CCSC NON-PERISHABLE FOOD DRIVE DURING THE MONTH OF JUNE—During the month of June, the Mission Committee will be collecting non-perishable food donations for drop off at the Gathering Area mission table or at the Church Office. Examples of the different kinds of foods you can drop off include dry beans (1 or 2 pound bags), hearty soups, dry rice (1 or 2 pound bags), canned tuna or chicken, peanut butter, boxed dry cereal, pasta sauce, baby food or formula, toilet paper, canned fruit (all types), canned vegetables (all types), dry pasta and mac and cheese. Food donations continue through June 30. The food is especially needed in the summer months because children are out of school and their families must provide their breakfast and lunch, which are usually provided by the school.

PHILIP VOL-UNTEER DAY MONDAY, JULY 8-St. Philip mission partner Kids' Meals will host a group from St. Philip on Monday, July 8, from 12:30 - 2:30 p.m., to help prepare sack lunches for children at home during summer vacation. The mission of Kids' Meals is to end childhood hunger by delivering free, healthy meals, year-round to the doorsteps of the greater Houston area's hungriest preschool-aged children and through collaboration provide their families with resources to help end the cycle of poverty. Over the past 17 years, Kids' Meals has provided more than 14 million free, healthy meals to Houston's hungriest children. In 2024, Kids' Meals will make and deliver at least 2.77 million healthy meals, provide healthy produce and groceries at least three times per week, and leverage their daily access to connect children and families with wrap-around services from more than 70 partner service organizations. Kids' Meals cannot reach these goals without volunteers. St. Philip grants support the Healthy Meal Delivery Program. Please save the date to volunteer at Kids' Meals on July 8. Kids Meals' goal is to make things as smooth as possible for you. They recommend volunteers wear comfortable clothing, closed toed-shoes, and a hat. In case someone prefers not to wear a hat, hair nets are distributed as an option. Limited parking, carpool if possible. Please arrive at our offices by 12:30 p.m. Upon arrival, you will enter the Welcome Center, sign-in on the computers, and have a brief orientation. Come ready to have a good time!

KIDS AGAINST HUNGER PLANNING COMMIT-

TEE—This year, many St. Philip members have asked if the Kids Against Hunger meal packing activity will resume. Our church can be a host again for the Kids Against Hunger packing program. There are 5 categories of tasks for a successful Kids Against Hunger program to resume in our church:

- 1. A good accounting/bookkeeping system for orders.
- 2. A good transportation & delivery system of the packing

- supplies to St. Philip.
- 3. Marketing of the packing program at our church & scheduling volunteer groups.
- 4. Event teams & hosts. A successful church needs 6-8 teams of 4 to 5 people. One team would host about once every six weeks.

Meal deliveries. A delivery team loads up the packed meals on Sunday and delivers Monday mornings to Kids' Meals or another mission partner.

St. Philip needs to form a Kids Against Hunger committee to start this mission program again. The committee members can be any church member; you do not have to already be on the Mission Committee. MISSION OF YAHWEH—On May 22, Angelina Fon-



seca-Grewal attended the Mission of Yahweh spring fundraising luncheon at the Junior League. Former residents that received mental health counseling and job training spoke during the lunch, and it was announced that this summer, Ex-

ecutive Director Richard Hill is retiring. Development Director Tammie Jeffers will be Interim Executive Director until the board hires a new executive director. Mission of Yahweh is a faith-based shelter that empowers, enriches and restores the lives of homeless women and

children and provides outreach services to low-income communities. Mission of Yahweh (MOY) serves the Houston area as the only emergency /transitional shelter for homeless women/children offering a unique continuum of services for up to two years. The Emergency/Crisis Program typically houses 75% of residents for 30-90 days while the Transitional Living Program houses approximately 25% for up to two years. In 2023, MOY's goal was to serve 400 homeless women/children (an increase of 118 over 2022) with a minimum of 50% of exiting residents achieving independence in permanent housing. St. Philip provides grants to fund Mission of Yahweh's Senior Plus Program.

