Located at 10929 Chimney Rock Rd, 77096, the congregation is invited to stop in for a tour, buy a beverage (alcoholic and non-alcoholic are available), and cheer on the Murphys! The food menu includes pizza, soft pretzels, and charcuterie boards. Children are welcome in the warehouse.

Jeromy Murphy was inspired by the Irish-American ballad “Finnegan’s Wake” for the name of the business. The first verse introduces a Tim Finnegan who had a love of liquor and would start each day with a drop of the craythur. “Craythur is Irish for both whiskey and creature, something that is created and has spirit,” Murphy said. “We changed it to Drop of the Creator as a nod to our architect backgrounds and our love of making things.”


Change Sings: A Children's Anthem

This gentle, vibrant book invites and encourages children in to the art of seeking and creating change. Even as adults it is often difficult to know when and how to touch and effect change in a world in so much constant need. Amanda Gorman, activist and the youngest presidential inaugural poet, brings her poet's voice to open the eyes and hearts of children to seemingly small actions that can bring about change of heart and situations to their community. Dare I write, the eyes and hearts of the adults reading to children may open wider as well. Loren Long's illustrations capture the simplicity and the depth of Amanda Gorman's musical poem. Children will find a place in *Change Sings* whether they care about pollution or homelessness or animals. The artist, the musician, the builder, the writer, the planter, the dreamer -- all have a place in Gorman's anthem. Amanda invites us to make her song our song: "We all hear change strumming. Won't you sing along?"




Rest is Resistance: A Manifesto

Yes, summer is here! A time to rest - or is it? The action of intentional, purposeful rest can be an intentional, purposeful act of resistance, according to Tricia Hersey. In her introduction to *Rest as Resistance: A Manifesto*, she lifts up her wish for this book: I want this book to be a prayer. A field guide for the rest resistance. A document to be engaged with on the ground as we navigate the reality of capitalism and white supremacy robbing us of our bodies, our leisure, and our DreamSpace.

Hersay names this reality "Grind Culture." Through the multiple lenses of womanism, somatics, Black liberation, and Afrofuturism her storytelling reflects her diverse background as activist, theologian, and performance artist. As many in our current cultural climate devalue individuals who do not fit their idea of worth and productivity within their framework of capitalism and white supremacy, Hersey's book is as relevant now as it was in 2022. She challenges readers through the active resistance of rest to see ourselves as enough, and to see our own divinity. Might this personal practice also encourage us to recognize that others are also enough and others are also divine?
