's food pantry. Finding it unexpectedly closed, I pondered what to do with all those greens; the food pantry would not be open until Monday. Just then, two different families arrived at the door of CCSC, very disappointed that it was closed and they could



not get any food. They were mostly Spanish speakers, which I am not, but with a little English and a little sign language, and doing my best to follow safety rules, each of the families accepted a bag of greens and we shared a smile. The image of St. Philip collard greens on Easter tables in our community is a reminder of our shared life together, even in the midst of distancing and disruption.

By the time the tomato harvest starts in May, may we all be able to visit the garden in person. By Cathy Patterson

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

JANUARY 2020

Called Session Meeting – January 19, 2020

 Session received Harry W. Todd and Aileen Todd into membership by letters of transfer from St. James Presbyterian Church, Jenks, Oklahoma

Stated Session Meeting - January 28, 2020

- Session approved the 2019 St. Philip Annual Statistical Report for submission to the Presbytery of New Covenant and to the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Office of the General Assembly.
- Session appointed Jane Cooper and Sharon Webb to 3-year terms on the Central Mission Endowment Council and Deb Burks to fill a 2-year unexpired term, and to appoint Chuck Seidel to be the Session representative.
- Session approved the 2020 St. Philp operating budget totaling \$1,698,160.
- Session approved using "Big God, Big Questions" curriculum from the PC(USA) for the confirmation class.
- Session endorsed the following individuals as confirmation partners: Angela Fulcher for Lucy Vestal, Nathan Carlin for Thomas Kimbro, Molly Boren for Caroline Vestal, Selena Brinegar for Trisha Young, and Rhonda Sands for Rowan Murphy.
- Session approved Communion Offering Recipients for the February 2020 Super Bowl of Caring, chosen by St. Philip Youth, to be Interfaith Ministries Meals on Wheels; and for March 2020 to be Plan It Forward.
- Session approved the partnership between St. Philip Presbyterian Church and Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary to participate in the two-year Residency Intern Program with shared expenses.
- Session invited the Duerr Lecture Series lecturer, the Rev. Deborah L. Forger, Ph.D., to preach on February 23, 2020 and approved holding a single service of worship that Sunday at 11:00 a.m.
- Session approved the 2020 Celebrations of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper during the 11:00 a.m. Sunday services, the 9:00 a.m. Sunday weekly celebration of Communion, and for the mid-week Advent Services for 2020 the 11:00 a.m.

Committee and Council Actions:

- Education Committee voted electronically to approve Property Committee's request to plant two trees at recommended locations in the playground area.
- Property Committee has approved purchase and planting of six trees.
- Property Committee has approved transferring to Reserve for Replacement 2019 expenses totaling \$40,111.59, which included \$5,945.13 for Mission Center HVAC units.

FEBRUARY 2020

Stated Session Meeting – February 18, 2020

- Session approved the minutes of the February 9, 2020 Congregational Meeting on behalf of the Congregation.
- Session elected Roderick James to a one-year term on the Central Mission Endowment Council in 2020.
- Session voted to hold a single worship service at 11:00 a.m. on April 26, 2020, which is the Sunday of the St. Philip Spring Picnic.
- Session elected Bonnie Moore, Lee Ardell, and Dick Nunn to serve as Ruling Elder Commissioners to the March 21, 2020 Meeting of the Presbytery of New Covenant at First Presbyterian Church, Lufkin.

Committee and Council Actions:

- Mission Committee has approved a motion to discontinue the attempt to establish a mentoring program with Liberty High School, with special thanks to Sharon Webb for her efforts to try to get the program established.
- Mission Committee has approved a motion to provide up to \$600 to St. Philip Stitchers to move and install a long-arm quilting machine (donated by Hope Wilmarth) in the St. Philip craft/mission area.
- Property Committee has approved bids for cabinets and electrical upgrades in the Arts and Crafts Studio. (Previous approval was obtained from the Trustees for support from the church's Memorial Fund. The cabinets will be installed in a manner that will permit removal and replacement at another location.)
- Property Committee has approved delivery of the year-end summary of Mission Center expenses to the Presbytery of New Covenant. Discussion will begin as to the Presbytery's share of usage costs for 2020.

The Session has voted to suspend activities at St. Philip indefinitely.
