

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MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

The Neapolitan composer Niccolò Jommelli, though remembered today primarily as a composer of opera seria, also produced considerable body of sacred and chamber music. His Sinfonia in E-flat (1764) comprises an opening Allegro and a more leisurely Ciaccona (a chaconne) that has been transcribed many times for various keyboard instruments. The movement, today's opening voluntary, attained considerable popularity in Jommelli's day, both in its original orchestration and in transcription. Encountered today more often on chamber orchestra programs, it also offers organists a lilting and tuneful work from an era more focused on other instruments.

Both Johann Ludwig Krebs and his father Johann Tobias Krebs studied with Sebastian Bach. The younger Krebs, the last great German organist of the eighteenth century, left a substantial body of organ music, including several *galant* trios. Along with Krebs' other works of this type, his E-flat trio gave new life to a genre in which his teacher excelled. Its closing movement is today's **closing voluntary**.

Choral Music

This morning's **introit** is by English composer, conductor and organist Eric Thiman, who published some 1,300 works during his lifetime, including many anthems, carols and canticles for church choirs. Much of Thiman's choral and organ

music was written for Nonconformist (i.e., non-Anglican) churches, and Thiman himself was a Congregationalist by birth. *From the Rising of the Sun* is No. 2 of 24 *Introits*, published in 1961 for four-part choir and organ.

Today's **first anthem** is by Scottish composer Peter Nardone, who is also a freelance, organist, conductor, and countertenor, having previously serviced as organist and director of music at Chelmsford and Worcester Cathedrals in England. His *I Give You a New Commandment* sets a simple tune in English over the traditional *Ubi caritas* chant sung by tenors and basses, supported by a gentle organ accompaniment.

This morning's **offertory anthem** was the winning entry for the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM) 2021 Music Sunday Composition Competition. Music Sunday is an annual celebration fostered by RSCM to promote the value and contribution of music in church life throughout the year. For the 2021 competition, composers were asked to set words of a prayer by Rev. Gordon Giles, Canon Chancellor of Rochester Cathedral. Chris Totney's *God of All Creation* is a rousing, short anthem for sopranos, altos and unison lower voices, with a very well written organ part supporting equally strong vocal lines.

Beginning with an allusion to Romans 6:9, this exuberant baptismal hymn unfolds the implications of our incorporation into Christ's new life, making us "a new creation" (2 Corinthians 5:17). The text was written to fit this expansive tune by a distinguished British composer.

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This communion text calls attention to the inherent sacramental nature of all meals and the communal dimensions of all human interaction. The tune, originally composed for an anthem setting of this text, honors the institution where the composer was trained and later taught.



This setting expands and enhances the thematic inclusiveness of an early 20th-century text by adapting the melody of a traditional spiritual to carry these words. This 1940 pairing marked the first use of African American musical material in a mainline North American hymnal.
