WORSHIP NOTES

On this Sunday we remember that at the beginning of his public ministry, Jesus presents himself to John to be baptized in the Jordan. This is a Trinitarian event: as Jesus emerges from the water, the Holy Spirit descends from heaven as a dove, and we hear a voice naming Jesus as God's beloved Son. In ancient Christian tradition, the Baptism of the Lord is closely connected with the Epiphany as both are manifestations of God's saving purpose through Jesus Christ; accordingly, these festivals are adjacent to one another in the Christian calendar. The Baptism of the Lord also foreshadows the season of Lent, as the Gospels tell us that Jesus was driven into the wilderness for forty days after his own baptism. At this festival of the Christian year, we not only remember Jesus' baptism, but also give thanks for the baptism we share with Christ.

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MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

morning's **organ** This voluntaries are settings of the German baptism chorale Christ, unser Herr, zum Jordan kam ("Christ, Our Lord, to the Jordan Came"), from J. S. Bach's Clavierübung III, the so-called "Organ Mass." In the larger of the two (at the opening of our service) Bach depicts the river's surging waters with a rippling left hand part. Above this constantly moving line is a duet played by the right hand, based mostly on archshaped triadic material though with a few allusions to the chorale tune, which itself eventually appears in long notes in the pedal. Bach's manualiter (hands only) setting of the same melody is a short fugue or fughetta, which is followed by a four-part harmonized rendition of this sturdy Renaissance chorale.

Choral Music

Today's **introit** is the Lutheran chorale *Christ, unser Herr, zum Jordan kam* upon which this morning's organ voluntaries are based. The chorale's original German text is sung this morning in an English paraphrase by F. Bland Tucker. *When Jesus Went to Jordan's Stream* features a sturdy melody from the 1524 German choral hymnal *Eyn geystlich Gesangk Buchleyn* ("A Spiritual Song Booklet"). The baptism text with themes from this morning's Gospel was written by Martin Luther in 1541 and published in 1543.

Tucker's paraphrase dates from the early 1980s.

This morning's **anthem** is by Virginia-based composer Rachel Aarons, who studied piano, voice, and composition while pursuing her Bachelor's degree in French Language and Literature. Composed for unison voices and organ, *The Baptism of Christ* features soaring, chant-like melodies over a gently flowing accompaniment.

Today's offertory anthem is by English composer Philip Wilby, who was educated at Keble College, Oxford. Wilby studied composition with Herbert Howells while a violinist in the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain. Having worked as a professional violinist with the Covent Garden and City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestras, he subsequently took the post of Principal Lecturer, and later Professor of Composition at the University of Leeds. Since the late 1980s Wilby has focused primarily on writing brass band and wind band music in addition to composing sacred choral music for the church. Setting the words of The Great Commission from Matthew's gospel, Vox Christi was composed in 2010 for conductor Rick McKnight and the choir of St. Thomas Episcopal Church, Columbus, Georgia.
