

Those with difficulty coming forward may receive communion in their seats by signaling the servers. Because the table of Jesus Christ is open to all, everyone is welcome to receive communion today.

An additional offering is received when communion is celebrated. Gifts brought forward during today's offering supports Houston International Seafarers Ministry. Recognizing that all humans are a gift of God, the mission of the chaplains to the Port of Houston is to carry out a ministry of presence, outreach, witness, worship, service, and advocacy to, with, and for seafarers and their families from around the world. The Seafarers Ministry supports Presbyterian chaplains who work alongside chaplains of other denominations to minister to the social and spiritual needs of seafarers on merchant ships calling on the Port of Houston. Chaplains endeavor to visit every ship that visits the port, as many seafarers are restricted to their ship due to security regulations. Some crews are currently restricted aboard ship while in port by their ship captains or ship owners for health reasons. 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MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

This morning's opening voluntary is Dieterich Buxtehude's setting of the Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern ("How brightly shines the Morning incorporating this familiar Epiphany Star"), chorale melody in multiple variations, with rhythmic figuration that grows steadily more joyous. The custom of a connecting series of organ versets on the same hymn melody was well established by Buxtehude's day, having been invented by Italian organists who wrote their own contrapuntal elaborations on Gregorian hymns. As time allows, during communion we have the comparable genre among French Baroque composers: a set of variations on a gentle French noël melody. Today's closing voluntary is a more concise German Baroque setting of the Epiphany chorale In dir ist Freude ("In Thee is Gladness") from J. S. Bach's Orgelbüchlein (Little Organ Book).

Choral and Vocal Music

This morning's **introit** was composed by Anglo-Canadian composer and organist Healey Willan, who was one of the most prolific and highly regarded composers of 20th-century church music. Willan was associated with the Church of St. Mary Magdelene (Anglican Church of Canada) in Toronto for nearly 50 years, and many of his choral works were written for the choirs there, which remain to this day among the finest all-volunteer choirs in North America.

Today's **anthem** by Malcolm Archer, *Brightest and Best*, was originally composed for children's treble voices, but is heard this morning in a new scoring for two-part mixed adult voices. The spritely setting of this well-known text by Reginald Heber is typical of Archer's sunny and often lively music. Before his retirement in 2017, Malcolm Archer served with great distinction at cathedrals in

Norwich, Bristol, Wells, and St. Paul's Cathedral in London, and finally as Director of Chapel Music at Winchester College.

Sung as this morning's **offertory solo**, John Rutter's *New Year* carol was composed in celebration of the 80th birthday year of Queen Elizabeth II, and first sung in her presence by the choir of Sandringham Church on New Year's Eve 2006. Instantly singable, and with the warm, tuneful lyricism so characteristic of Rutter's music, the carol offers a simple message of hope as we look forward to a new year.

Today's communion solo comes from the song cycle for voice and piano titled Weinachtslieder (Christmas Songs), Op. 8, by 19th-century German composer Peter Cornelius. Cornelius himself wrote the texts for the songs in the cycle, which wonderfully retell the biblical Christmas narrative as seen through the eyes of an unquestioning child. At the same time, this is deeply spiritual and emotional music. Cornelius himself revised the music a number of times on the advice of Liszt and others, and as a result of his own insecurities about his music. In Three Kings, it was upon the suggestion of Liszt that Cornelius added the Lutheran chorale Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern ("How brightly shines the Morning Star" - No. 827 in the Glory to God hymnal) in the piano accompaniment, which adds a level of commentary to the story of the Three Kings. The polyphonic combination of song melody above and chorale tune below creates a unique and beautiful sonority.*




