CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

The Session has called a congregational meeting for Sunday, **September 22**, immediately following the 11:00 a.m. service of worship. FYI—The membership of the Session consists of ordained and installed Ruling Elders and Teaching Elders (Pastors), all elected by the congregation. Session members are responsible for the spiritual oversight of the congregation and for oversight of all the programs and ministries of St. Philip. The Session carries out its work primarily through its Standing Committees. The session meets the third Tuesday of each month.

SESSION CLASS OF 2027

Tina Bryan

Do you have a college or graduate student in your life who is going to be away from their home county when election time rolls around? Any registered voter who will be out of town on Election Day, November 5, and the two weeks before that, should contact their county election department to receive an application for a mail-in ballot. The deadline to apply for a mail-in ballot is **October 25**.

Here are the instructions for Harris County. Registered voters in other counties can go to their county election department website and search for application for mail-in ballot.

- 1. Have your Voter Registration certificate handy. You will need your Voter Unique Identifier number (VUID) to complete the application.
- 2. Go to https://www.harrisvotes.com/Voter/Vote-by-Mail or go to https://www.harrisvotes.com/

Scroll down to the menu at the bottom of the page

Under Get Involved, select Voting by Mail

- 3. Select the gray box for Mail Ballot Application.
- 4. Print the application.
- 5. Read the instructions carefully.
- 6. Complete the application and sign it.






Deux Voix (French for "two voices") is a one-of-a-kind musical duo that has amassed a sterling reputation with both national and international acclaim. Since their founding in 2014, Stephen and Justin have presented over 350 programs nationwide in over 19 states and multiple concert tours abroad, including performances in some of the world's most impressive spaces such as the Lund Cathedral in Sweden, Aix Cathedral in southern France, Paulus Church in Oslo, St. Alban's Anglican Church in Copenhagen, St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City, the Basilica of Saints Peter and Paul in Maine, Cadet Chapel at West Point, Boardwalk Hall in Atlantic City, home of the world's largest pipe organ, and many others. They have also served as headlining artists for festivals such as the International Organ Festival in Bergen, Norway, and Piccolo Spoleto Festival in Charleston, where they presented a wildly successful headlining program for the L'Organo Series in dedication of the new organ at The Citadel, which also set a record for the largest crowd for in the over thirty-year history of the series. Stephen and Justin recently celebrated their tenth anniversary year with a concert tour of France in June that encompassed several destinations from Paris to Marseille.

As part of their mission to expand the world of trumpet and organ music, Stephen and Justin are constantly creating and adapting works from other genres and instrumentations, such as jazz, Broadway, opera, and popular music. They have also commissioned and premiered many new works for trumpet and organ, including commissioned works by composers such as Mark Hayes, Craig Courtney, and Alejandro Basulto. Deux Voix also frequently performs for private events, house concerts, and restaurants in an "unplugged" setting with piano, where they present a blend of repertoire.

The Deux Voix Foundation, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, was created in 2021 to make longer strides towards the missions and goals of Deux Voix, which is to inspire and engage a wide and diverse audience of trumpet and organ music through the creation of new music, educational outreach, creative programming, and dynamic performances around the world.