LOVING HOUSTON—On May 30, Angelina Fonseca-Grewal attended the Loving Houston end of school year celebration, honoring church leaders and wraparound specialists with Houston Independent School District (HISD). Pastor Ryan Cantu of Pneuma Church in Southeast Houston led a panel discussion on how to get church school

partnership relationships off the ground and what successes have been achieved by churches and schools across Houston. Pastor Cantu informed the group that HISD is laying off the majority of the wraparound




specialist positions in the schools effective at the end of this school year in June. The wraparound specialists are always busy helping students and their families find the resources they need to survive and thrive in their homes and communities. EQUAL EXCHANGE UPDATE ON CHOCOLATE & COCOA PRICES



The cost of cacao has skyrocketed! Due to the current global shortage of cacao, the entire supply chain has been under intense pressure. As a result, Equal Exchange has increased

the prices of all their chocolate and cocoa products, effective immediately, and you can expect to see price increases at our summer sale later this year. Keep reading for an insight into the unprecedented times that have made this price increase necessary.

The global cocoa market

At the start of 2023, the general commodity price of cacao was about \$2,500 per metric ton (MT). The Fair Trade Organic minimum price is \$2,940/MT. Recently, the general commodity market peaked at over \$12,000/MT.

The causes of the price increase are linked to a global shortage, mostly due to poor harvests from key global producers, namely Ivory Coast and Ghana, where primary factors include:

- Serious crop diseases, specifically black pod disease and swollen shoot virus
- Atypical climate patterns, which have exacerbated the diseases and led to drier conditions at harvest time

Many farms are aging and have not been reinvested in; over time, older trees produce less cacao per tree, even in good conditions.

Impact on Equal Exchange

The majority of the cacao we source comes from Peru and the Dominican Republic. However, this year's harvest for our producer partners will likely be mixed due to climate issues in the different production regions. While some harvests are predicted to be good, others will be down. With the current global bean shortage, there is a lot of competition from new buyers at origin. The combined global shortage and buyer competition tend to drive prices up everywhere, so our costs are skyrocketing along with everyone else's. Despite these challenges, we would like to assure you that we currently have an adequate supply of cacao.

Challenges, risks, and opportunities ahead

Our Chocolate team is keeping a close eye on the supply of cocoa. As the supply is limited, the cost of cocoa is unstable, which puts the cocoa supply chains at risk of instability. We are continuously in touch with our farmer partners and the organizations we work with for manufacturing our final products, including cocoa,



chocolate bars, minis, and chocolate chips. We're actively

managing each of these product lines' unique supply chains and relationships, and evaluating the risks associated with securing supply and making strategic purchases. Building strong relationships and getting competitive pricing offers are key to securing supply. However, we don't want to purchase too much inventory at peak costs only to have the market come way down and be stuck with costly inventory that can't be sold. In some cases, the current costs are up to 5 times recent costs, which is a financial challenge for the entire supply chain.

Cacao has also become quite suddenly valuable, and theft is a very real concern for farmers and for the co-ops where farmers pool their cacao. Security for both the products and people are a growing priority at this time.



Higher prices do put financial stress on farming cooperatives,

but they can offer benefits, in the short term, to small-scale farmers and their families. Because we work with farmers organized into co-ops, the benefits won't just go to individual families, but also to programs that benefit farmer communities. Already with these higher prices, farmers are investing income back into their farms. For farmers, farm health and productivity are the key not just for income today, but for years and generations to come. After over a decade of low prices that were challenging for them, this period of higher prices offers them a chance to re-invest and stabilize for an uncertain future.

Because Equal Exchange partners with organic, fair trade farmers, they are also important stewards of their lands and surrounding ecosystems. The current cacao shortage is a reminder of how vulnerable crops and supply chains can be to climate factors. Equal Exchange supports farmer coops who are actively working to manage land in sustainable ways

We appreciate your continued support for small-scale farmers and their communities during these unprecedented times.
