

PEACEMAKING AND SOCIAL JUSTICE IS ON THE MOVE!


The next time you leave the Gathering Area, make a point of heading down the carpeted hallway with the benches along the way and stopping for a moment at the small alcove on your right at the end. There you will see a special display of documents demonstrating St. Philip's commitments to peacemaking and earth care.



The **Commitment to Peacemaking**, introduced to the Presbyterian Church (USA) in 1983, is a tool to help Presbyterians engage individually and collectively in peacemaking ministries. Since then, more than 4,300 congregations and other groups have affirmed the Commitment and used it to shape faithful and creative ministries of peace and justice. National and global circumstances have led St. Philip to affirm the Commitment to Peacemaking in 1984, 1992, and 2003, and all of these Commitments (previously in the welcome table alcove), signed by Session representatives of the time, are worth a moment to examine.

The **Earth Care Congregation certificate**, earned this past February (and signed by many St. Philippians at this year's picnic as a way of saying "I was there!"), celebrates our certification as an Earth Care Congregation. To become certified, churches take the Earth Care Pledge (stop by the bulletin board outside Room 206 in the education building to see it), and complete activities and projects in the areas of worship, education, facilities, and outreach. Annual recertification occurs each January-February as we provide evidence of our continued commitment in these areas.

The new Peacemaking and Social Justice alcove is a visible reminder to St. Philip, and a sign to those who visit us, of our longstanding commitment to God's *shalom* and to the care of God's good earth entrusted to us.

Deb and I have had a full and enjoyable two weeks in England. Our first week in London had us moving at a brisk pace. We were in several museums, saw a couple of plays, and had a few extensive tours in parts of the city that were unfamiliar to us. One side trip took us to Portsmouth to see the Mary Rose, the recovered warship of Henry VIII. The photo of the two of us is from that day. The picture of me on the bench is from the park near our residence hall that we walked through every day. While the bench was more than adequate, it did lack some of the features of "my" bench at Mo-Ranch!

We arrived in York last Monday. We've settled nicely into the flat we've rented, which is conveniently located next to the City Center and is just a couple of minutes walk to the cathedral, York Minster. Walking and worship have been the defining marks of our time in York thus far. The city is very pedestrian friendly and the temperatures have been delightfully cool, so we've spent lots of time walking the winding streets and along the river. Worship at York Minster happens throughout the day, and we've found ourselves there for a couple of services each day, usually the 7:30 morning prayer service and the 5:15 evensong. We actually went to three services Sunday, though Deb decided that three sermons in one day might be a bit much, no matter how good the choir is! It has already been a rich and rewarding time, and we are all the more grateful for this extraordinary opportunity. As we join here in worship with people and pilgrims from all over the world, we keep the community of St. Philip in the center of our prayers.

SEPTEMBER COMMUNION OFFERING

We were fortunate enough to send \$1,520.81 through the July communion offering to Bethesda Clinic. Located in Yucatan, the clinic provides 24/7 medical services and spiritual assistance to people who are in low economic situations. The founder, Dr. Jose Estrella, received his education through the generosity of Presbyterian missionaries in the

Yucatan. That generosity has been extended to many of his Mayan patients & students through the years. Currently his sons, Dr. Federico Estrella and Rev. Pablo Estrella continue his work. Mission Partners with St. Philip since 2001, the clinic and school are also partners with Living Waters and Project Cure.

UNITED CAMPUS MINISTRIES

September's Communion Offering will go to United Campus Ministries, whose mission is to demonstrate the love of God as expressed through Jesus Christ through programs initiated within the local college and university communities. UCMGH was established in 1968 as an ecumenical partnership between the Presbyterian Church (USA), The Disciples of Christ (Christian Church), and the United Church of Christ. Many students are far from home, and find comfort in their faith, new friends, and community mission projects. UCMGH has served the UT School of Medicine, U of H, HCC locations, Texas Southern University and Rice University.

SEAFARERS

Help give a sailor a special Christmas gift this year! The Mission committee is accepting donations of personal items, such as those listed below, to fill the 2019 Seafarer's Christmas Boxes, through **November 10**. Each year congregations from the Houston area pack personal items that sailors use every day in empty shoeboxes and wrap them with Christmas paper. The boxes will be delivered to the Seafarer's Center, and then personally taken to the ships by the Port chaplains. Annually, over 10,000 wrapped boxes have been delivered to over 500 ships, from over 65 different countries. St. Philip will be packing boxes on **November 10**. The seafarers greatly cherish these gifts. On board the ships for many months at a time, away from their families, a personal touch of a gift is so important to these sailors.

Borg is a world-renowned Jesus scholar and author of the bestseller *Meeting Jesus Again for the First Time*, the Monday evening study group's previous selection. *The Heart of Christianity* argues that the essential ingredients of a Christian life—faith, being born again, the kingdom of God, the gospel of love—are as vitally important today as they have always been, even during this time of conflict and change in the Church. We meet each second and fourth Monday, from 5:30 to 7:00 p.m. Come even if you haven't done the reading; the discussion is always timely and thought provoking.
