DAVID LAMOTTE CONCERT

David LaMotte is a songwriter, speaker, and author who is a frequent speaker and retreat leader at Montreat, Mo Ranch, and other Presbyterian gatherings. He has performed over 3,500 concerts and released thirteen fulllength CDs of primarily original music, touring in all of the fifty states and on five of the seven continents. The Boston Globe writes that his music "pushes the envelope with challenging lyrics and unusual tunings, but he also pays homage to folk tradition," while BBC Radio Belfast lauds his "charm, stories, humour, insightful songs, sweet voice and dazzling guitar ability." His most recent album, Still, features the number one song on Folk Radio in September 2022 (September Me), and the album remained in the top twenty for six months.



In 2008, David pursued his vocation of peacemaking further when he accepted a Rotary World Peace Fellowship to study International Relations, Peace and Conflict Resolution at the University of Queensland in Brisbane, Australia. On St. Philip youth's first Spiritual Pilgrimage for Racial Justice, David met with us in Montreat to teach youth about Rosa Parks and her story as an example of why successful social movements are rooted in a "movement narrative" rather than a "hero narrative."

David is the son, grandson, and brother of Presbyterian ministers, and the fourth of four kids. He has also lived for short times in Raleigh, NC, Chapel Hill, North Carolina, Paris, France, rural Andhra Pradesh, India, and Brisbane, Australia, but has made his home for more than thirty years in Black Mountain, North Carolina, where he currently resides with his wife, son, old dog, and five chickens.

September 22 - St. Philip Day School - The Plan for Affordable Daycare at St. Philip - Plans are underway for the opening of an affordable daycare facility at St. Philip in the spring of 2025. The St. Philip Day School will be based on the model of Project One Day - a Christ-centered child care cooperative for parents of children ages 6 weeks through 3 years old, which works on a simple premise. Parents volunteer one day a week and receive 40 hours of FREE, faith-based child care to facilitate their work or education. For low-income families this can be a game changer. Parent volunteers complete a 30 classroom hours program developed by Texas A & M University. While participation requirements are significant, the benefits are plentiful— a community of friends plus parent education to make life at home run smoother, too. For children, Project One Day provides top-notch ratios creating a loving, supportive, and faith-based environment to grow, learn, and be cared for. September 29 - The Wonder of Worship - An initiative to prepare Christian educators to engage children in corporate worship - Columbia Theological Seminary received a \$1.24 million grant from Lilly Endowment Inc. to help establish "Wonder of Worship," an initiative to prepare Christian leaders in the seminary's degree programs and support partnering congregations in engaging children in corporate worship. "This grant positions Columbia to move in bold, creative, and relevant ways to form Christian leaders who are committed to nurturing the faith of children and to resource and support pastors and congregations who long for more inclusive and intergenerational worship," said Dr. Christine Roy Yoder, Columbia Theological Seminary, "and under the leadership of Dr. Kathy Dawson and the remarkable planning team, the Wonder of Worship project will build on current research about children and faith, fuel innovative ideas, connect practitioners and experts, and develop new approaches for worship that welcome and foster the flourishing of all." CAMPUS WASTE UPDATE AND SURVEY REQUEST

Since the approval of St. Philip's Ecological Food Service Policy in March of 2020, a lot of progress has been made toward reducing landfill waste across campus.

A review of garbage service contracts in 2022 resulted in a new contract with Waste Management that included a recycling option for plastic, aluminum, and paper. The new contract reduced costs for the church and relieved staff of off-site recycling duties. New trash receptacles were purchased to provide a consistent message about recycling across campus. We are reviewing how this messaging can be improved to facilitate recycling for staff.

The church has been using compostable cups, plates, and either washable or compostable utensils at food events. The compostable cups, plates, and utensils may break down more easily than other paper products in a landfill, but the goal is to send as much compostable food-service material as possible to a commercial composter and avoid the landfill. With this in mind, the Earth Care Team worked with staff to get a quote for commercial composting services from Zero Waste, a service being used by Woodland Community Presbyterian Church. The quote came in at \$140 per month for weekly pickups. The Earth Care Team decided the amount of compostable material produced per month at St. Philip did not warrant this expense.

Since this decision, progress toward composting has been made by composting picnic waste (food, plates, and cups) and many weekly compostable coffee cups in willing congregants' home Zero Waste buckets. We estimate 50% of our compostable material created at St. Philip is composted with this method.

Recently, a member expressed interest in bringing their home food waste to St. Philip to be composted. If 15 members regularly brought their food waste to Saint Philip, we think it would justify a contract with Zero Waste. OCTOBER PEACE AND GLOBAL WITNESS OFFERING

The Peace and Global Witness Offering will be received in worship on Sunday, October 6 (World Communion Sunday), and throughout October 25 on St. Philip's Giving webpage or by mailing a check to the church office. Confronting hopelessness and thwarting division, this denominational offering encourages the church to cast off anxiety, fear, discord, and division so that we can embrace God's mission of reconciliation to those around us and around the world. The Offering empowers congregations and individuals to become peacemakers themselves, encouraging and equipping congregations to find and address the anxiety and discord prevalent throughout our broken world.

Mid-councils retain 25% of offering receipts for regional ministries. Another 50% supports the Presbyterian Mission Agency's global peace and justice initiatives.

Congregations are encouraged to use up to 25% of the offering for local peacemaking efforts. St. Philip will be donating its 25% of the Offering to **Texas Impact**, which equips faith leaders and their congregations with the information, opportunities, and outreach tools to educate their communities and engage with lawmakers on pressing public policy issues. Texas Impact helps people live out their faith in the public square, moving the faith community from charity to justice.

This election year, St. Philip is participating in Texas Impact's *Texas Faith Votes* campaign and its BallotReady initiative, a nonpartisan, data-driven tool that helps voters register, make a plan to vote, and look up their elected representatives. Look for the BallotReady QR code unique to St. Philip in our publications, online, and around campus! Texas Impact is a regular recipient of support from St. Philip's Peacemaking and Social Justice Committee budget.
