The Sacraments are both physical signs and spiritual gifts, including words and actions, surrounded by prayer, in the context of the Church's common worship. They employ ordinary things — the basic elements of water, bread, and wine — in proclaiming the extraordinary love of God.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.





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MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

Today's organ selections come from one of the finest organists of the generation preceding that of J. S. Bach: Georg Böhm, with whom the young Bach studied at St Michael's School in Lüneburg. The **opening voluntary** is a setting of the German Easter chorale Christ lag in Todesbanden (Christ lay in Death's strong bonds), whose text dramatizes Jesus' transformation from the tomb to new life. Out of this melody Böhm weaves a rigorous texture dominated by decorated statements of each chorale phrase, separated by contrapuntal interludes that allude to each phrase portion. Böhm's Præludium in C major, our closing voluntary, comprises an exuberant introduction with some fancy footwork and a short fugue on a fanfare-like theme.

Choral Music

This morning's **introit** uses a lovely ancient prayer text attributed to St. Patrick, with music dating from 2008, composed by American composer, organist and choral director James Biery, who is Minister of Music at Grosse Pointe Memorial Church (Presbyterian) in Grosse Pointe Farms, Michigan.

Today's **offertory anthem** is among the best-known choral compositions of the late American composer and organist Dale Wood. Setting words from Psalm 100, *Jubilate Deo* was first published for SATB voices, organ, bells and percussion in 1970. A subsequent version for two-part treble choir and organ was issued in 1971. Both versions pair spirited, rhythmic choral singing with a lively organ accompaniment, and many outbursts of "Glory to God in the highest" and "Praise to the Lord in the highest."

This morning's communion anthem is by Mexican-born composer, organist and conductor Skinner Chávez-Melo, who was a highly regarded church musician in New York City, serving as director of music at St. Rose of Lima Church in Manhattan for many years until his early death at the age of 47 from spinal cancer. Chávez-Melo composed many works for choir, organ, and orchestra, and wrote a number of very interesting and effective hymn tunes for various denominational hymnals in the latter part of the 20th century.
