

Organ Music

This morning's **opening voluntary** is by Canadian composer and organist Denis Bédard, who retired in August 2021 after 20 years of service as organist and music director at Holy Rosary Cathedral in Vancouver, British Columbia. Bédard was born and received his early musical training in Québec, later serving churches in Beauport and Québec City for some 30 years before moving to Canada's west coast in 2001 for positions at the University of British Columbia and the Catholic Cathedral in Vancouver. His Fantasia for organ was composed in 2012 for fellow organist and composer Carson Cooman. The work is constructed in four connected sections (the first three of which we hear this morning), and, like much of Bédard's music, it is essentially tonal and melodic, characterized by a concern for formal clarity and immediate communication.

Today's **closing voluntary** is by American composer, organist, and handbell specialist Michael Helman, who serves as director of music and organist at Faith Presbyterian Church in Cape Coral, Florida. Composed in 1998, Helman's *Fanfare* is a sunny, dance-like work in 6/8 meter, featuring the organ's solo trumpet stops in joyful filigree over block harmonies with a few jazzy twists.

Choral Music

Alice Parker's A Universal Blessing – this morning's introit - was composed in 2013 for two-part choir and organ, and features vocal lines gently moving in canon (one part following the other) over a soft harmonic cushion played on the organ. Parker began her musical career following organ, composition and conducting studies at Smith College and The Juilliard School. It was at Juilliard that she began her long association with conductor Robert Shaw, subsequently becoming the primary arranger for the Robert Shaw Chorale for some 20 years. In 1985 Parker founded the professional chorus Melodious Accord, which to date has recorded 16 albums featuring Parker's own compositions and arrangements. In addition to a large catalogue of vocal and choral compositions, as an influential and indefatigable advocate for congregational song, Parker has written several books on the subject of corporate singing, including Creative Hymn Singing and Good Singing in Church.

The words for the first verse of today's **anthem** *Now the Silence* were written in 1968 by the great

20th-century American hymnist Jaroslav Vajda. The second verse – *Then the Glory* – appeared some two decades later in 1986. Though Vajda did not write his first hymn until age 49 (*Now the Silence* comes from that same year), over the course of the following 40 years he wrote over 200 original and translated hymns that now appear worldwide in more than 65 hymnals. Our own *Glory to God* hymnal contains seven of his hymn texts.

Jaroslav Vajda wrote this about the genesis of Now the Silence: "Somewhere in the back of my mind, during my previous eighteen years in the full-time parish ministry, I was accumulating reasons and benefits in worship. I have felt that we often get so little out of worship because we anticipate so little, and we seldom come with a bucket large enough to catch all the shower of grace that comes to us in that setting. Suddenly the hymn began to form in my mind as a list of awesome and exciting things that one should expect in worship, culminating in the Eucharist and benediction. Subconsciously I was producing a hymn without rhyme or without worn clichés, depending entirely on rhythm and repetition to make it singable. The reversal of the Trinitarian order in the benediction was made not only to make the conclusion memorable, but to indicate the order in which the Trinity approaches us in worship: The Spirit brings us the Gospel, by which God's blessing is released in our lives." The music for Now the Silence | Then the Glory was written in 1969 by noted Lutheran composer, author and lecturer Carl Schalk, who taught church music at Concordia University Chicago from 1965 to 2004.

Today's offertory anthem takes one of Claudio Monteverdi's most striking pieces of music and puts it in new guise with a sacred text in English replacing the words of what was originally a secular love duet in Italian. Opera lovers will immediately recognize the music as the concluding duet from Monteverdi's 1643 opera L'incoronazione di Poppea [The Coronation of Poppæa]. In its original form "Pur ti Miro" (as it is known in Italian) is considered by many to be the most beautiful operatic love duet ever written. It is certainly among the most moving. The English text heard this morning (which has nothing to do with the original Italian) is by American composer K. Lee Scott. We hear it sung chorally by the St. Philip staff singers with a very light, almost inaudible organ continuo accompaniment.




