

# MISSION OPPORTUNITY: DONATION DRIVE-THROUGH, SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 18, 10 A.M. TO 12 NOON

You can help spread God's love in support of two mission efforts, the <u>Seafarers Christmas boxes</u> and the <u>CCSC</u> <u>Emergency Services Food Pantry</u>, in one convenient drivethrough event. Feel free to bring donations for one or both. Just have your bags in the back seat or back end, and volunteers will pick them up—no need to get out of your car. Blessings for being Mission-Minded!

#### 1) Seafarers Christmas Boxes

St. Philip has had a long relationship with our mission partner, the Seafarers Ministry at the Port of Houston. Thousands of seafarers from all over the world pass through the port every year. Seafarers spend months at a time at sea, and each year at Christmas, St. Philip and other churches show our care for them by giving boxes of items that seafarers can use on their voyages. On **September 18**, we will collect items that will be packed into those Christmas boxes. (St. Philip will pack about 125 boxes this year.) Just drive through and drop off any of the items on the list.

If you are wondering what to contribute, items like hotel and sample sizes of toiletries you have on hand at home are always welcome. You also can't go wrong purchasing decks of cards, toothpaste, or work socks. Downsizing small gifts you might find around your home can also be donated, and we will add them to complete the boxes. We will attach small Christmas decorations to the tags we place in the boxes from "St. Philip Presbyterian Church in Houston".

We could use more shoe boxes; we would love plastic shoe boxes if you are so inclined, but cardboard ones are also fine.

### 2) CCSC Emergency Services: Non-perishable Food

St. Philip has partnered with the Christian Community Service Center since it began 40 years ago. We continue to support their many services to the community, and in this drive-through we will collect food for the Food Pantry of their Emergency Services program, which has seen a large increase in clients seeking services over the last 15 months. Mission Committee members will deliver all donated items to CCSC. You are welcome to donate any of the items on the list.

## SEPTEMBER COMMUNION OFFERING



# AFGHAN REFUGEES: WE CHOOSE WELCOME

Did you know that welcome message sometimes displayed on our electronic sign is not just a "warm fuzzy"? It is the name of a PC(USA) awareness campaign that is an expression of personal and corporate commitment to welcome refugees and immigrants into our communities. The phrase stems from a statement made by former Stated Clerk of the PC(USA) Gradye Parsons, in which he urged us to "Choose welcome, not fear." St. Philip once again can be a welcoming presence as Afghan refugees make their way to Houston.

Here are some key facts:

- Over the next six months or so (starting September 1), Houston can expect to welcome 1500-2500 Afghan refugees.
- The US has evacuated Afghans who have a qualifying relationship with the US. They have all flown into the Dulles, Virginia, airport and are being redirected to three military bases: Fort Lee in Virginia, Fort Bliss in Texas, and Fort McCoy in Wisconsin.
- There may be 600 to 850 Afghans who were granted full special immigrant visas and are assured resettlement in the US, meaning they can go to final resettlement sites and access full refugee benefits.
- A second group of refugees was in the middle of completing their visa processing. This group will be taken to military bases to complete their processing. They will also be sent to their final resettlement sites and can access full refugee benefits.
- A third group of refugees is being called "parolees." They will also be taken to the military base to be processed. They will be able to apply for asylum. That process currently takes about two years, although officials are discussing speeding up the process. They will be eligible to work. Federal officials are also offering this group reception and placement support, which can cover costs including housing for up to 90 days. After that time, they are not eligible for other benefits.
- All these refugees coming from Afghanistan have been US allies and aides, and, in many cases, put their lives on the line to protect American troops.

Due to its longstanding relationship with Interfaith Ministries for Greater Houston (IMGH), St. Philip will likely be partnering with their refugee services program to assist with upcoming needs. On August 25, IMGH hosted a briefing on the Afghan crisis, and you can read the Houston *Chronicle*'s report on that call here: <u>Houston's faith community prepares to receive Afghan refugees (houstonchronicle.com)</u>

St. Philip being the kind of community that it is, many of you are asking "What can I do?"

- Needs over this period are primarily for monetary donations, since IMGH does not yet know the more specific needs of incoming families and the Delta variant makes in-person contact risky, even for fully vaccinated persons. You can donate at <u>https://imgh.org</u>.
- More tangible needs will include the following:
  - TVs and radios. Federal funds cannot be used to purchase TVs or radios for refugees. IMGH welcomes contributions of new or gently used equipment. These media resources will help refugees as they acculturate to America.
  - Rugs. Afghans appreciate rugs as an important part of their home furnishings. They are even more important than chairs.
  - Apartment set-up. Shop IMGH's emergency refugee need list at <u>IMGH Amazon wish list</u>.

Together let us respond to God's call to welcome the stranger. "Don't mistreat any foreigners who live in your land. Instead, treat them as well as you treat citizens and love them as much as you love yourself." (Leviticus 19:33–34a)
