CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

Session members are responsible for the spiritual oversight of the congregation and for oversight of all the programs and ministries of St. Philip. The Session carries out its work primarily through its Standing Committees. The session meets the third Tuesday of each month.

Nancy Higgs



Nancy was born Nancy Kay McMillan in Austin, TX, and baptized and confirmed at Westminster Presbyterian Church, which was literally in her backyard. She maintained her membership there until she wandered with some intention into St. Philip a few years ago. Nancy says that from the moment she passed through those doors, she felt "at home." Her first

friend was Mickey Meyers, who was a greeter that day. Her next friend was Carla Burns, who invited her to join the Sunday Presbyterian Women's Circle after worship that very day.

Gratefully and most specially, Nancy was graced by all at St. Philip who accepted that she intended to maintain her membership at Westminster and never, ever pressured her to do otherwise. Susan spent her career in sales and marketing with Dun and Bradstreet and Experian. She then went back to school and got her teaching certificate. After teaching in a classroom, Susan formed her own tutoring company to help struggling readers. She is the proud grandparent of two grandchildren, a 13-year-old granddaughter and a three-year-old grandson, "the light of her life." Susan and her husband are active travelers both domestically (in their RV) and internationally.

St. Philip holds a very special place in Susan's heart. She loves the active social justice mission and the tolerance for others who are different. In her work with the "Together 15" ministry this summer, Susan says she became aware of how isolated many people have felt during the pandemic because of restrictions on in-person gatherings. She feels strongly that this area is an opportunity for St. Philip to support the congregation as it journeys toward a new normal.

Jon Martin

Jon has been a member of St. Philip since October 2019 and has served on the Education Committee since 2020. Born in Chicago and raised in Kentucky, Tennessee, and Ohio, Jon is a graduate of the University of Tennessee, where he studied accounting. Following college, he moved to Houston and began working for Kinder Morgan (natural gas pipelines). Jon has two sons: Alec, who lives in Houston, and Nicholas, who lives in Seattle. In his free time, he volunteers for The Center for Pursuit, which offers programs and services for adults with developmental disabilities, and enjoys baseball, running, and travel. Previously a member of First Presbyterian Church of Kingwood, Jon says that when he moved from Kingwood to the Galleria area in 2019, he was looking for a church and drove by St. Philip, where the sign out front happened to be displaying messages of welcome. He notes that it didn't take long to realize that "the words on the sign were not just slogans but are real values of St. Philip."

COMING IN OCTOBER: FRESH AIR FELLOWSHIP


